Surely we who are left behind the battlefield should be glad to do anything we can to relieve the burdens of those suffering hardships we cannot imagine.

Oat and Corn Flour Bread.

50 per cent ground rolled oats,
50 per cent corn flour, both by weight.
3/4 cup liquid.
2 or 4 tablespoons fat.
4 tablespoons syrup.
2 eggs.
6 teaspoons baking powder.
1 teaspoon salt.
1 1/3 cups corn flour.
1 cup ground rolled oats.
Method:—Mix the melted fat, liquid, syrup and egg. Combine the liquid and well mixed dry ingredients. Bake as a loaf in a moderately hot oven for one hour or until thoroughly baked.
Nuts, raisins or dates may be added if desired.

Corn Flour and Rolled Oat Biscuits.

1 1/3 cups corn flour.
1 cup ground oats.
6 teaspoons baking powder.
1 teaspoon salt.
3 tablespoons fat.
1 cup liquid.
Mix dry ingredients together, rub in the fat, add the liquid, roll or pat lightly into biscuits. Bake immediately in a hot oven.

Chocolate Cake.

1-2 cup fat.
2-3 cup sugar.
3 eggs.
1 cup syrup.
3-4 cup milk.
1 teaspoon salt.
1 cup rice flour.
2 cups barley flour.
6 teaspoons baking powder.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
2 squares chocolate.
Cream the fat, sugar and egg yolks. Add the syrup and milk and mix well. Add alternately the liquid and the dry ingredients sifted together. Add flavoring and melted chocolate. Fold in well beaten egg white. Bake about one hour starting in a moderate oven. Increase the heat after 20 minutes.

Barley Spice Cake.

3 eggs.
3-4 cup milk.
1 teaspoon vanilla.
1-2 teaspoon ginger.
1-2 teaspoon cloves.
1 teaspoon allspice.
3-4 cups barley flour.
1 cup raisins.
Cream the fat, sugar and egg yolks. Add the syrup and mix well. Add alternately the liquid and the dry ingredients sifted together. Add the flavoring and fold in the well beaten egg whites. Bake for one hour in a moderate oven.

Barley Flour and Oatmeal Muffins

1 cup liquid.
1 tablespoon fat.
2 tablespoons syrup.
2 eggs.
4 teaspoons baking powder.
1 teaspoon salt.
1 1/2 cups barley flour.
3-4 cup ground rolled oats.
A Group of 50-50 Muffins Using No Wheat.

Other flours can be substituted for wheat flour in recipes for quickbreads if an equal weight is used. These muffins are 50 per cent one sort of substitute and 50 per cent of another substitute by weight. They have been tried out in the laboratory of the United States Food Administration.

Ground Rolled Oats and Cornflour.

1 cup liquid.
1 tablespoon fat.
2 tablespoons syrup.
2 eggs.
4 teaspoons baking powder.
1 teaspoon salt.
3-4 cup ground rolled oats.
1 cup cornflour.

Rice Flour and Barley Flour.

1 cup liquid.
1 tablespoon fat.
2 tablespoons syrup.
2 eggs.
4 teaspoons baking powder.
1 teaspoon salt.
1 cup rice flour.

Directions for Mixing These Muffins.

1 1/2 cups barley flour.
Add to the cup of milk or other liquid the melted fat, syrup and slightly beaten eggs; sift the salt, baking powder and flour together; use a coarse sieve so that no part of the flour is wasted. Combine the two mixtures, stirring lightly without beating; bake in a hot oven for 20 to 30 minutes depending upon the size of the muffins.

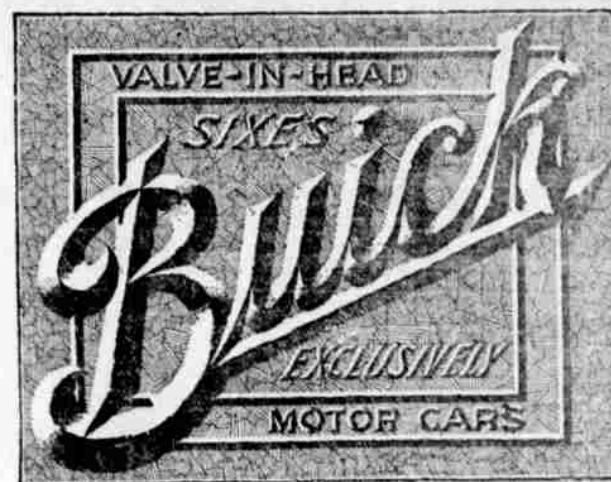
Devil's Quick Coffee Cake.

(With Barley Flour.)

3-4 cup barley flour.
1 1/4 cups white flour.
1-2 cup light syrup.
4 level teaspoons baking powder.
1 egg.
3-4 cup milk.
1-2 teaspoon salt.
1 1/2 rounded tablespoons cottoleone.
Cinnamon, allspice and cloves to taste.
Sift together flours, cinnamon and other spices, baking powder and salt. Add egg well-beaten and mixed gradually with milk. Melt cottoleone slowly and beat in the syrup. Add to first mixture. Bake in moderate oven, in shallow well-greased pan, about 25 minutes.

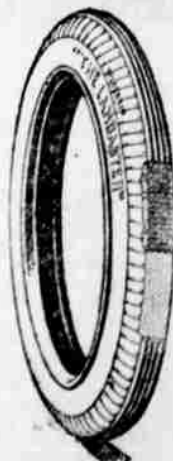
