UNIVERSITY TO SEND 'BROTHER' TO FRANCE

Faculty Committee Discusses Need of Man Over There to Look After Soldiers.

The University faculty, through a committee comprising Professors W. D. Smith, R. S. Hamilton, F. B. Dunn, and George Turnbull, is discussing the possibility of sending an Oregon man to France, with headquarters in the American University Union in Paris, who shall be "over there" for the duration of the war acting as big brother and friend to all Oregon men in the service.

The committee is at present investigating the cost of keeping such an Oregon representative in Paris and when it has all possible information, will start a state-wide campaign to raise the money.

The faculty feels that it is necessary to have in France such a man, who will look up all Oregon men in the service, will provide for bringing them together when they are out of the trenches, will arrange for entertainment or special medical service or whatever they need, and above all, who will take a personal interest in them.

Washington Sends Representative
The University of Washington has sent as its representative Arthur R. Priest, dean of men and head of the department of public speaking, and other colleges feeling the need of some one to look after their men have sent representatives.

The faculty committee is also discussing means of raising \$300 to pay the University's dues to the American University Union. This money will be raised locally. The American University Union was formed "to meet the needs of American university and college men and their friends who are in Europe for military or other service in the cause of the allies."

Has Headquarters in Paris
The Union has at its headquarters in Paris a hotel with the privileges of a simple club for American college men and their friends passing through Paris or on furlough. Here one finds an information bureau, writing and newspaper room, library, dining room, bedrooms, baths, opportunities for physical recreation, entertainment, medical advice, etc. The Union opened October 20, 1917. "Representatives of thirty different American colleges took rooms the first night," reads the pamphlet issued by the Union, "while two weeks thereafter the Executive committee called that the accommodations were 'overflowing.'"

By December 1, 1917, ninety-one Universities had joined the Union, among them the University of Oregon.

as a candidate. These republicans based their proposal on the grounds of party unity.
