JAPANESE SUBJECT IS HELD AT TACOMA

Strange Conduct of Oriental Results in Investigation by Federal Authorities.

Tacoma, Wash., May 10.—A Japanese named Mothary Aaraki is held in jail here today for investigation by federal officials, following a sensational attempt to escape from a pursuing officer. Aaraki was arrested on the Milwaukee docks late yesterday by Special Officer Leo Siatkowski, of the O. S. K. line. While being taken on a street car to police station, the Japanese suddenly arose and dived headfirst through a window. Without hesitation the officer did likewise. Then a hot chase began. The Jap was gaining, so Siatkowski commandeered an automobile, overtaking the fleeing oriental just as the latter reached the middle of the Eleventh street bridge. Aaraki leaped to the railing of the bridge and dropped to the water, 75 feet below. He was fished out by a man in a rowboat and finally landed in jail. Here he attempted to swallow a paper taken from his pocket. The document was rescued, but its contents were not divulged. Aaraki could give no explanation of his presence on the docks.

PROMOTIONS IN HOME GUARDS ANNOUNCED

Sergeants Dunn, Gray and Branstetter Are Each Given Rank of Lieutenant.

Adjutant Dean Hayes announced several promotions at the meeting of the Home Guards Thursday night. Three sergeants were named as lieutenants and several corporals advanced to the rank of corporal. The list of promotions follows: Company A—To be lieutenant, Sergeant Berrian Dunn. Company B—To be lieutenant, Sergeant Claude Gray; to be corporal, Corporal Ray Wood; to be corporals Will Robertson, Brigham, Whiting, Barrett and Morse. Company C—To be lieutenant, W. W. Branstetter. Company D—To be corporal, C. H. Hales.

The men were given tickets to sell for the benefit performances by Mask and Bunkin, the University dramatic society for the benefit of the home guards. Lieutenant Miller had his bugle and drum corps out for marching practice Thursday evening for the first time. He desires more members who play either drums or bugle.

Pro-German Is Alleged to Have Served on Jury

Los Angeles, Cal., May 10.—Charges of pro-Germanism are being made today by members of the jury hearing the trial of John K. Portwood, the allegation being that the one member of the jury refusing to vote Portwood not guilty of murdering German Jakobpalch was swayed by Teutonic sympathies. The jury was discharged late last night, deadlocked, 11 to 1. Trial of the case developed that the scene of the shooting—a San Gabriel mountain cabin—was the rendezvous of German spies, some of whom are now under arrest. Portwood alleges that his Americanism was resented by the Teutons, who feared he knew much, and plotted to kill him. He pleaded self defense.

Diver Base

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smoke screen protecting the British ships and permitted the German shore batteries to sing the blockade ships before they gained their objective.

One British destroyer, two motorboats and two launches were lost at Zebrugge and the casualties were exceedingly heavy. In last night's attack only one motor launch was sunk, the admiralty said, and the British casualties were light.

French forces participated in the previous raid, Sir Eric Geddes, first lord of the admiralty announced, and from semi-official sources, it was later learned that Americans also had taken part.

In the first surprise of the previous attack, the Germans at Zebrugge believed the raid was being conducted by Americans, the defenders shouting, "The Americans! The Americans!"

Ostend is located on the North Sea, eight miles east of Westend, where the battle line touches the coast. It is sixty one miles from Dover and 115 miles from London. Zebrugge is 13 miles east of Ostend.

Both Ostend and Zebrugge are connected with Bruges, the principal German submarine base in Belgium by canals. Bruges is 13 miles directly east of Ostend. Unlike Zebrugge, however, Ostend is not protected by a big armed mole such as defends the former city from the west and north. Two short jetties project out in both sides of the entrance to the channel.

The channel is about 100 metres wide and 500 metres long. At the point where it joins the canal there are several rocky basins on each side. The town, which has a population of about 45,000, lies on the west side of the canal.

The old cruiser Vindictive, which was sunk last night in the Ostend channel was the "flagship" of the previous raid on Zebrugge, and landed the boarding party on the mole. She was built in 1897 and had a displacement of 3,750 tons. She was 320 feet long, had three funnels and carried a complement of 460 men. Her main battery consisted of ten six-inch guns.

northeast eight miles to Republic. Another struck five miles southwest of New Hampton, destroying forty farmsteads. This storm struck the south edge of New Hampton.

Only meager reports have been received from Winneshiek county, but the damage there is reported heavier than in Chickasaw county.

The towns of Atkinson, Fredericksburg, Osolan and Calmar are reported to have suffered severe damage.

Severe atmospheric disturbances, of which the tornadoes in Chickasaw and Winneshiek counties were a part, were reported all over Iowa Friday.

Here in Des Moines the wind attained a velocity of 44 miles an hour, the highest recorded in several years.

The Iowa Telephone company was unable to get into communication with northeastern Iowa today. Their wires were all right as far north as Waterloo, but wires into the towns of New Hampton and Decorah, the seats of Chickasaw and Winneshiek counties were out of commission.

At Plainfield the tornado cut a path through the country a mile wide and three miles long. Scores of houses were damaged and much livestock killed.

At least a score of persons were injured slightly.

The pupils of Jefferson school near there were saved from injury when their teacher, Miss Vera Deistler led them from the building and forced them to lie in a big ditch. A few minutes after the children were out of the building, it was wrecked. This was learned by telephone from Waterloo.

MANY HOMES WRECKED

Muscatine, Iowa, May 10.—Dozens of homes and farm buildings were wrecked, more than a score of persons were injured and thousands of dollars worth of property was damaged in a tornado which swept a freakish path perhaps 250 yards wide through Muscatine county last evening, shortly after six o'clock. The three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Houseman, was born from the grasp of the mother and tumbled through space until it struck the top of a barn. The child may die. A dozen victims are in local hospitals.
