ROSE APHIS GIVING TROUBLE IS REPORT

Robb Recommends Lime-Sulphur Spray with Addition of "Black-forty" Solution.

Rose aphis is giving much trouble this spring, according to reports reaching Mr. S. Robb, county agricultural agent. Mr. Robb recommends spraying with commercial lime-sulphur solution, 1 part to 25 parts water, before the buds come out, and 1 to 45 after they come out. One-eighth of an ounce of "black-forty" solution should be added to each gallon of the lime and sulphur solution after it is diluted. A one-eighth pound bag of whale oil soap added to every nine gallons of solution is an improvement.

For a few bushes use 1/2 gallon of lime dry soap to 2 1/2 to 3 gallons of water, and add 1-8 ounce of "black-forty." Apply with a spray pump while luke-warm. If there is no spray pump available the plants should be carefully washed, and where possible submerged in the liquid.

The same treatment is good for pear aphis.

Two applications ten days apart will usually suffice for the season, but where the aphis is bad, they should receive a third and even fourth applications. This is especially essential if there are bushes on adjacent lots which have not been sprayed.

Amiens and blocked on the road toward Hazebrouck, where will Hindenburg strike next?

He must strike again or acknowledge his offensive broken which nobody here pretends is the case. British fighters admit the allies must withstand further blows, similar to those just past, before the war's great crisis is over.

About 120 enemy divisions (1,440,000 men) have already been identified in the Somme and Lys fighting. This does not mean they are unable to fight further, as many have but few losses. With their unused divisions, the German masses are still colossal. Fresh troops continue to arrive from Russia and Rumania.

Hindenburg has well over 200 divisions (2,400,000 men) on the west front. Reliable authorities in Switzerland told me the German forces would reach 220 divisions (2,640,000) before a definite decision.

Prisoners admit the German's great difficulty is in bringing up guns and material. The British artillery has killed many horses and the badly cratered roads are frequently impassable for motor trucks, necessitating rebuilding.

Bridges also must be reconstructed and narrow gauge railroads prolonged. Desultory fighting continues on the northern and southern battle fronts. German artillery is busy shelling Amiens by day and bombing it by night—but not heartily, as Von Der Marwitz probably hopes to establish headquarters there and does not wish to destroy it totally.

The German artillery generally is less noisy, owing, prisoners declare, to the difficulties in supplying ammunition.

Lacking a wind to dry the ground, Hindenburg, never a "mud horse," probably is praying to the German God for sunshine.

Men to Be Drafted May 1 Will Serve in Artillery

Portland, Ore., April 16.—It became known today that the first men called in Oregon's next quota of drafted men will train in California and will be drafted as coast artillerymen.

The men, of whom there will be 251, will begin to move southward for Fort MacDowell, Cal., May 1, in accordance with war department orders.

Actresses in Objectionable Show Tarred and Feathered

quin is only four miles east of Hazebrouck. Meteron is a mile and a quarter west of Bailleul.

In addition to the fall of Bailleul and the abandonment of Wulverghem, Haig reported fighting in the neighborhood of Wytschaete and southwest of Vieux-Berquin.

London, April 16.—Bailleul, one of the most strategic points on the north portion of the Flanders salient, has been captured by the Germans, Field Marshal Haig reported today.

"We have fallen back north of Bailleul and Wulverghem," Haig said. "Bailleul is in the enemy's hands."

OREGON MUST SEND 251 ON THIRD CALL

This Makes Total of 1541 from State Summoned to Service in About Month.

Portland, Or., April 10.—Still another special draft call, the third in a little more than one month, has been made by the war department.

Under this third call, Oregon is to furnish 251 men for service in the National army, in addition to the 309 called out by the order of March 11, who have already reported at Camp Lewis, and the 823 who are to report to Camp Lewis in the five-day period beginning April 26.

The 251 men to be taken in the new special call are ordered to report to Fort McDowell, Cal., in the five-day period beginning May 1. As this is an artillery training post, the supposition is that these men are to be put into the artillery, though no official announcement has been made to that effect. These 251 men constitute 3.4 per cent of Oregon's first gross draft quota.

All told, since March 11, a total of 1541 men from Oregon have now been called into military service through the draft. The state and various counties are to be credited later with these men against the net quota for the big draft call that is coming soon.

In this call, as in the two special calls previously made, men actively, completely and assiduously engaged in the planting and cultivation of crops will not be called until the end of the quota.

Quotas asked of the various county and division boards in the state are: Baker, 7; Benton, 4; Clackamas, 11; Clatsop, 9; Columbia, 5; Coos, 8; Crook, 2; Curry, 2; Deschutes, 3; Douglas, 6; Gilliam, 2; Grant, 3; Harney, 3; Hood River, 2; Jackson, 9; Jefferson, 2; Josephine, 2; Klamath, 5; Lake, 3; Lane, 10; Lincoln, 2; Linn, 7; Malheur, 5; Marion, No. 1; Marion No. 2, 4; Morrow, 2; Multnomah, 4; Polk, 5; Sherman, 2; Tillamook, 3; Umatilla, 9; Union, 6; Walla, 4; Wasco, 5; Washington, 3; Wheeler, 1; Yamhill, 6.

(four miles southwest of Bailleul and the same distance due north of Meteron), were repulsed this morning, Haig said. A number of German prisoners were taken in a minor operation last night southeast of Robecq (a mile and a half south of St. Venant).

"Between Bailleul and Neuve-Eglise yesterday evening an intense bombardment was followed by a heavy enemy attack by three picked divisions (38,000) which had not previously been engaged. They succeeded, after a fierce and bitter struggle, in carrying the high ground southeast and east of Bailleul, known as Mont de Lille and Le Ravetsburg."

Bailleul has been the scene of the most desperate fighting in the entire Flanders drive. It was the stronghold from which the British hurled back the Germans from the northern edge of the Flanders salient. It guarded the entire Ypres salient from the south, and its fall endangers the British positions in Ypres, on the Messines ridge and Zonnebeke.

Bailleul is the first of the main geographical objectives of the German drive to fall. It is located on the Armentieres-Hazebrouck railway, midway between the two cities. It is three and a half miles west of Neuve-Eglise, which also is now in German hands. The way now appears to be open westward to Hazebrouck, the most important railway and highway center in Flanders and northward in Ypres, around the western edge of Messines ridge.

Bailleul, before the war, was a town of about 12,000 persons. It was of excellent construction, according to gazetteers, and was on Flemish design.

Grape-growing was a large industry in Bailleul but houses before the war. Recently the city was set afire and half of it destroyed.

The British have abandoned both Bailleul and Wulverghem, Haig's report indicates, but the Germans have occupied only the former city. Wulverghem, which is dominated by Messines ridge on the north, probably is rendered untenable by British artillery fire from that height.
