LOVE FOR DR. ROBERTS IS "GROUND TO DUST"

Father of Accused Woman Says Physician's Testimony Has Turned Heart.

Waukesha, Wis., May 21.—"She despises him," tersely, Dr. A. P. Lusk thus summed up today his daughter's feeling toward Dr. David Roberts, whose wife Grace Lusk killed for love of him.

Her affection was ground into dust by Dr. Roberts' three days testimony in her murder trial, during which he blamed her for their unconventional relations.

Now that Dr. Roberts has finished his testimony and Judge Martin Lueck has ordered an investigation to determine if Dr. Roberts can be prosecuted in Chicago on a charge of adultery, Waukesha awaits patiently Miss Lusk's story.

Whether Miss Lusk will be permitted, here her feelings is a matter of conjecture. Six days after the shooting last June Miss Lusk dictated a confession in which she attempted to shield Roberts from the Mann act. It is probable that if Miss Lusk attempts now to change her story, the state will produce her confession.

The prosecution was expected to close its direct case this week.

Charles W. Fairbanks Is Reported Very Seriously Ill

Indianapolis, Ind., May 21.—Following an examination by physicians this morning, it was stated that Charles Warren Fairbanks' condition was still very serious.

"There is no improvement," the physician announced.

Although the former president spent a quiet night, causing members of the family who were at his bedside to believe his condition was improved, the physicians declare that he was in an extremely critical condition.

Fairbanks has been ill for several months at his home here. His condition has been serious for several days. He was very near death Sunday, it developed today, although the fact had been kept secret until his condition showed slight improvement.

His children, Fred and Warren Fairbanks, and Mrs. John W. Timmons, are at the bedside.

Dr. J. C. Macdonald, who has been attending the former vice-president, indicated that there was little hope for recovery. The physician and family refused to make any statement regarding the nature of the disease, but it is understood to be Bright's disease.
