LIEUTENANT H. BEAN ARRIVES IN PORTLAND

University Graduate Sent Back
After Several Months' Service at Front.

Dr. Harold C. Bean, First Lieutenant Medical Reserve Corps, U. S. A., and son of United States Judge Bean, arrived in Portland Monday after several months at the European battle front.

He is a brother of O. R. Bean and a nephew of L. E. Bean of this city.

Lieutenant Bean joined a detachment of American physicians and surgeons that was sent to France last July by the United States government as reinforcements for the British army. When he received his commission he was house officer for the John Hopkins hospital at Baltimore, Md.

Reporting to the proper officials in London on their arrival, the American medical men were sent immediately to France, where, after a few hours' instruction in the use of gas masks, they were on the following day forwarded to the front-line trenches in Belgium, where they served as reinforcements to the British field ambulance service. These medical experts had complete charge of all first-aid cases coming from the front-line temporary dressing stations.

Last November Lieutenant Bean was pronounced physically unfit for further military service and was ordered home. Returning from the war zone, he passed through the American lines of communication and visited many of the hospitals, which he found thoroughly established with a full corps of physicians, surgeons and nurses and equipped with exceptional facilities for treating the wounded.

"Our troops are all well clothed, have an abundance of good, wholesome food, are well taken care of and are in the best of spirits," said the returned lieutenant. "Without an exception the men are all eagerly and impatiently awaiting the chance to get into the fight and do their part towards hastening the end of the awful conflict. I also came across the Atlantic in a transport, where I also found that our men are well provided for and are a happy and contented lot."

Upon landing in the United States Lieutenant Bean was joined at Elkhridge, Md., by Mrs. Bean, who remained with relatives in this country while he was abroad. She accompanied him to Portland where Lieutenant and Mrs. Bean expect to make their home. Lieutenant Bean is quite well known in Eugene as he attended the University here, graduating in 1912.

DIED

DUERSON—At the Mercy hospital in Eugene, Tuesday evening, March 12, 1918, Lucy E. Duerison, at the age of 31 years. Immediate cause of death was heart failure, although the deceased had been in poor health for several years.

Miss Duerison came here about seven months ago from California and has been making her home with her brother, James T. Duerison, who resides about 10 miles from this city, on the Florence-Elmira road. Beside this brother, other brothers and sisters in California, survive.

The remains are at the Branstetter and McLaughlin chapel awaiting the arrival of a brother from California. It is probable that interment will be made in California.

continues the order, "that the president directs that, in filling this emergency call they shall pass the order numbers of such men and defer their call for the present. It must be borne in mind that this step is taken solely in the need of the nation and not for the benefit of any individual."

"Therefore, while boards should consider it a grave duty to exercise this power to conserve and augment the agricultural production, they should observe closely the conduct of those deferred and immediately upon becoming convinced that any person so deferred is not giving his entire time and earnest attention to agricultural duty, or that he is trifling with the deferment thus granted him, the board should forthwith call him to the colors."

"All citizens should assist in making this expedient forthwith and in bringing to the attention of the boards cases meriting deferment as well as cases in which deferment is being abused."
