Appraisement Is Filed.—The appraisement of the estate of John Bamford, deceased, was filed in the probate court on Saturday. The appraisers found that the estate consisted of no property except \$80 in bank, F. W. Moorehead, G. M. Jackson and C. B. Washburne were the appraisers.

Would Be Administratrix.—Julia Brown, of Junction City, has filed in the probate court a petition asking that she be appointed administratrix of the estate of Randolph Brown, deceased, who left property estimated at \$7000. The petition contains as appraisers the names of W. C. Washburne, C. B. Washburne and G. M. Jackson.

Alleges Cruelty.—Mrs. Elsie M. Dewey commenced suit in circuit court Friday against her husband, Carl M. Dewey, asking divorce on grounds of failure to support and cruel and inhuman treatment. She alleges that he compelled her to live with his parents, and was otherwise cruel to her.

River Is Very Low.—The Willamette river was very low throughout the month of May, according to the report of Lee Goetschius, government observer in this city. The mean stage was 8.5 above low water, a remarkably low stage for this time of year. The precipitation was also less than normal and Mr. Goetschius expresses belief that the season will be very dry.

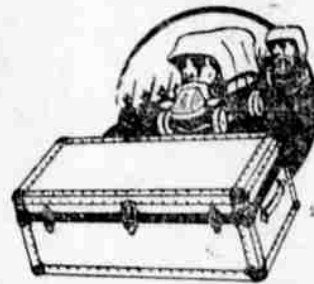

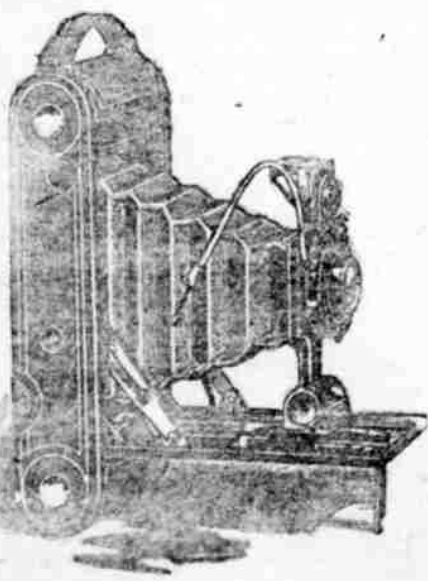
