

## HOME GUARDS MUST BE SWORN-IN TO HAVE STATE STANDING

No Arms or Uniforms Can Be Issued Until Men Are Made Deputy Sheriffs or Become Militia.

The Lane county home guards have no standing with the state of Oregon, nor can they have until such time as the members are sworn in as deputy sheriffs, or the companies are regularly mustered into the service of the state as militia. This information is conveyed in a letter received by Judge H. L. Bown from acting adjutant-general John M. Williams. When the county court was appealed to to furnish uniforms and arms for the various bodies of home guards Judge Bown corresponded with other county judges as to what they were doing and found that all were refusing to furnish uniforms to unattached companies. He then wrote to the acting adjutant general, and received a reply setting forth the lack of standing of all organizations the members of which are neither sworn in as deputies or mustered as militia. The letter follows:

"May 13, 1918.  
Mr. H. L. Bown, County Judge, Eugene, Oregon.  
"Dear Sir:—In answer to your inquiry

with reference to the status of the Home Guards in Lane county, you are informed that those who have been sworn in as deputy sheriffs by the Sheriff of your county are entitled to use the arms furnished to the sheriff under bond from the county. No other persons are entitled to use them. If any of the organizations should be changed into status of state militia, in that event the officers would be put under bonds and furnished arms directly by the state property officer, but until they do so under muster in as state militia, they have no legal standing whatsoever.

"If the county should decide to furnish uniforms for the Home Guards, they should be furnished only to those recognized by the sheriff of the county as his deputies. If any of the so-called home guard companies now organized are mustered into the state militia, it would then be proper for the county to give them recognition as militiamen and would be warranted, if they so desired to uniform the militia companies with uniforms, but unless they are mustered in as state militia, or sworn in as deputy sheriffs, the county would have absolutely no right to recognize them in any way either by furnishing arms or uniforms.

Farmers Should Hold Wool  
Till Conditions Are Fixed

practicable for the government to buy  
in small lots, but urges that farmers go

the feasibility of a wool pool for small  
growers is being considered.

Oregon Dealers in Poultry  
and Eggs to Be Licensed

Portland, Oregon, May 16.—All op-  
erators of poultry and egg packing plants  
large and small, were notified by the  
Oregon food administration to obtain  
a license to operate before June 1. The  
same ruling applies to all packers of  
salmon.
