Haig Army

pretty much the same as it did three days ago.

On the high ground east and north of Ypres, as this is called, there is some German activity. Von Quast is doggedly trying to flank British but apparently is unsuccessful. The shelling of the British guns is deadly.

London, April 19.—The German attack on the Giverny-Robecq front in which eleven divisions or 125,000 men participated did not gain an inch, according to front despatches received here today. The German dead were heaped in piles.

With the British armies in Flanders, April 18.—Through rain squalls and a cutting northeaster, the Germans kept up their pressure on the Yps front today. Evidence of the importance of the Yps front is shown in the presence of the 11th and 12th Bavarian corps and Alpine corps, in the sector from Mount Kemmel to Baulou (a front of three miles). Every man of these units is from the German hill country, and von Bernhardt, who is in command from Wytschaete to Baillie, is known as a hill fighter.

The assault south of the Nieppe forest reveals the necessity for the Germans enlarging the salient of the main enemy thrust toward Heesbroeck. Prisoners declare the cross-fire of the British guns create a bulge in the salient before St. Venant, inflicting heavy casualties there.

The German troops, themselves under fire, are surprised at the quantity and quality of captured British food, which constitutes the only decent rations they have had in many months. The promise of more similar food is a spur to the Germans. This is illustrated in a letter taken from a captured officer of the Alpine corps, in which he said:

"If we advance we will surely take enough booty. We have made up our minds now to plunder ruthlessly. That is the beauty of the whole thing. We Alpiners understand our business."

Ten British tanks started an offensive

of their own today, but the frightened Germans sent up red rockets when they saw the machines, and German artillery pounded its own troops, scattering them everywhere.

The general situation is unchanged. Further heavy fighting is coming.

FRENCH GAIN GROUND
London, April 19.—While the British, aided by French reserves are holding the Germans on the Flanders front, the French have gained ground along the Avre, southeast of Amiens, by a heavy counter attack on a front of more than two miles. This attack, the French communiqué said, carried the French to the outskirts of Castel.

Haig's night report described "severe fighting on the greater part of the Yps front." Enemy attacks were repulsed from the Lahasse Canal to Giverny and east of St. Venant. Attacks south of Kemmel also were broken down.

The German war office said the situation in Flanders was "unchanged." Regarding the French advance on the Avre, the enemy claimed that "strong French attacks northwest of Moreuil broke down with sanguinary losses."

HAIG ISSUES STATEMENT
London, April 19.—"Determined and costly assaults by the enemy in fighting before Giverny and elsewhere only secured a limited footing at one or two points in our mode advanced defenses," Field Marshal Haig reported.

"The enemy is known to have suffered heavy casualties from our artillery fire before opening his attacks. His losses in today's fighting were equally severe."

"Hostile attacks south of Kemmel were repulsed yesterday. Others in the evening also were broken up by our artillery and machine gun fire."

"Six different German divisions (72,000 men) were employed in unsuccessful attacks yesterday on the Giverny-St. Venant sector."

"With the exception of mutual artillery firing, the battle sectors were comparatively quiet on the British front. A few prisoners and machine guns were captured at different points."

HOME GUARD MUST BE DOUBLED IN NUMBER

Lieutenant L. L. Goodrich Is Designated as Recruiting Officer in Charge.

Eugene's home guard battalion must at least be doubled in size. This is absolutely necessary in the opinion of Colonel Leader, and the work has been entrusted to Lieutenant L. L. Goodrich, who will choose his own assistants and make a systematic canvass of the city for members.

It is the aim of Colonel Leader to make Eugene the head of a brigade of trained men, and to that end he is spending much time in the work of organizing and inspecting battalions both outside and within the city.

Band to Be Organized.

Lieutenant J. M. Miller, bandmaster, signed up about 15 men Thursday night for the band of the home guard battalion. Captain Hayes announced at that time that while it was necessary for everyone who had suitable instruments and could play, to be present, that there were funds available for the purchase of instruments for competent musicians who have none, and who will sign up. It is expected that in addition to these 15 there will be a number of members of the municipal band who will sign up to play with the home guard organization.

Lieutenant Miller stated that in no case would instruments be furnished for beginners or those not proficient.

A drum and bugle corps will also be organized, it is expected, with the membership of the Radiator drum corps as a basis, and all members of that organization are requested by Lieutenant Miller to report at the armory at 7 o'clock sharp Tuesday evening, one-half hour before the drill hour. Everyone is requested to bring his instrument with him.

Officers Are Named.

Captain Dean Hayes Thursday night announced the appointment of the officers of the four companies, and the non-commissioned officers of companies A, B and C. Lieutenant Koepke, who will command the D company, had not handed in his recommendations. That company's non-commissioned officers will be announced Tuesday night.

The commissioned officers who have been appointed are:

Acting Captain and Adjutant Dean H. Hayes to be captain and adjutant.

Acting Captain Ray Babb to be captain commanding company A.

Captain Ralph S. Hamilton transferred from the University battalion, to be temporary captain commanding company B.

Lieutenant Arnold Koepke, of the University battalion, to be temporary captain commanding company D.

L. L. Goodrich to be second lieutenant and assistant adjutant.

The non-commissioned officers named last night are as follows, Captain Hayes announcing that this is only a temporary list, the others may be chosen later:

Company C—Sergeants, Perdue, Fineth, W. McCormack, W. H. Rae, T. O. Russell; corporals, Burnett, Jensen, Hunt, Dunbar.

Leader Will Lecture.

Colonel John Leader will give his illustrated military lecture to the home guards at the Armory Tuesday evening after the regular drill.

Captain Hayes announced Thursday night that 29 of the 35 uniforms ordered for members of the home guards have arrived, and will be distributed Tuesday evening. He asks that all who have ordered uniforms come early Tuesday night, as there was no check of sizes sent with the uniforms and it is not known whose orders have been filled.

PORTLAND, ORE., APRIL 17.—Although no limitation on the amount of fuel that may be stored has been fixed, Fuel Administrator Holmes has completed arrangements for registering every fuel purchaser in the state of Oregon.

Within a few days every purchaser of wood or coal will be compelled to file a declaration as to the amount of fuel used last year, the quantity remaining on hand and the quantity desired. The statement must be certified to and any willfully false declaration opens the way for government prosecution.

Purchasers will file their statements and fuel orders with their dealers as usual and the dealers in turn will forward the data to the fuel administrator's office with their reports.

Consumer's application blanks are being printed now and dealers will have them on hand in the immediate future.

Under the new arrangement, the dealers' reports will show for what purposes fuel is being purchased. By this method Mr. Holmes will be able to keep in close touch with the needs of the state and the information will be of utmost value in arranging for wood and coal distribution.

"Everybody" said Mr. Holmes today "should order their fuel now. Otherwise they are taking big chances of being caught in a shortage this fall. The transportation situation, the shortage of miners and woodsmen and general conditions are such that production for Oregon's needs can only meet the demand through steady shipments and fuel storage during the summer."
