EUGENE CITY SCHOOLS PREPARE FOR RALLY

Committee Is Named to Look
After Exhibits to Be Placed
in Eugene Armory.

The Eugene schools are commencing active preparations for the big school rally to be held in this city May 17 and 18. A committee was appointed by City Superintendent Rutherford to take charge of the exhibits from the Eugene schools and it will meet Tuesday afternoon at 4:30 at the city school offices in the city hall to plan the work. They will have charge of the arrangement of the exhibits in the space in the armory which will be assigned to the city schools. The committee consists of Fred Chess, instructor in manual training at the high school, chairman; Miss Jennie May Suedicor, art supervisor; Ida Mae Smith, elementary supervisor; and E. W. Heckart, teacher of manual training in the grades.

offensive in adjacent areas."
(Whether this suggested an Italian offensive or merely a shift to the north or south of the present salient was not clear.)

Counter Offensive in Sight.
The summary noted that the French reserves had been brought in during the week and declared a successful counter-offensive is in sight.

"From a tactical standpoint," said the statement, "the most important event of the week has been French participation in the battle. French reserves have been hurried to the scene of action and are arrayed along the southern flank of the new salient which the enemy has pushed out, stretching from Barlaia to Montdidier."

"Fierce fighting continued in the Montdidier sector where a successful counter-offensive is already outlined in the vicinity of Lassigny."

"North of the Somme the British are holding the enemy on the line running from Feuchy, through Boneyelles, Bouquoy, Beaumont-Hamel, Albert to Sailly-Le-Sec."

"To the south of the river, the Germans are still forging ahead. The thrust toward Amiens is being carried through with great vigor along the Hamel-Hesdierres line."

"Strong hostile assaults have also been directed against the point of junction of the Franco-British forces, in the hope of being able to strike a decisive blow here and roll back either the British or French."

(The junction point of the two armies was selected undoubtedly because of the fact that such a spot would naturally be weaker. The mere fact of difference in language would tend to make the welding point less substantial than elsewhere.)

Arrival of fresh Austrian divisions from Rumania along the Italian front was noted with "important troop movements in the Val Suga."

"Renewed activity along the entire front is recorded and the Austrians were able to conduct a successful operation in the Erenzela Valley," said the summary.

"The snow is melting rapidly in the

mountain areas and with the return of good weather there it is possible the enemy may attempt a serious offensive in this theatre."

Continued Teuton advance in the Ukraine and increasing activity in the Balkans was reported, while the statement was made that news is current in Persia that the Persians will join the central powers. The most important event in the past week in outlying districts was the rout of a Turk force north of Hitt. Turk forces are "believed to be advancing in the vicinity of Teheran," possibly for a flanking movement against the British in Mesopotamia.

has been completely recaptured," the French war office reported today.
"The Germans incessantly attacked

Grivesnes, five miles north and west of Montdidier. After hand to hand fighting, it remained in our hands. The German losses were considerable."

"North of Montdidier, the struggle yesterday evening and last night continued with extreme vigor," the communiqué said. "The enemy especially concentrated his effort between Montdidier and the Peronne-Amiens highway, in order to enlarge gains west of Hangard-En-Santerre. The Franco-British broke up the attacking waves, which were unable to debouch."

"Brilliantly counter attacking with irresistible impetus, the allies completely swept back the enemy and retook these villages."

"Further south the struggle was less violent. Grivesnes, the object of powerful and unceasing attacks, which ended in hand-to-hand fighting, remained in our possession."
