

TO GIVE LIGHT ON QUESTIONS WAR ASKS

Barnett, Schafer, Young, and
Rebec Contributors in April
Issue Commonwealth Review

The April number of the Commonwealth Review issued by the faculty of the department of economics and sociology came off the University press yesterday afternoon.

The bulletin is entitled International Reconstruction and contains articles by Dr. James D. Barnett, professor of political science, Dr. Joseph Schafer, of the department of history, Dr. George Rebec, professor of philosophy, and Professor F. G. Young, professor of economics and sociology.

In the introduction, Professor Young, the editor, says of the papers in this issue: "They aim to throw light on the problems ahead in the course along which the events day by day of the war are carrying the nations of the earth."

Dr. Barnett has a paper on The Question of Force in a League of Peace, which he gives the plan of the League and what has followed from it. "All foreign nations must be included in the league of peace if its object is to be attained," he writes. "The exclusion of the Central Powers would simply continue the division of the world into two competing communities of force, certain upon recovery, from the condition of this war to increase the burden of their respective armaments, and in time to become involved in another and even more terrible war."

Dr. Schafer reviews the war situation in "What is Wrong With the World" pointing out that the war was made by Germany because the German government class willed the war. As remedies, he suggests that Germany must first be defeated by force of arms, and second that a new organization of the world must be effected.

Dr. Rebec discussed the "Self Determination of Nationalities" and Professor Young's paper on "The Expanding Meaning of the War" for the American people completes this booklet on International Reconstruction.

Racing Automobilists Kill Mother and Injure Baby

Independence, Iowa, May 6.—Police today are searching for two automobile parties, believed to have been responsible for the death Saturday night of Mrs. Nellie Soper, 17, and the serious injury of her year-old baby.

Mrs. Soper was pushing her baby carriage along a country road when she was run down by an automobile and instantly killed. The baby carriage was crushed and the baby was bruised and mangled. A farmer reported seeing two machines racing on the road at a high rate of speed a short time before the accident was discovered.

Authorities believe the autoists were on their way home from East Dubuque and were intoxicated.

Concrete Steamer Faith Stands up Well in Test

San Francisco, May 6.—The concrete steamer Faith exceeded the expectation of her builders here when she showed a speed of ten and a third knots an hour on her trial trip in San Francisco bay. Prominent shipbuilders and officials of the Emergency Fleet Corporation were aboard the Faith during the four-hour test.

A pool made up among them for the nearest guess on the vessel's average speed was won by W. E. Gerber of Sacramento, who guessed 10 1/4 knots. W. Leslie Conyn, the Faith's "God-father," guessed nine knots.

Man and Woman Murdered at Camp Upton, Long Island

Camp Upton, L. I., May 6.—Army officials are today keeping the lid clamped tight on information regarding the murder of a man and woman here yesterday.

The murdered man and woman were walking together. When the man was shot the woman screamed and started to run, when a second shot was fired at her. Both were killed instantly. The identity of the couple is known only to military authorities.

CHEMISTS TO MEET HERE NEXT SATURDAY

The May meeting of the Oregon section of the American Chemistry Society will be held at the University Saturday, May 11 at 4:30.

The society is made up of college chemists and men interested in industrial and engineering lines, and all aspects of chemistry are covered. The meetings are generally held in Portland and between 25 and 30 men attend.

Professor C. F. Stafford, head of the department of chemistry in the University, will speak on the Utilization of Waste Wood by Distillation Processes, explaining his two methods, that of the new distillation method for obtaining useful distillation products, acetic acid, wood alcohol and turpentine, and that of the new means devised for making gas from wood.

CORNERSTONE LAID FOR MEDICAL SCHOOL

Governor Withycombe Officiates at Dedication of University's New Building.

Dedication of the first unit of the University of Oregon medical school group on Marquam Hill took place Wednesday in Portland, when the cornerstone of the building was laid by Governor James Withycombe.

Dr. Kenneth A. J. Mackenzie, dean of the medical school, and J. D. Farrell, who as president of the Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company was instrumental in obtaining the gift of the 21 acre site, which is some 500 feet above the Terwilliger boulevard, were given credit for the work by the speakers of the day.

Dr. Ernest H. Lindley, president of the University of Idaho, who has visited the campus here several times and who gave the baccalaureate address last June, was the principal speaker of the occasion.

President Campbell was unable to attend the dedicatory ceremonies due to his absence in the East as secretary-treasurer of the National emergency council of education. Dr. K. A. J. Mackenzie, who presided, read a letter from President Campbell expressing his regrets at being absent, and his best wishes for the school's rapid growth.

The building is to be ready for occupancy this August, and the fall classes will start in it. It will accommodate 150 students, whereas the present quarters are only large enough for 90 students.

The sum of \$115,000 was raised for the building by state appropriation and by popular subscription. Bio-chemical laboratories, lecture rooms, library administration offices, dissecting rooms, surgical, microscopic and pathological laboratories, research rooms, and a large auditorium will be provided in this building, which is to be followed from time to time by others, according to the plans of the school.

University of Oregon Will Assist in Child Welfare Work

The extension division of the Oregon state University, in connection with the Oregon state child welfare commission, is going to finance a survey of conditions which exist in the state institutions for orphans and delinquent children.

The survey will be made by W. H. Slingerland, of the Russell Sage Foundation established in New York City. At the present time Mr. Slingerland is in Des Moines, Iowa. He expects to start west May 6, and will arrive here about the end of that week and assume the work under the supervision of the extension division.

The extension division has been contemplating an investigation of this sort for about a year. In some of the other states these investigations are made regularly and the result, according to statistics, has been that the institutions are working under a much better system.

L. J. Spence, traffic director of the Southern Pacific railroad since 1912, has been named by William G.
