out the night was pounding the German positions at Cantigny, Courtenay, Fontaine-Sous-Montdidier, Meuil-St. Georges, and all roads and woods in the vicinity.

Under the extremely heavy fire the Cantigny-Framcourt wood has been torn up by high explosives. Enemy supply trains were subjected to a deluge of shells. The sky was ablaze with the light of the American artillery fire. The boche guns replied against our rear organizations.

The clearing weather has enabled excellent observation. French airplanes hover over the German lines in flocks. The front is now a sea of mud and conditions are similar to the early stages of the war, when there were no shelters and men were living in mud holes.

Courtenay is a village about a mile and a quarter northwest of Montdidier, on the railway connecting that city with Amiens. Meuil-St. Georges is a mile and a half west of Montdidier, on the main highway connecting Montdidier with Breteuil. Fontaine-Sous-Montdidier is a mile north of Meuil-St. Georges. Cantigny is a mile west and slightly north of Fontaine-Sous-Montdidier. Framcourt is a small village a mile and a half east of Cantigny, and about midway between Cantigny and Courtenay.

AMERICANS DECORATED

Six more Americans have been decorated with the cross de guerre. They are: Captain Sydney Graves, Lieutenant Paul Daly, Sergeant W. B. Connel and H. R. Webb and Privates E. F. Bennett and J. A. Mendenhall.

Bennet, a motorcycle courier, drove through two enemy barrages to carry out a mission. Connel and Mendenhall, members of the signal corps, maintained telephone communications with the rear during a gas attack, despite a heavy bombardment. The others were cited for gallantry and efficiency in patrolling.

Graves is a son of Brigadier-General Graves of the national army.

NO TIME FOR PEACE TALK.

Paris, May 8.—Foreign Minister Tardieu today confirmed Premier Clemenceau's statement to the war committee that this is no time for any possible peace, or serious proposals of peace.

LUMBER SCHOONER BURNS

Alameda, Cal., May 8.—The lumber schooner Marshfield was partially destroyed by fire early today. For five hours the Alameda fire department fought the flames and it was not until after 8 o'clock that the blaze was controlled. The vessel was in the Barnes and Tibbatts yards for repairs. For several years she has been on the San Francisco-San Diego route.

Dempsey Is Ready to Meet Jess Willard or Fulton

Chicago, May 8.—Jack Dempsey, meteoric boxer from the coast, shook his cocoon of preliminaries and became today a full-fledged challenger of the heavyweight crown.

"Having disposed of Billy Mike," he asserted, "I am ready for Jess Willard or his perpetual challenger, Fulton. I'll fight either any time, any place, my share to go to the Red Cross."

Dempsey is to meet Tom Cawley in Milwaukee within the month, it was announced today.

sunshine and war planes are flying about in swarms.

With the British Armies in France, May 7.—Hindenburg appears about ready to strike again, unless the signs of the times are wholly deceitful.

From various sources it is known the vast machinery composed of roads, railways, bridges, airfields, airplanes and artillery concentrations stand ready whole great armies of troops, refitted and refreshed await the pull of the trigger to the catapult which will hurl them into the fray.

My personal computation shows that of 206 enemy infantry divisions (2,272,000 men) on the west front, about 130 are now in the line. Of the remainder, which is in reserve, about sixty were drawn out of recent battles. Of these, about forty are retrained and refitted sufficiently to be ready for action elsewhere in the line.

Twenty-five divisions have taken no part in the offensive. Adding to the above between 15 and 20 divisions in reserve, one arrives at the probable total of more than 80 fairly fresh divisions which are now preparing to strike.

Hindenburg presumably is much in the same position now as on March 21, with two important qualifications—his troops then were wholly fresh and doped with the infallibility of the German plans and had the advantage of a long winter of preparation in machinery, whereas the new drive must be undertaken with men doubting their own ability.

ARTILLERY IS ACTIVE

Paris, May 7.—The most violent artillery is under way north and south of the Aisne river on the Amiens front, the French war office announced today.

German attacks were repulsed and prisoners taken west of Montdidier and in the region of Hangard-En-Santerre, Thennes and Grivesnes.

American troops are officially reported operating west of Montdidier and in the regions of Hangard-En-Santerre and Thennes.

BRITISH ADVANCE LINES

London, May 8.—British troops again advanced their lines between the Somme and the Aisne, taking several prisoners, Field Marshal Haig reported today. Hostile cannoning occurred in Flanders during the night.

Enemy artillery fire increased this morning on the northern portion of the Flanders front.

"As the result of successful minor operations we advanced our line a little between the Somme and the Aisne, taking several prisoners," the statement said.

It was on this front that the Australians advanced their lines on more than a mile front Sunday night and Monday morning.

"Between Locca and Robecq (on the southern portion of the Flanders front), and in the neighborhood of St. Julien (northeast of Ypres), hostile artillery was active last night."

"The enemy artillery increased his activity in the Meteren and Kemmel sectors early this morning."

time to exist; but General Maurice has not yet proven that the civilian authorities have deceived the British people concerning the true facts of the war. This is General Maurice's second recent adventure in impetuous criticism.

His first was his attack on General Foch during the German offensive in Flanders for not ordering French reserves northward as rapidly as General Maurice believed should have been done. If General Maurice had not been removed from his post because of this offense, it is highly improbable he would now be attempting to overthrow the Lloyd George ministry to justify the right of militarists to challenge the power of the civil government.

The charge of misstatement of facts which General Maurice brings against the prime minister relates to a declaration in the house of commons made a month ago, if the matter were as serious as General Maurice pretends to make out, his own silence during this period is difficult to explain on the theory that his action is solely for the good of the army.

General Maurice's work as director of military operations formed the link connecting the British government at home with the army commanders in the field. It was General Maurice's duty before his removal to have brought before the prime minister privately any misstatements about the army in the house of commons and not to use the newspapers now for that purpose after his responsibility has ceased.

General Maurice's retirement from his former position was undoubtedly a line to a large extent to the instantaneously criticism in the United States of an equivalent attitude toward General Foch. America, therefore, is responsible in a measure for the turn General Maurice has sought to give to events. His public attack on the British government is a challenge to democratic government responsibility. It should strengthen the Lloyd George ministry; but if the government falls on the issue, any one-sided premier would be compelled to disavow suspicions that he is an army appointee.

Hair of Pro-German Swiss Is Clipped by Night Riders

San Rafael, Cal., May 8.—Henry Zang, a native of Switzerland, was found late last night tied to a tree in the court-house yard, with his hair clipped in the form of a cross. He said 25 masked night riders had clipped his hair and threatened him with more serious injury if he made any more pro-German remarks.

Zang had told the local draft board his sympathies were with Germany.

Quarterly Registration of Men Reaching Age of 21, Is Plan

Washington, May 8.—Quarterly draft registration of men reaching 21 years of age during the next year, may be made necessary by the new army expansion program, Provost Marshal General Crowder told the house military affairs committee today.

Crowder presented estimates for \$15,000,000, which is \$3,000,000 more than draft expenditures this year. Quarterly registrations will make the increased expenditures necessary, Crowder said.

WEALTHY FARMER ARRESTED

Seattle, Wash., May 8.—Frank Schaffer, wealthy farmer of Everett, has been arrested for circulating "The Financed Mystery," following indictment by the federal grand jury.

The indictment charges Schaffer with circulating the forbidden book issued by the International Bible Students' association and with making sedition statements. He is alleged to have said the United States treasury would go bankrupt and Liberty Bonds be unrecouped.

THIRD LIBERTY LOAN OVER-SOLD IN COUNTY

Total Sales Are Little Over 50 Per Cent Above Quota of County, Is Report.

The third Liberty Loan has been more than 50 per cent over-subscribed in Lane county, according to reports received at county headquarters and tabulated up to Tuesday night. The quota of the county was \$477,000, and the subscriptions officially reported up to Saturday night were \$686,300.

The report does Springfield an injustice because that city subscribed \$42,500 when it is only credited by the reserve bank with \$27,650. Coburg, Creswell, Florence, Cottage Grove and Eugene as well as Springfield, exceeded their allotments. The totals as figured by the reserve bank follow:
