University Man to Lecture—S. D. Twomey, of Stanford University, Palo Alto, Cal., is in the city, and will address the science club at the University at Deady hall Monday night at 8 o'clock, taking as his subject the San Jacinto earthquake. The general public has been invited to attend the lecture.

Returns to Portland—M. S. Emery, a brakeman on the Southern Pacific railway, usually running out of Portland, who has been in Eugene the past 10 days working in the place of one of the regular men out of here who was ill, returned to Portland Monday forenoon. He has been on a work train most of the week.

Applies for Citizenship—William Ebenezer Bedwell, a native of Colchester, England, who came to America 50 years ago, applied for his first naturalization papers at the office of County Clerk Stacy M. Russell, Monday. Mr. Bedwell is a harness-maker, and resides in this city.

Powers Merchant Comes—George Caples, of Powers, was in Eugene Monday, paying taxes on property he owns in Lane county. He says all the camps and mills in that part of the country are working overtime or double shifts, and some instances doing both.

Will Make Addresses—Dr. John Straub, dean of men at the University, will leave Tuesday on a trip on which he will deliver 15 high school commencement addresses. Dr. Straub will cover practically the entire state from Vale, on the east, to Marshfield, on the west.

Visits in Eugene—Frank L. Wait, formerly of Medford, now with the 60th band at Fort Stevens, visited friends in the city over Sunday. Mr. Wait states that the 60th band is a permanent institution at Fort Stevens, but that men from it are constantly being transferred to new bands and others trained there.

Cans Are Coming In—The Eugene cannery received a carload of cans Monday, in preparation for the season's run. J. O. Holt, the manager, states that while he does not anticipate any trouble in getting cans, having contracted for his supply for the season, he is getting them in rather early to avoid possibility of delay.

Says Prospects Are Good—Charles H. Satterfield, a stockman from Prairie City, Ore., is in Eugene, on his way to Marshfield to visit a son, Arthur Satterfield, who is engaged in shingle manufacturing near there. Mr. Satterfield says that central Oregon has a bigger wheat acreage than any time in the past 20 years, and that crop prospects never were better.

Is Distributing Ballots—Sheriff D. A. Elkins and his men are busy at work distributing the ballots and ballot-boxes for the primary election Friday. Mr. Elkins states that in some instances it is necessary to travel 100 miles to reach the precinct, and that there are only four or five registered voters in the precinct.

Will Hold Revivals—Rev. Howard M. Fagan and Mrs. Fagan, Christian evangelists, will open a series of meetings in the Christian church at Springfield, Sunday, May 19. Mr. Fagan was formerly pastor of the Corvallis church, and they have been having great success as evangelists. A very successful meeting is expected at Springfield.

Goes to Corvallis—Seaman A. Anderson, of the naval reserve recruiting party, which was here last week, came in from Marshfield Saturday afternoon and stopped here a few hours, on his way to Corvallis, where the party will open up its campaign Wednesday. He reports fair success at Marshfield, but says there are lots of slackers hanging around the pool halls there.

Wells Corners Weddings—Justice of the Peace Jesse G. Wells seems to be getting at least a temporary corner on the local wedding market. Out of four licenses issued Saturday and Monday forenoon, he officiated at three weddings. When he was called out of church Sunday he thought it was to issue a warrant for the arrest of some criminal, but it turned out to be a demand for him to marry a couple.

BORGLUM IS SEEKING TO REFUTE CHARGES

Sculptor Answers Those Who Alleged He Planned to Profit in Aircraft.

Washington, May 13.—It appeared unlikely today that President Wilson would permit himself to be drawn further into the aircraft embargo by the latest open letter of Gutzon Borglum, involving Secretary of War Baker.

It was officially stated today that President Wilson would not reply to the Borglum letter and that if any notice whatever is taken of the missive, Secretary Baker will do it.

Baker was under fire today from Gutzon Borglum in the latter's efforts to clear himself of charges that he intended to use his influence with President Wilson to further private aircraft interests.

In an open letter to President Wilson, Borglum announced his intent to place new documentary evidence before the senate in an effort to cleanse himself of these claims. In his letter Borglum accused Baker of talking his efforts at aircraft probing.

"Never before, I believe, in the history of this country," Borglum wrote, "has a group of men been given so completely a nation's resources, together with the administration's and people's confidence as have the aircraft group and never have such confidences been more wantonly abused. I refer here to Major-General Squier, Howard E. Coffin, Col. Deeds and Col. Montgomery."

"They appear everywhere in the fine network of falsehood and camouflage, and they include Mr. Baker as their partner in the common statements to the public; they deliberately lied to you and framed up their statements, particularly their failures, misleading statements before the senate military committee and they directly are responsible for no engines, no planes, no propellers and our vanquished appropriations."

Senate probers, along with the justice investigators, will continue their trail into the aircraft situation this week.

He was quoted in a despatch from Washington to the Oregon Journal as saying that he 'took no stock in the statement that there has been discrimination against Oregon.' Of course, if he believes there has been no such discrimination he will make no effort to remove it."

What has Oregon received except such business as had to come here because material could not be furnished elsewhere?

Oregon furnishes spruce, but the airplanes are not manufactured here.

Oregon has received a few contracts for wooden ships, because the timber is here, but look at the wooden ship contracts that went to the South and the Atlantic Coast! And for many of these Southern ships Oregon had to be drawn on for large timbers.

More than 20,000 Oregon boys are in the service, but they all were sent to cantonments in other states for training.

Oregon responded quickly to appeals for food conservation, but the wheat growers of Oregon were penalized 20 cents a bushel for living in this state.

Many other instances could be cited showing that Oregon has been discriminated against, but Mr. McNary says that he "takes no stock in the statement that there has been discrimination against Oregon."

Do you want these conditions to continue, or do you want them remedied? If you want results, then send Stanfield to Washington.

Five lawyers represent Oregon at Washington. Why not elect a farmer, stockraiser and business man for a change? o lawyers have a monopoly of all the loyalty, patriotism and knowledge in Oregon?

Why does the Chamber of Commerce pay a special agent a Senatorial salary of \$7500 a year to remain at Washington to look after practical matters for Oregon if someone isn't "Asleep on the Job" or if Oregon is not discriminated against?
