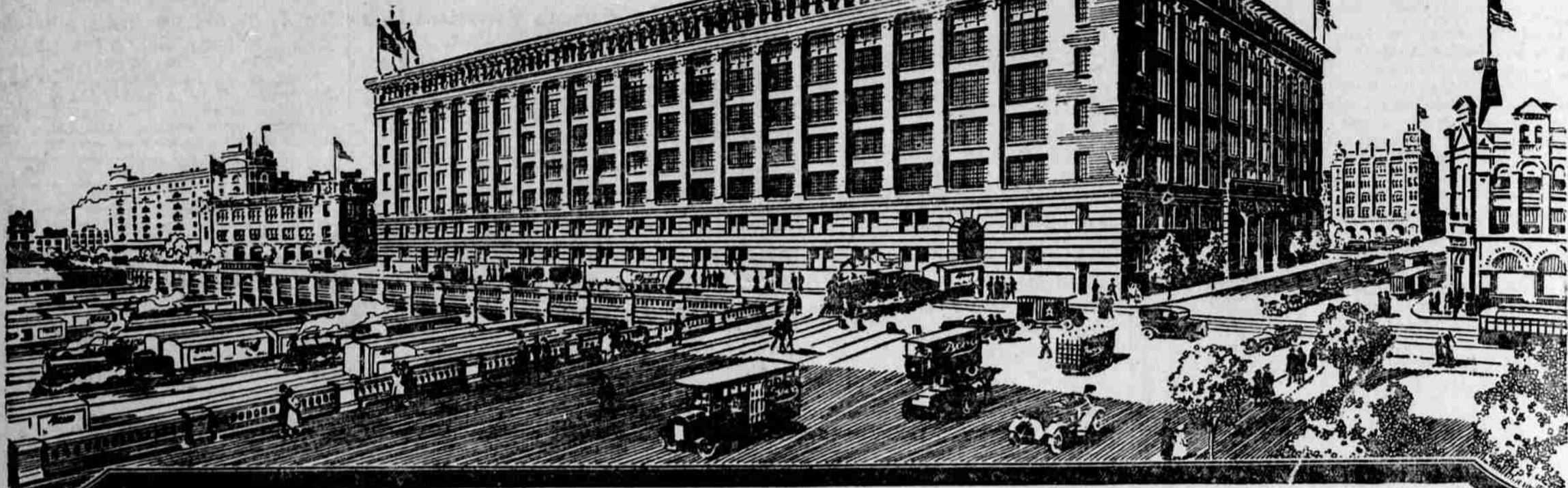

MILITARY POLICE ARE ON 'STILL' HUNT?

Much Suspicion Is Attracted by Peculiar Actions and an Investigation is Proceeding.

Just what connection the presence of the Oregon Military police in Eugene at the present time, have with the rumor-

COLOGNE RAIDED BY ALLIED AIR FORCES

Amsterdam, May 21.—Incomplete lists of the casualties recently inflicted by allied air raiders in Cologne, published by newspapers in that city, show 25 dead and 47 injured. It is believed that many bodies are still in the debris.

Twenty-three bombs were dropped in the heart of the city, it is said, wrecking several big buildings and causing a great panic.

The Cologne Volks Zeitung says it believes the raid was made in reprisal for German raids on allied cities.
