

AGGIES WIN TRACK MEET AT CORVALLIS

Secure 88 Points to 46 for Oregon; Eckelman is High Man, with Foster Second.

The Oregon Agricultural college won the annual track and field meet held at Corvallis Saturday from the University of Oregon by 88 to 46.

The Aggies' victory was no surprise and after they had obtained a lead in the 100 yard dash they steadily increased their margin until the close of the meet. Eckelman, of Corvallis, was high-point winner, with 17, and Foster of Oregon, was second, with 15 points.

No records were broken or touched in Saturday's meet. Practically all the veteran athletes of both institutions now are in the army or navy. Probably the best mark of the day was made by Foster, who ran the 100 yards in seconds flat, Mattox, of the Aggies, was a close second.

Coleman Wins Mile.
Captain Coleman of Corvallis, easily won the mile in 4 minutes 39.3 seconds, which is deemed good, considering the earliness of the season. Scores, of Corvallis, defeated Coleman in the half mile, winning from his teammate in the last 50 yards. The Aggies took all three places in the mile, two miles and pole vault.

The 440 was a close race, Montague, Oregon, winning by a small margin, with Sears, of O. A. C. second. The 120-yard high hurdles was perhaps the most exciting race, Eckelman, of the Aggies, winning only by inches over Wilson, Oregon, and Radcliffe, Aggie.

The broad jump was an interesting

event. Ross of the Aggies, led until the last jump of the finals, with 20 feet, 11 1/2 inches, when Foster, Oregon, raised his former mark to 22 feet 1 inch.

The Aggies easily won the relay. Coleman took the lead at the start and it was never lost. Green holding nearly even, Horner and Sears making good gains. Wilson, Schiller, Montague and Still ran for Oregon.

Second Meet Considered.
There are possibilities of another meet between the two institutions next Saturday, but nothing definite was arrived at.

Owing to the fact that Washington University has called off the meet scheduled with the Aggies for May 15, Aggie athletes are keen for another meet.

Women's War Work Will Have Its Own Bulletin Board

A special bulletin board for University women is being planned by the University advisory committee on women's war work, and will probably be placed near the library or some other equally prominent place in the near future, according to a statement made by Miss Mabel Cummings, chairman of the committee.

The purpose of the board will be to keep University women informed on the forms of war work open to them and the things they would be able to do during the summer to help the nation. Bulletins from Washington, D. C. and communications from other colleges will be posted there.

The committee plans to work in conjunction with the Y. W. C. A. employment bureau and assist in securing positions for girls for the summer. "We would be very glad to have the names and qualifications of all girls who want to work this summer," said Miss Cummings yesterday. "No girl has any business sitting around on father's front porch doing fancy work this summer, and I believe every University woman realizes it."

The reason the committee has decided to assist in employment work is because they feel that there will be so many girls wanting positions that the Y. W. would not be able to handle them all.

Japan's Foreign Policy Will Remain Unchanged

Tokio, May 6.—Japan's foreign policy will not be changed, Baron Shigemitsu Goto, the new foreign minister, told newspapermen today.

Japan will continue to maintain peace in the Far East, at the same time aiding the allies all in her power and seeking the co-operation of China.

Propaganda circulated in Siberia now is attempting to estrange Russia and Japan and America and Japan, declared Baron Goto.

"We will not make light of the inimical influence in eastern Siberia, which menaces Japan, China and the allies," he said.

"Neither has Japan lost sight of the fact that Russia is still a power for the allies. We recognize the Russians are endeavoring to reorganize a machine temporarily out of order and in this work Japan stands ready to give her assistance and support."

William Sterling Abbott Dies Suddenly at Crow

William Sterling Abbott, a pioneer of this county, died suddenly at Crow Saturday morning at 6:30 o'clock from a stroke of apoplexy. He leaves a sister, Mrs. M. Canaday, of Crow. He came to this state in 1852, settling at Salem, and came to Lane county the year afterward. He went to California in 1857 and returned to Crow in 1911, living there until the time of his death.

The funeral was held at the Mulkey cemetery Sunday at 2 p. m., Rev. C. E. Dunham having charge of the services.

15 AMERICANS MISSING

Washington, May 6.—Today's casualty list contained further names of American soldiers believed to have been captured in the recent fighting at Seicheprey. Fifteen were reported "missing." The list also included six deaths in action, three from wounds, nine from disease, two from accident, one of other causes, four severely wounded and 49 slightly wounded—a total of 88.

The list of American soldiers slightly wounded includes the name of Martin Shoner, with emergency address given as Haag, Germany.

No Oregon boys are named in the list.

Training Corps (Continued from page one)

been handicapped by lack of equipment and funds. It will now be on a par with all other schools in the United States which have the reserve officers' training corps.

Portland, Ore., May 6.—Colonel John Leader, who spent the week-end in Portland, upon being informed that the law had been passed granting a reserve officers' training school at the University of Oregon, announced that the camp will start this morning.

Colonel Leader notified the war department at Washington of his recommendation of Jacob Kanler, now a captain in the new national army at Camp Lewis, as an assistant in the work. Captain Kanler has notified Colonel Leader that he would be willing to accept the office. Captain Kanler is a Portland man. He was well known in the civic activities of this city, being also a member of several clubs.

Permanent Camp Provided.
The bill which became law was introduced by Senator Chamberlain, and provides for a permanent reserve officers' training camp at the University of Oregon. According to plans laid, the camp will be in continuous operation, turning out officers in about the same time as required by other training camps now in operation. On June 15 the period of intensive training is to begin, which will require from 10 to 12 hours each day of the candidates' time.

Nearly 300 students of the University have made known their intentions of entering the camp, and 35 faculty members are planning on work, Colonel Leader explained.

Home Guards Are Included
"A good many members of the home guards will join the reserve officers' training camp," said the colonel. "The home guard organizations have done much, with but little encouragement and backing in giving their members training. In Lane county there are now 28 companies and every member is working on an average of six hours a week. They have provided their own uniforms and taken a most commendable interest in their organizations."

All males between the ages of 18 and 45, who can pass a successful physical examination, will be eligible to join the training camp, which will be in active charge of Colonel Leader.

Intermittent shelling continues. It is raining.

London, May 6.—British troops advanced their lines on a "considerable front" on both sides of the Somme, despite strong enemy resistance, Field Marshal Haig reported today.

"Beside the Somme and Ancre and west and southwest of Morlaucourt (midway between Albert and the Somme) we advanced our lines on a considerable front, in spite of strong opposition," the statement said. "We captured 150 prisoners, two machine guns and a trench mortar."

"At Morlaucourt, the enemy's losses were heavy."

"Our losses at Morlaucourt last night were slight."

"In local fighting during the night we improved our positions in the neighborhood of Locon and on the Lawe river (southern portion of the Flanders front)."
