THREE ENGINES ARE DERAILED AT ISADORE

Helpers on Freight Go in Ditch
When Car in Train Ahead
Leaves Track.

One of the worst freight wrecks on the Southern Pacific railway in many months, if not in years, occurred at Isadore, Douglas county, Sunday morning. A heavy south-bound freight, with three engines, had just pulled over the summit of the grade and started down at good speed, when it became derailed, it is thought because of a broken flange, and all three engines went into the ditch. But one man was hurt, H. Green, a fireman, who had his leg badly crushed and was severely burned.

The wrecking crews from Roseburg, and Eugene were at once summoned, and at 4:40 Sunday afternoon the outfit from Portland passed through, to help put the big engines on the track again. The first train from south of the wreck passed through Eugene about midnight Sunday, and the trains due thereafter were running nearly on schedule. H. Green, the injured fireman, was running out of Roseburg, and had recently come there from Marshfield.

Two of the three engines which were derailed were helpers, put on at Cottage Grove and Drain, and were at the head of the train.

According to reports received here today, Green, though seriously injured, will recover. This forenoon the relief outfit had not yet returned.

Photographs of the wreck received in Eugene this morning show the three engines telescoped and lying on their sides. The track was also badly torn up.

Attack Is Made

withstood the onslaught of three waves of steam troops. A German barrage behind their own troops forced their advancing infantry across No Man's Land into the attack.

Americans say the Germans were "dope crazed," and more like wild men and beasts than humans, singing and yelling as they advanced.

In the artillery-wrecked villages in the rear, Red Cross, Salvation Army and caucen workers bravely stuck, helping the wounded and serving coffee to exhausted soldiers.

During Saturday's attack, many Americans fought in gas masks for eight hours. One officer ordered the men to load up with grenades and "stick." Then

MUSTEROLE

he took up a rifle himself and emptied it into the advancing enemy, afterward joining his men in hurling grenades.

A despatch bearer sent from the front could not see through his gas mask. He ripped it off, ran through three barrages and delivered the message. Returning, he fell unconscious. His first words, on recovering were:

"I'm not yellow, am I Doc? Did I deliver the message? I'll go back now."

In a village in No Man's Land (Schelsprey) Germans and Americans were mixed up everywhere. The Yankees tried to force the Boches into the open, declaring: "We can lick 'em when they come out of their sewers."

Machine gunners didn't know when to give up. Setting their guns in the streets, they mowed down the Germans. One officer told in a breaking voice of finding two machine gunners with semi-circles of dead Germans around them.

When German aviators poured the fire of their mitrailleuses into the American infantry, machine gunners refused to obey the evacuation order and stuck under fire until they had downed the German planes.

Sheer bravery enabled rectification of the American lines. One telephone line-man worked in the open amidst bursting shells, smoking and joking. Army ambulance men went clear into No Man's Land, gathering up the wounded. One driver, who has been at Verdun during the most desperate enemy assaults, said the shelling was worse than any he had ever seen there.

BERLIN ISSUES STATEMENT

London, April 22.—The Germans in an official report issued by the Berlin war office Sunday claim the capture of 183 Americans, including five officers, in the assaults on the American positions near Schelsprey. They also declared the American losses were "extraordinarily high."

"Near Schelsprey Bavarian troops stormed American positions, advancing two kilometers (about a mile and a quarter) the statement said.

"They repulsed counter attacks, and after destroying the enemy's works, withdrew to their original line.

"They took prisoner 183 Americans, including five officers, and captured 25 machine guns. The American losses were extraordinarily high."

In describing the same action, the French war office declared the Americans repulsed a lively German attack Saturday night. Later it was stated that the allied line had been entirely re-established.

"In the region of Schelsprey Saturday night, Americans repulsed a lively German attack," the communiqué said. "We regained most of the lost ground."

AMERICANS FIGHT WELL

Washington, April 22.—German smashes at the American troops in the Toul sector have been met with all the stubborn, gallant fighting spirit that has always characterized American troops; American military men here said today that accounts of the week-end struggle proved that the Americans can be counted on.

As for the entire west front situation, the war department weekly summary published today expressed the view that the present lull will be followed by fresh German offensive efforts, perhaps at a new point.

With the offensive now in its second month, the German finds himself checked in obtaining major objectives.

The fact that Berlin alone made claim of 180 American prisoners in the fighting Saturday and that there was no American communiqué on the subject served to emphasize here the need of an American daily official statement.

In addition to the western situation, the experts are following developments in the Finland fight closely. Co-operation between allied forces and Bolsheviks, following lifting of added forces on the Murman coast, is to protect vital stores at Kola.

SILENCE ENEMY GUNS

With the American Army in Lorraine, April 20.—(Night)—German artillery northwest of Toul attempted to utilize

a clear day to fire into French villages and get gun ranges.

Noting the dust raised, American heavy artillery, directed from the air, quickly silenced the enemy guns.

Americans co-operated with the French in a successful trench raid Thursday night, north of St. Mihiel, (between St. Mihiel and Verdun). There were no casualties.

72 CASUALTIES REPORTED

Washington, April 22.—Seventy-two casualties announced by the war department today showed ten killed in action, five dead of wounds, four of disease, one of accident, two from other causes, 42 wounded and one previously reported missing now reported killed.

battlefield, with the exception of brief lulls, has been the scene of almost continuous fighting since the drive started there, April 8. On the Picardy front, below the Somme, the French have made several successful local attacks east of Amiens and the sector from Montdidier eastward has seen innumerable raids and artillery engagements.

Haig, in his official report today, described a strong enemy attack in the vicinity of Mesnil, which is located on the Amiens-Arras front, about 11 miles north of the Somme.

There are also indications that Haig anticipates an effort by Hindenburg to consolidate the two big fronts by an attack between the Scarpe and the La Bassée canal. He reported numerous suc-

cessful raids on both sides of Lens, which is about midway between the two fronts. These raids may have been part of a feeling-out process to determine whether the German lines had been strengthened materially there.

In this sector is the famous Vimy ridge. By a flanking movement from Lens southward, Hindenburg may hope to take this important height. After which he would attempt a turning movement northward against Bethune and Givenchy, or southward against Arras.

The British commander also reported heavy enemy shelling on both sides of the Somme and Ancre, in the Lens sector, and in the vicinity of the Nieppe forest and Festubert.

HAIG IMPROVES POSITION

London, April 22.—"We improved our position during the night in the Villers-Bretonneux (ten miles east of Amiens), Albert and Robecq sectors," Marshal Haig reported today.

"South and north of Lens (midway between the Picardy and Flanders battle fronts) we conducted a number of successful raids, capturing prisoners and machine guns.

"In different sectors there was considerable reciprocal artillery fighting. The enemy shelling was directed chiefly astride the Somme and the Ancre, in the Lens sector, and in the neighborhood of Festubert and Nieppe forest.

"A strong local attack was made by the enemy last night in the vicinity of Mesnil, four miles north of Albert, accompanied by heavy shelling. After sharp fighting, during the course of which the enemy captured an advanced post, the attack was completely repulsed."

With the French Army in the Field, April 21.—By constantly extending their drives into new sectors, the Germans unquestionably hope to exhaust the French reserves, which already are sustaining the British armies clear to the North sea.

These tactics make it imperative that America rush troops as fast as possible. There are numerous indications that the Germans are preparing for a fresh drive between Amiens and Arras, harmonizing with their system of exploiting drives when successful and abandoning those where the enemy successfully resists.

This, the German strategists believe, permits them to avoid useless sacrifices, but they maintain their temporarily abandoned drives in a condition permitting immediate resumption of the offensive.

From the Ailette river to the North Sea, only two offensive sectors remain—between Amiens and Arras, and between Nieuport and Ypres.
