APPEAL IS WRITTEN FOR MORE WORKERS

Eugene Women Earnestly Urged
to Come and Help Make Red
Cross Dressings.

An appeal for more helpers at the Eugene Red Cross headquarters has been written by one of the prominent workers who says she is growing heartick at the sight of empty chairs and tables. She says:

"Mothers and sisters of Eugene! This is an appeal to you of the Lane County Red Cross. Your boys are 'over there' or on the way, and soon they may be in terrible need of surgical dressings and hospital garments such as the Red Cross makes. And the workers are not turning out in Eugene as they should, the headquarters are open just four afternoons a week, and the tables are only half filled on those days. It is most discouraging for the faithful ones who do come to work at nearly empty tables, or with empty chairs before or behind them. Those who do come are the ones who first started the work and the ones who have been helping steadily for the past year and perhaps they are getting tired and discouraged enough anyway.

"If ever there was a time when the

dressings are sorely needed, it is now, and it is only reasonable to suppose that the need will become greater and greater from now on. So the women of Eugene are urged not to leave the work to others but to come all the time and every time and for as long a time as they possibly can. The rooms are open from 2 until 5 o'clock every Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday afternoon, and on Monday night from 7:30 until 10.

"Rumors about the shortage of materials and the fact that sufficient dressings have been made, are both malicious reports and should not be believed for a minute.

"American women would be doing very little if they made every single dressing used for our soldiers or the men of our allies. The French and English women have other urgent work to do, in the factories and fields. The women of America have comfortable rooms in which to work and they haven't as yet the terrible depression of sorrow hanging over and hovering about them."

sides of the Ypres-Comines canal.

In Picardy, French and British forces hurled the Germans back at some points, in the neighborhood of Hangard-En-Santerre and Hangard wood, Haig said.

The French war office reported the recapture of most of the ground recently lost between Villers-Bretonneux and a point south of the Luce river, a front of probably five miles.

This battle, it was said, "is continuing with exceptional violence."

North of Hangard wood, seven successive German assaults were completely repulsed. The town itself twice changed hands.

Regarding this fighting south of the Somme, Berlin said that enemy attacks south of Villers-Bretonneux "failed with heavy losses." The prisoners taken around Hangard were said to total 2400.

German troops were claimed to have penetrated French positions at Regnieville, six miles east of Seichefontaine.

making only slight headway after the capture of Kemmel.

Sieger tried to advance toward Ypres, astride the Ypres-Comines canal, yesterday, but the British countered brilliantly, retaking lost ground and establishing strong posts.

Von Eberhardt's "hill men" hurled out of Dranoutre four times, were unable to push on after occupying the place in a fifth charge. Likewise, they were too exhausted after taking Kemmel to succeed in turning Mount Scherpenberg.

Throughout the Ypres front the German guns thunder ceaselessly. Local shelling keeps up elsewhere. The weather continues threatening. The ground is unusually dry.

With the British Armies in Flanders, April 26.—(Night)—With their eyes fastened on the summits of Monts Scherpenberg, Rouge, Noir, Kokerlee and Des Cats, the German hosts are ceaselessly battering against the Franco-British lines drawn across this group of heights.

Beyond these hills to the sea one solitary mountain sticks up from the Flemish lowlands—the highest in the lot. Upon its summit is the town of Cassel. This is eight miles from the present line. From Cassel, on clear days, the sea is visible.

(Cassel, a town of about 2500 population, is built on an isolated hill 550 feet high. It is four miles and a half northwest of the important railway and highway center of Hazebrouck and is 15 miles west of Ypres.)

Hindenburg wants these hills. Eight picked divisions (95,000 men) were thrown against them the first day of the present assault and more are coming up.

The Germans are using the same tactics they have employed since Liege, trying to turn the hills instead of taking them by storm. Having swung around Kemmel, across the plains to the north, they are trying to smash their way onward to Lacytte (one mile north) hoping to turn Scherpenberg (a mile northwest of Kemmel and half a mile south-west of Lacytte).

Coincidentally they are attacking northward toward the bluff through which the Ypres-Comines canal passes a couple miles south of Ypres.

(This canal runs southeastward from Ypres and crosses the present battle line near Hollebeke, about half a mile south of the famous Hill No. 60.)

RECRUITING PARTY IS COMING TO EUGENE

Naval Reserve to Invade City
Next Week in Search of
Many Men.

A. Anderson, the advance publicity agent for the United States naval reserve force recruiting party that is due to arrive here Wednesday direct from Roseburg is making arrangements for their coming. They will recruit there for a period of seven days only after which they will move north to Eugene for a six-day campaign.

Recruiting headquarters for the party have been located in the Chrisman building, corner Willamette street and Ninth avenue.

The recruiting party of six in charge of F. B. Upshaw, N. N. V., consists of Paymaster W. W. Usher, Assistant Surgeon Charles B. Wade, Pharmacist Mate, Charles Graham and two yeomanettes, Miss Pauline Greaves and Miss Amoretta G. Crossley, all of the Puget Sound navy yard at Bremerton.

The recruiting party started their tour of western Oregon at Ashland, working north and expect to wind up their campaign at Portland about June 15.

While in Ashland they enrolled five recruits; at Medford, 12 and at Grants Pass 11 recruits. This makes a total of 28 recruits. The party is now in Roseburg where they will stay until Tuesday evening.

All branches of the navy are open at the present time. Uncle Sam needs ten thousand men to man his merchant ships, battle ships, cruisers, destroyers, monitors, submarine chasers, submarines and converted yachts. He needs firemen, cooks, butchers, painters, hospital apprentices, musicians, electricians, carpenters, riggers, bricklayers and machinists.

A special aviation construction unit is being formed to enroll men for immediate service in France. This unit calls for ten carpenters, machinists, bricklayers, riggers, electricians, painters, etc.

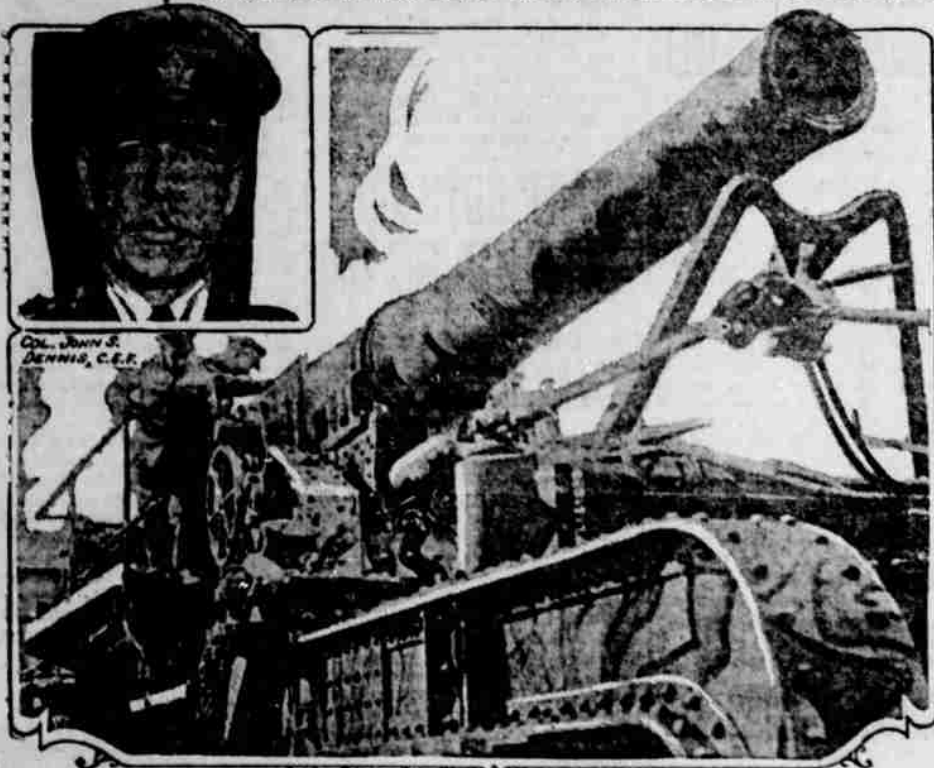

"WHAT BRITISHER OR CANADIAN," ASKS COL. DENNIS "IS WILLING TO BE A 'MAN WITHOUT A COUNTRY'?"



"You can camouflage a gun or a battery in this war so that it can't be discovered, but after the war there won't be any camouflage clever enough to cover up a Britisher or Canadian of military age in the United States who has not volunteered to fight," said Col. John S. Dennis of the British and Canadian Recruiting Mission today.

"One of the classics of American literature is 'THE MAN WITHOUT A COUNTRY' by Edward Everett Hale, and the story which is full of tragedy and pathos describes the unhappy fate of a citizen of the United States who lost that citizenship and was never permitted for a moment to see his native land again. There are 250,000 Britishers and Canadians in the United States, a very large number of whom have not

volunteered for service in the war and they have also claimed exemption from the American draft because they are British subjects. If these men do not volunteer for the British or Canadian Army within sixty days after the Draft Convention is completed, they will be drafted into the United States Army. They will then be in a very peculiar and unpleasant position—they will be 'Men without a country.' What will their reception be if they attempt to go back to England or to Canada after the war is over?

"Every one will know that they declined to do their duty by the United States until forced to do so, and that they refused to help their own kin in Canada and Great Britain in this titanic struggle for a civilization worth having. Great Britain,

Canada, New Zealand, Australia, South Africa, India and other British possessions have not hesitated to make great sacrifices, why should a Britisher or Canadian in this country, living in the midst of plenty refuse to do his part?

If these Britishers and Canadians wait to be drafted they will not improve the Allied fighting power at all, because each one who is drafted in the United States will merely take the place of a citizen of this country in the draft. In these days it will be well for Britishers and Canadians in the United States to read 'The Man Without a Country,' and to recall Scott's lines:

"Breathe there the man with soul so dead,
Who never to himself bath said,
This is my own, my native land."
