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ALIEN ENEMY TAKEN FROM SHIP YARDS

Portland Company Said to Have Employed German With Knowledge of His Identity.

Portland, Or., April 3.—With the government tightening up on its requirements of the shipbuilding companies, federal officials today promised a searching investigation into the action of the Peninsula Shipbuilding Co., which employed a German alien two weeks after having been notified of the man's identity.

On March 10 the company was notified by a local exemption board that Stanley Stocha was a German alien, and that under the president's regulation he was not permitted to go within 100 yards of the waterfront.

Stocha was allowed to continue his work. He declares the company's president assured him it would be "all right." Stocha had neglected to register as an enemy alien. He will be interned.

High School Athletics to Be Given Prominence

Portland, Or., April 3.—High school athletes will jump into a new spotlight at the northwest military and open track and field championship meet to be held at the Ice Palace here April 25.

With a majority of the champion athletes in the army, high school boys will stand a good chance in the events. An attempt will be made to get as many high school athletes as possible. Committees are rapidly rounding the meet into shape. The big event will be the junior indoor 70-yard hurdle championship of the A. A. U. of A.

AMERICAN IDEA TO GET INTO BIG FIGHT AT ONCE

Soldiers With General Pershing Pleased Over Appointment of Foch as Generalissimo of Allied War Forces.

UNITED STATES TROOPS FACE MANY HARDSHIPS

Trench and Dugouts Are Partially Filled With Water But Men Endure Flood Conditions Without Complaint.

With the French Armies in the Field, April 2.—Failure to reach Paris and Amiens through wing attacks apparently has caused the German command to center its efforts on the latter city, hoping to encircle it by attacking in naturally defined sectors along the rivers.

The first of these is north of the Somme; another is between the Aisne and the Somme; the next is between the Somme and the Luce; the fourth is between the Luce and the Aisne, and the fifth between the Aisne and the Meuse.

The latest attacks betray the enemy's intentions. While aiming directly at Amiens in the center, the attacks on the north and south aim to encircle the city from the north via Hebuterne and Doullens and from the south via Montdidier and Compiègne. First they would isolate Amiens from northward and southward railway communications, then force an evacuation by a semi-circular artillery concentration. The encirclement has been temporarily checked but aeroplanes report constant arrivals of heavy artillery and new divisions for the supreme effort. The artillery concentration is especially heavy in the region of Montdidier, while a great number of six-inch pieces are constantly in action everywhere.

The German destruction in the old Somme region is a boomerang. It is necessary for the Germans to bring up their entire food supply, which cannot be augmented from the countryside, as formerly.

The difficulties of the terrain are delaying the enemy and causing him hardships. The allies' communications quickly convey troops, guns and supplies.

One German division marched eight nights. Another detained in the evening and marched 20 miles, entering the firing line in the morning exhausted. There are 32 divisions (334,000 men) so far opposed to the French.

The aerial warfare is extensive. Yesterday an allied squadron of 80 machines pursued a German squadron of 40.

ELEVATOR ACCIDENT FATAL

Blount, 7602 Meridian Ave., was crushed and dropped to his death to the bottom of the shaft late yesterday afternoon. Blount had been in Seattle but three months. Efforts are being made to learn whether he has any relatives.

VIENNA WILL NOT BEG FOR PEACE, ASSERTION TAKES CROWD FROM LAUGHTER TO PATHOS

Count Czernin, Austrian Foreign Minister, Delivers Address to Municipal Council.

Amsterdam, April 3.—Count Czernin, Austrian foreign minister, addressing the Vienna municipal council, declared President Wilson probably considered Vienna more favorable ground for sowing the seeds of international peace than Berlin.

Czernin said Austria's ruler is attached to peace and that 55,000,000 people share his view. To these people, he said, Wilson is devoting his activities.

"Serbia desires peace," declared Czernin, "but the allies prevent it." "After being conquered militarily, our enemies must be conquered morally." "We do not intend to beg for peace, but enforce it by moral right and physical strength. Other tactics will prolong the war."

Czernin's speech, as received here, is incomplete.

day, having defeated all socialist anti-war aldermanic candidates at yesterday's city election. The women's vote ousted Alderman Rodriguez, socialist, overturning his male majority.

John W. Rainey, democrat, was named committeeman from the fourth district.

The total socialist vote was 64,216, approximately 8,000 less than at the last election. Slightly more than a fifty per cent vote was recorded by all parties in the city as a whole. The total democratic vote was 168,900, and republican 152,013. Twenty-four democrats and eleven republicans were elected to the city council.

MILWAUKEE ELECTS HOAN Milwaukee, Wis., April 3.—Mayor Daniel Hoan, socialist, was re-elected over Percy Braman by 2,600 votes, returns early today indicated. Braman concedes Hoan's victory.

Marvin B. Rosenberry was elected justice of the Wisconsin supreme court over Charles Crowhart.

MARCH JUST PAST DRYER THAN USUAL

Weather Report Also Shows That Rainfall Was Less Than Normal for Month.

March was quite warm and clear, according to a report just issued by T. C. Roche, local weather observer. There was only one inch of snowfall during the entire month, with 18 clear days, 12 cloudy, and 3 partly cloudy. The temperature was warmer than normal and the rainfall less.

The report shows that the mean temperature during the month was 47.05 degrees. The maximum temperature was 73 degrees on the 20th and the minimum was 25 on the 7th. The total precipitation was 3.31 inches, which was .73 below normal. The mean temperature was 1.05 degrees above normal.

TO SAVE AMIENS IS FIRST AIM OF ALLIES

Counter Offensive in Effort to Force Germans Back Is Regarded Improbable.

New York, April 3.—If General Foch succeeds in saving Amiens and in preventing the Germans from cutting the Amiens-Paris railway, he will have accomplished all that can be reasonably asked of him at this time.

Delay in starting a counter offensive against the Germans is proper under the circumstances. It is not probable that British, French and American public opinion would consider the recovery recently lost area in France worth the sort of slaughter that von Hindenburg has just inflicted on his own troops. The German autocrats can rule Germany's man power without protests from home; but democratic governments do not do these things. The immediate retirement of the Germans to their former posts is strategically necessary from the standpoint of the allies.

A voluntary retirement by the Germans, similar to their return to the Hindenburg line last night will be brought about by the mere arrival along the Alsace-Lorraine front of increasing numbers of soldiers from America. Von Hindenburg has bitten off more than he can chew for any length of time. The present front will certainly increase in unyieldingness for the Germans if the war is prolonged. With the probabilities favoring an eventual curtailment of the German front, General Foch might even be playing von Hindenburg's own game by developing a major counter offensive at this time.

The allies can no more afford to wait, their man power than can Germany. The death payments of the allies ought to be made for offensive gains and not merely the recovery of technically valueless territory.

These may be considerations that are withholding General Foch for the present from striking against the Germans.
