MABEL GIVES \$1,000 FOUR TIMES QUOTA

Little Lumber Town Keeps up Patriotic Work; Praised by County Campaign Committee

The little lumbering town of Mabel has once more set a mark for other places to shoot at, in its subscription to the Red Cross drive. Mabel's quota was tentatively fixed at \$250. The enterprising population of the town immediately got busy and raised the \$250 on the first day of the drive. But they did not stop there. They kept on subscribing until they had run their total up to \$1,029.25, or more than four times what was expected.

In recognition of the great work done at Mabel the Lane county campaign committee today sent the following telegram to the state headquarters of the drive, at Portland:

"The Ladies' Auxiliary of Mabel raised \$1,029.25, for the second Red Cross war fund in a few hours. One hundred per cent subscribed. Quota \$250. Mabel stands at the top in the state of Oregon per capita subscriptions to the Third Liberty loan. Population almost entirely employes of Coast Range Lumber company."

Mrs. J. P. Van Orsdel is secretary of the Mabel auxiliary. The drive was under the direction of Mrs. Van Orsdel and Miss Maude Allen. They were assisted in their work at the mill and at the lumber company's logging camp by Mrs. Arthur [Name], Mrs. James Taylor, Mrs. B. Fox, Mrs. C. C. Jacoby, and Mrs. W. Alden.

Portland Is Painted Red in Red Cross Campaign

George Quayle, assistant secretary of the local war board, returned Tuesday from Portland, where he had gone to consult state leaders on war activities. He states that the Portland Red Cross committee expects to go over the top Wednesday night.

He says that Portland is thoroughly aroused. The city woke up one morning to find the word "Help" surrounding a big red cross in the windows of every business building in Portland. This was the contribution of the painters' union. Its members had gathered quietly in the night time, and without solicitation, thus "painted the town red," as the contribution of the union to the cause. Two Chevrolet cars are among the donations to the cause in Portland, and will be sold for the benefit of the fund.

From all parts of the state reports were being received that the drive was well ahead of schedule.

Mr. Quayle reports that all restaurants at which he ate while in Portland were being conducted strictly in accordance with the rules laid down by the food administration.

RECTOR GIVES APPEAL TO ASSIST RED CROSS

Rev. Frederick G. Jennings Points to Value of Giving as an Aid to Allied Morale.

Among the stirring Red Cross messages delivered from the pulpits of Lane county on Sunday was one at the Episcopal church, Eugene, where Rev. Frederick G. Jennings, rector, made a strong appeal for contributions to the humanitarian cause.

Taking as his text the words of the Lord, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, my brethren, ye have done it unto me," the rector emphasized that the Red Cross is doing here on earth the kind of work that

Christ did and urged others to do 1900 years ago. The Red Cross, he continued, is the arms of mothers reached out to their sons to bind up their wounds and to comfort them.

"It presents to the world," said Mr. Jennings, "a new angle of view upon the Kultur of the Kaiser and his shrouds—a culture that is foreign to their pseudo-civilization."

"The Red Cross is translating the ideals of mercy, charity and peace into facts—into money and personal service. Greatest of all is the work that this humanitarian organization is doing in strengthening the morale of the allies. At such a crisis as this the Red Cross is bringing relief to the mind keeping up the morale. Because of their wonderful work men who have suffered from the unspeakable atrocities of the enemy and have been nursed back to strength by the Red Cross are eager to return to the trenches and "go over the top" again for a civilization whose ideals they have seen in practice. The enemy call upon God to assist them in their murder but Baal they cry, not God! We know not their god whose children destroy, ravish and kill. Another drive for Red Cross funds is on and we cannot do less than the men in the trenches who although they have made many drives at the enemy yet when the command comes for another drive bravely go forward. What would be the result if they hesitated to respond?"

"And they are not earning \$7 a day and up in their war work like many here at home! Their loyalty and courage is the only thing that prevents the same atrocities of Belgium and France being perpetrated in this country. Let us therefore 'go over the top' with them again and by supporting the Red Cross—at even a greater sacrifice than before—make permanent and enduring the peace for which they are fighting."

lady who took all the money she had saved for her burial expenses and put it into a Liberty bond.

Other members of Mrs. Shelton's team, which was one of the earliest to cover its territory, reported their enthusiasm over the way they were received. "Why, the people met us at the door," one reported. "Before we had time to tell them what we wanted, they said, 'Yes, we know. It's the Red Cross,' and we had the subscription almost before we could open our mouths."

Different from First Drive. The general comment was, that it is so different today from the spirit shown in the first Red Cross drive, last year. Then, said some of the workers, it was just like pulling teeth to get the money. Among the big subscribers to the fund today were Supreme Judge L. T. Harris, of Salem, and Mrs. Harris, who sent Chairman Gilstrap their check for \$50.
