Germans Repulsed

(Continued from page one)

Germans are holding the cross roads which they captured Monday, as a magnificent French counter attack retook Loere hospital, putting the enemy in a nasty pocket.

French-British troops advanced their line to the road in the valley between Monts Kemmel and Scherpenberg.

Attacks and counter attacks are occurring with regularity in the hills and plains around Ypres.

Ypres is in about five fresh divisions (90,000 men) Monday. Today their freshness was considerably worn off.

The allies everywhere claimed great execution. The British 25th, 40th and 21st divisions repulsed at least ten attacks. The 25th alone had smashed up three by 10 a. m., and four by noon.

HAIG INJURES STATEMENT

LONDON, April 30.—The Germans have been completely halted in their desperate attack on a wide front in Flanders, designed to force the evacuation of Ypres.

Field Marshal Haig's report today said that the northern battlefield is comparatively quiet, following the "heavy repulse inflicted on the enemy yesterday and last night," showing that the enemy has been exhausted by the terrific pace and enormous casualties.

Not only has he been stopped, Haig said, but the French successfully counter-attacked near Loere, restoring all their positions.

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MUNICIPAL WORK TO BE KEPT AT MINIMUM

Federal Reserve Bank Voices Wishes of Government that This Action Be Taken.

Municipalities as well as individuals are asked to use labor, materials and money as sparingly as possible, in a bulletin sent out by the Federal reserve bank at San Francisco, and received by Eugene bankers and others. A portion of the bulletin follows:

"Obligations rest upon municipalities, quite the same as upon individuals, to use labor, materials and money as sparingly as possible. For a city to newly pave a street or to resurface an old pavement at this time when the nation's need of men and money is so great, or to employ men in any municipal service or undertaking which is not vitally essential and which can be deferred, is to be as unpatriotic as an individual who would spend his entire income regardless of his country's need. It is a time for every curtailment possible of municipal expense with corresponding reduction of taxation in order that men and money may be more available for the war. No city can justify levying taxes to provide money for undertakings when the Capital Issues committee has withheld its approval of an application to issue bonds for the purpose. To spend tax money in such undertakings instead of bond money would mean the less consume labor and materials.

Municipal projects may well be resumed when peace comes and when thousands of discharged soldiers will be temporarily without employment."

Collection of Fossils and Shells to Be Given U. of O.

Marshfield, Or., April 29.—Dr. W. Haydon, of Marshfield, has proffered his entire geological and conchological collection to the University of Oregon. The collection represents a work of 15 years. The fossils and shells are all classified, which gives them added value. The specimens were found within a radius of 15 miles of Marshfield.

Dr. Haydon has aided many outside scientists in researches about Coos Bay, and his office is a welcome gathering place for such. Although there are hundreds of specimens in both branches, Dr. Haydon does not consider the collection a complete one, but declares it is no nearly complete that its value to science is material.
