

SCOUT LEADER TELLS EQUIPMENT NEEDED

Necessary Articles for Boys to Take to Oakridge Named by Mr. Bagley.

A. R. Bagley, the Boy Scout executive of the city, has given out a list of the necessary articles for scouts who participate in the two weeks' camp which will be held at Oakridge commencing Monday, June 10. One of the essentials is that \$2.50 be deposited with Mr. Bagley by June 6. Mr. Bagley has given out the following as to the things needed:

"They must have two blankets, one comfort quilt, a change of clothes, one plate, preferably tin, one cup, a knife, a fork, a spoon, a dish-cloth, soap and a tooth brush. In addition each boy who wishes to go on the trip must have \$2.50 in the hands of the Y. M. C. A. not later than June 6, to be used in defraying necessary expenses, and also he must have his dues paid up to date, and a 'good clean gentlemanly record' to be given by investigation of the authorities.

Alien Enemies Must Register Friday and Saturday Next

Chief of Police C. R. Christensen wishes to call the attention of alien enemies to the fact that they must register if they desire to go within half a mile of any United States army or place where goods are being manufactured for the use of the United States army. The fact that they registered before him at the recent alien enemy registration has nothing to do with this registration and the securing of the permit necessary in this case.

The registration will be made by a federal officer who will come from Portland for the purpose. He will be at the police headquarters upon those days and those days only. Any alien enemy failing to secure such a permit will be liable to internment if he approaches within a half mile of the army or other battlefield place. The only way to secure a permit after that date will be to make a trip to Portland for the purpose.

smashed all the other attacks. As the boats were advanced, light and heavy guns laid down a fierce counter-barrage, virtually wiping out the first and second waves. All the reserve and support positions also were heavily shelled, preventing the enemy from reorganizing.

Two of the attacks were made frontally on the village. The others were made to the right and to the left.

The Americans now have a number of German machine guns and are pouring bullets from them into the enemy. The industry also are using both rifles which they captured. Machine guns, rifles and large quantities of ammunition taken in the capture of Caucigny were promptly turned against the Germans. The exact number of machine guns taken is not yet known.

Small groups of prisoners are still

coming in. Between beating off attacks, details are busily searching the cellars and dugouts in Caucigny. Nine were dragged from one hole this morning.

An accurate estimate of the German losses is not yet possible, but they are obviously heavy, not only in the first line, but in the rear organizations. There are indications that the losses in the village alone will exceed a thousand, exclusive of the losses in counter-attacks. All the German batteries were heavily gassed by American artillery again last night.

a flower on the grave of an American. The children of France are the best loved friends of the soldiers. The children are the first to greet the Americans as they arrive in a village. They are the last to wave good-bye as the boys from home march away.

American mothers, fathers and sweethearts may rely on the children of France today.

Washington, May 29.—A nation, united, paid solemn tribute on this memorial day to its heroes of the past and its heroes of the present.

In prayer and fasting, following out its president's request, the country took grave heed of the past and intense inventory of the present. The withered ranks of Civil War veterans, who went tenderly to place upon tombs of the fighters of other days a garland of memory, were joined by those of the present generation who honored the living heroes and the dead martyrs of today's contest with autocracy.

The lines of north and south, long since obliterated, cast no shadow on the observance of this national holiday. For the northland and the southland made of it a unified and consecrated time, sacred to the men of '64, but even more sacred to the boys of 1918, who fight not alone to save a nation, but to save a world.

President Wilson, following his own precepts, attended church during the morning, joining in prayer for victory to the cause of America and her Allies. Later in the national cemetery at Arlington he participated in the impressive ceremonies of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Down on the peaceful Potomac, two gigantic rose wreaths were set adrift, markers for the graves of the Louisiana dead. Daughters of the American Revolution launched the first, the crew of a British warship the second.

These and other solemn services marked the national capital's observance of the day; and throughout the land a determined folk joined in giving the last and tributes man can pay to man.

Soissons Is Center

than 10 miles on the Aisne front, according to the night communications issued by the French war office.

All but the western outskirts of Soissons were in the hands of the enemy, which had progressed at least six miles west of the Vesle river, the report said.

The German war office claimed capture of 25,000 prisoners, including a French and British general. The line of the German advance, according to night official statements, now extends southward from the region of Concy, Chateau, through Tervy to Soissons, southward through Amblef and Charrier to Longueval, eastward through Breuille to Thillois and northward to St. Thierry. Rheims, which the British are defending, is surrounded on three sides. Its evacuation is believed imminent.

Describing the American capture of Caucigny Tuesday morning, the German war office said:

"West of Mandelieu, the enemy during a local advance penetrated into Caucigny. On the Flanders front, only rearing operations were mentioned by Field Marshal Haig. He reported the repulse of enemy raids north of Enamel.
