European Champion Back to Boxing after 4 years.

Georges Carpentier, European heavy-weight champion before the war, but since it began one of the heroes of the French, has returned to boxing, and this photograph shows him in his teaching costume at the Ecole Militaire de Joinville Le Pont, where he trains French soldiers to box just as is being done in the American army. At the beginning of the war Carpentier was one of the great athletes in France. Then he took up flying and made a success of that. Four years of hard work broke him down and, refusing to be idle while he recuperates, he has taken up another line of effort for the government.

trenches, caught up with the Boches, killed the entire party guarding the prisoner and brought him back.

Second Assault Violent.

The second assault before Fontaine-Sous-Montdidier was as violent as the first, but the enemy was unable to penetrate the American lines. His counter attack then carried the Americans into the Boches' line which they held for more than an hour.

Near Cantigny, the Germans got such a hot reception that they did not attempt to repeat the assault. Observers reported heavy enemy losses, artillery, machine gun and rifle fire cutting down the advancing Boches who left a great number of dead in No Man's Land.

The three attacks netted the Americans five German prisoners.

American positions were considerably mauled by the enemy artillery and the troops are working hard to reconstruct them, in preparation for a resumption of the German assaults.

The fighting was extremely bitter. Opposing forces clashed, hand to hand, in the midst of smashed sand bags and caved in parapets. The Germans were loaded down with hand grenades, but the Americans rushed to close quarters and forced the enemy to use bayonets.

Soldiers declare the Germans were equipped with armored breast plates which turned aside a bayonet thrust—unless it was in the neck or the stomach.

One company counter attacking before Cantigny penetrated the German lines clear into the ruins of the village, where they remained until called back.

Details of Fighting Given.

This despatch is being written in a dugout in the rear of the front lines and reports of the details of the fighting are coming in, but slowly.

I just learned that three privates, B. Bowen of Kentucky; Joseph Lawrence of Allentown, Pa., and A. D. Melin of Providence, were among several who were buried for three or four hours when their dugout was struck by a high explosive shell. Their comrades dug them out under shell fire. When they were finally excavated, they popped out smiling. They were taken to the first aid station from which they soon departed.

During the early straining, prior to the attacks, rear areas were severely shelled. The field hospital described in a recent despatch where only the most severe cases are taken, was endangered by shells.

They broke within 300 yards of the buildings, but the women nurses continued ministering to the patients as though nothing unusual was going on.

American artillery leveled great stretches of the German trenches this morning in retaliation for the attacks. Heavy cannonading on both sides was still in progress as this despatch was filed.

DEFEAT GERMAN AIRMEN

With the American Army in Lorraine, May 27.—(Night)—Three American aviators defeated four German airmen in a spectacular battle over the lines today, destroying one enemy plane and driving the others back behind their lines.

The fight raged for a quarter of an hour, during which the machines constantly were engaged in thrilling maneuvers.

Just before the Germans fled, the wings of one of their machines was entirely shot away, so that the fuselage dropped like a plummet.

The above despatch is further proof of recent reports that the German aircraft are now being made of inferior material and are poorly constructed.

It is highly improbable that machine gun bullets could entirely destroy the wings of an airplane. It is believed the Americans' gun fire could only have weakened the wings so that they collapsed.

Germans Increase (Continued from page one)

crossed the Aisne between Vailly and Berry-Au-Bac, the French war office announced today.

"The French and British are facing very superior forces, but are drawing back progressively. The battle is going on furiously between La Vesle and the Aisne plateau sector, behind which reserves have arrived.

"Active shelling is going on in the Champagne and Woivre regions and along the right bank of the Meuse.

"A heavy German raid on French positions near Chambrettes failed."

With the French Armies in the Field, May 27.—(Night)—Resumption of the German offensive has not developed sufficiently tonight to establish whether the attack between Soissons and Rheims constitutes the principal assault, or is a covering operation for the real attack farther north.

American troops, which occupied positions in the Chemin des Dames sector, earlier in the year, had been replaced by British, against whom the Germans launched a portion of their attack. The attack involves the German crown prince's group of armies which were not engaged in the March offensive and which a few days ago consisted of four armies, one commanded by von Hutier, between Ailly-Sur-Noye and Noyon; von Boehm's army, between Craonne and Craonne; von Below's, between Craonne and Aubervilliers; and von Eimann's between Aubervilliers and Avocourt.

FRENCH COUNTER-ATTACK

London, May 28.—The Germans in their double attack which signaled resumption of the offensive, succeeded only in making gains at some points on the new battlefield between Soissons and Rheims, night statements declared. In

Flanders what slight progress they make was wiped out by French counter attacks, these reports said.

At one point in the Aisne region, the enemy succeeded in reaching Pont-A-Mais 14 miles east of Soissons, on the west bank of the Aisne, the French war office admitted in its night report. This represents an advance of slightly more than four miles.

About ten miles to the eastward, in the vicinity of Berry-Au-Bac, British troops were forced back to their second line positions, Field Marshal Haig's night report revealed.

Although the Germans attacked several points along the 40-mile front between Soissons and Rheims, they apparently were held except at the two places mentioned.

The German war office claimed capture of the entire Chemin des Dames, the famous highway which parallels the Aisne from a point seven miles north of Soissons to the vicinity of Berry-Au-Bac, at an average distance of about three miles north of the river. This would represent an advance of 20 miles on a front of about 20 miles.

Made along the six-mile front, from Loivre to Voormezele, resulted in a slight penetration of the positions near Dickebusch lake in the center, but the line was later restored by counter-attacks. The fight was still under way there when this report was filed.

The French war office reported violent cannonading in the Verdun sector, near St. Mihiel and on the Lorraine front. (American troops are holding portions of the line of these three fronts.)
