BUSINESS IS WARNED AGAINST BOLSHEVIKI MENACE IN AMERICA

President of Chamber of Commerce of United States in Address Declares Danger Is Equal to German Militarism.

Chicago, April 10.—Business men were warned today by President R. Goodwyn Rhett of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States against Bolsheviki in America, a menace equal to German militarism, which would turn us over to mob tyranny more cruel and destructive than that of the autocrat.

Formally opening the chamber's sixth annual meeting, Rhett beseeched "those in business who believe in co-operation the common welfare to seek kindred spirits in the ranks of labor to suppress those restless spirits of discontent who would bring about a revolution."

This unrest "must be reckoned with and adjusted if industry and commerce is to go on under private institution and private leadership and management," Rhett declared.

"What is not for the common good is not for the good of business. When we have all learned that lesson suspicion between employer and employee will disappear, conflict between capital and labor will cease, thoughts of coercion will change to co-operation, the spirit of greed will be transformed into service."

Rhett criticized the supreme court for its early interpretation of the Sherman "anti-trust" act under which he said "combinations were declared merely a matter of form and not a violation if the law even if price and production would thereby be absolutely controlled."

"For fifteen years the moral sense of business men was twisted and distorted under this interpretation. But five years ago the supreme court reversed itself and adopted the interpretation of the common law which regarded combination with favor only when it did not injure the public. This reversal undoubtedly saved the country from a revolution," Rhett stated.

Rhett concluded with an appeal to American business men to put a soul into business. "In that way democracy may find its safeguard and protection."

His address was followed by an important session, devoted to shipping with a talk scheduled by Edward N. Hurley, chairman of the United States shipping board.

Committee reports submitted today advocated entire year daylight saving, budgets for congressional appropriations and improvement in the status of employers' liability.

Resolutions submitted by various commercial bodies urged repeal of the Sherman act, amendment of the war revenue act, relief of public utilities hurt by the war, increased punishment for anti-war acts and new federal bankruptcy laws.

A resolution to suppress German language newspapers was tabled by a vote of 134 to 102. Americanism of 13,000,000 foreign born persons in this country is a pressing problem, it was agreed.

Secretary of State Will Not Be Witness in Hindu Trial

San Francisco, Cal., April 10.—All prospects of defendants in the Hindu revolt trial bringing Secretary of State Lansing to San Francisco to testify for them had vanished today. Judge Van Fleet, answering a letter from Ram Chandra and six other defendants, declared in court that Secretary of State Lansing is too busy a man to be called to testify in a case of which he has little direct knowledge, and could give no competent testimony. It also is improbable that a deposition will be admitted.

Y. M. C. A. Brings Famous British Evangelist Here.

CHANGE IN AIRCRAFT PRODUCTION URGED

Senate Committee Recommends that Control Be Taken from Signal Corps.

Washington, April 10.—Charging that government officials have misrepresented the progress of the aviation program, and "misled the public," the senate military affairs committee today demanded the aircraft production be taken out of the hands of the signal corps and given to "one executive officer appointed by the president and responsible to him."

The committee, through Senator Chamberlain, its chairman, today filed with the senate a report on its recent searching investigation of the whole aviation program. Its recommendations in brief are:

Take aircraft production out of the hands of the signal-corps and give it to one man.

Surround this man with a "corps of the best aircraft engineers, both European and American."

Get an immediate supply of the best types of European aircraft and engines, while we are developing our own.

Encourage aircraft invention and development.

Make a broad plan and policy for the future.

Price Fixing on Cotton Goods Regarded Probable

Washington, April 10.—Fixing prices on all cotton goods, from army duck down to the housewife's calico apron, appeared likely as a result of a conference today between cotton goods manufacturers and the price-fixing committee of the war industries board.

Acute shortages in cotton products, fast-growing more desperate, have forced Chairman Burch, of the war industries board, to take action to increase manufacturing facilities and regulate prices. Agreements with manufacturers are being sought.

Prices on cotton fabrics and yarn have been forced to unheard-of levels by excessive demands of the army and navy. Mills, worked to capacity, are recalling salesmen and refusing contracts. Outputs have been contracted for months ahead, it is declared.

Government buyers want restricted profits fixed on goods and manufacturers want help in expanding their over-taxed equipment. Loans are costing three times pre-war prices. Labor is scarce and wages have increased. There is no shortage of raw cotton, however.

Baruch is rapidly becoming convinced that price-fixing must be resorted to, all the way down the line, according to general belief here. Meat prices may be fixed as a result of the investigation of the meat industry, now under way at the request of President Wilson.
