

MEMORIAL TO TYPIFY OREGON WAR SPIRIT

Appreciation of Alma Mater for Sons Responding to Country's Call to Be Commemorated.

To typify the Oregon spirit during these stirring times, and to show Oregonians who have responded to their country's love and appreciation for her sturdy call, University faculty and students are planning the erection of a memorial which shall serve as a permanent commemoration of her brave men. The memorial will be in bronze and will immortalize and embody the very spirit

of the men so that it may live through all the years to come.

Roswell Dosch, instructor in the school of architecture, is working out his plan of the statue and will do all the work of construction. He does not know exactly what form his idea will take, but he does not want the statue to be a set figure, such as a soldier.

"When I came to the University," said Mr. Dosch yesterday, "one of the first things that impressed me was the wholesomeness and genuineness of the Oregon men and women. It is that spirit which I wish to breathe into my statue."

Work to be Done on Campus.

All the work on the statue up to the stage where it is to be cast in bronze, will be done right here on the campus. Students in the architecture department will be given the opportunity to do their share in the construction of the memorial. Thus, the committee's plan to make the whole thing truly representative of Oregon men and women.

The ordinary fee of a sculptor for

making such a statue as this would be about \$5,000, say the committee, but Mr. Dosch is offering his services as his contribution to this great work.

The committee, President P. L. Campbell, Dean Walker, Karl Outbank, Dr. John F. Boyard, Roswell Dosch, Dr. George Rebec and among the students, president of the student body, editor of the Emerald, president of women's league and three others to be chosen by the faculty, is enthusiastic over the memorial and plans to make it one of the biggest things the University has ever done.

An extensive campaign throughout the state to interest all the former students and friends of the University in the project will be launched soon. Much of the organization of this work will be done by the alumni.

\$6,000 Cost of Memorial.

The cost of the memorial according to present plans will be about \$6,000. It is planned to raise as much as possible of this amount on the campus. The senior class has contributed \$205 as the initial fund.

To arouse the interest of the student body in the memorial, the student committee, from the senior class, Cora Hordford, Clinton Thienes, Frances Frater, Walter Grebe, Leura Jerard, and Lurline Brown, is planning a tag day for next Friday. A large campus committee from all the class will sell tags for 25c each all day Friday, both on the campus and down town. If Mr. Dosch has the figure for his statue ready, a cut of the memorial will be placed on the tags.

"We expect ready response from the student body," said James Sheehy, president of the student body, this morning. "The memorial will be for all the students and we want them to feel that they have a share in it. We want them to become vitally interested in it and do all they can to help it along to successful completion."

1200 U. MEN IN ARMY

16 Faculty Members, 800 Graduates, 350 Oregon Ordinance Students.

Among the Oregon University Faculty students and alumnae now enlisted in the service there are sixteen faculty members, 800 graduates and former students of the University. Counting the 350 men trained in the ordinance courses at the University the total reaches at least 1,200. Among their number are several men and women in Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. work and in Red Cross service at home or abroad. There are 250 officers among the men enlisted in the service. At least one of the officers at present, Captain Walter R. McClure, has several times been under fire at the head of his company.

Rosenberg, instructor in architecture, now sergeant in camouflage unit U. S. army; Frederick Fritsch, instructor in architecture, now corporal in camouflage, U. S. army; Howard Annett, instructor in University school of music, now with ambulance unit, 531st division, Camp Lewis; C. C. Jeremiah, second lieutenant in the ordinance department, U. S. army; J. D. Foster, secretary of University employment bureau, now a first lieutenant in U. S. infantry; James MacPherson, secretary of University employment bureau, now in Y. M. C. A. work; Elizabeth F. Fox, dean of women, now in Y. W. C. A. work in France; H. K. Kingsbury, bookkeeper, now second lieutenant in U. S. infantry at Camp Lewis; H. H. Wheeler, professor of psychology, now first lieutenant in medical corps and chief psychologist at Fort Worth, Texas; A. C. Shelton, instructor in zoology, now second lieutenant in Bacteriologist base hospital at Camp Lewis; A. C. Hopkins, assistant professor of commerce, now first lieutenant in U. S. infantry; Ben H. Williams, social welfare section of the extension division now second lieutenant in Coast Artillery corps; Alfred Powers, director of extension division, now in the O. T. S. at Camp Lewis; Earl Kilpatrick, extension division, now development director of Red Cross, of northwestern division; and Colin V. Dymont, formerly professor of journalism now in Red Cross work in France.

AUSTRIANS PREPARE TO ATTACK ITALIANS

Swiss Observers Report Increasing Movement of Infantry and Artillery South.

Geneva, June 3.—Swiss troops on the eastern frontier, report a constantly increasing movement of Austrian infantry and artillery from Bozen and Trento southward toward the Italian front.

At St. Elvise pass, where the Austrian, Italian and Swiss frontiers meet, the Austrian garrison has been greatly strengthened.

Emperor Karl is going to the Italian front this week, according to a dispatch from Vienna.

Rome, June 3.—Premier Orlando is visiting the Italian front and imparting cheer to the soldiers, in view of the impending Austrian offensive.

Washington, June 3, General Pershing reported 36 casualties to the war department today, divided thus:

Four killed in action; three dead of wounds; two dead from accident; seven dead from disease; three wounded slightly; 10 wounded severely; one wounded slightly.

Lieutenant F. W. Johnson, South Bethlehem, Pa., was killed in action.

No names of Oregon boys appear in the list.

trating armor plate—many hits, close together, tending to weaken the power of resistance.

Major Schriberhofen in the Han-burger Nachrichten, declares that developments will be influenced by the French reserve force which Foch has brought up from great distances and which he hesitates to throw into the battle.

GERMANS HELD IN CENTER

London, June 3.—Employing 250,000 men as a shelter to their southern flank, the Germans are trying to push westward between the Oise and the Marne, it was indicated in the night official statements.

They have made some progress on this front, between Noyon and Chateau-Thierry, but are being held in the center along the Marne and on the eastern flank between Dormans and Rheims.

The battle line now apparently runs from Sempians (two miles south of Noyon) southward through Carpentras to Moulin-Sous-Touvent, southward through Fontenoy to Chaudun, southward through Corey to Faveroles, southward through Torcy and Bouesches to Chateau-Thierry, eastward along the north bank of the Marne to Verneuil, northward through Champlait to Champigny, and thence northward around Rheims in a semi-circle, at an average distance of two miles from the city.

In the capture of Fere En Tardenois, on the eastern flank which the French announced Thursday, the German war office claimed the acquisition of a Franco-American depot, including far over half a million shells, invaluable supplies of pioneer and telephone materials, and over a thousand vehicles. This probably refers to munitions manufactured in America which were being used by the French armies.

Field Marshal Haig last night reported only artillery activity on the British front in Picardy and Flanders.

Building, artillery and aerial operations were reported on the Italian front.

PERSHING ENTERS DENIAL.
Washington, June 3.—General Pershing's communique of June 2, made public today, denies the German official report that Franco-American depots were captured by the enemy.

"The German official communique," Pershing said, "says, 'Franco-American depots of numerous extent entered into our possession at Fere En Tardenois.'"

"This statement is absolutely untrue, there being no American depots in that region."

BRITISH REPULSE RAID.
London, June 3.—A hostile raiding party was repulsed south of Villers-Bretonneux, Field Marshal Haig reported today.

DR. STANFIELD WILL DELIVER SERMON

Portland Divine Will Deliver Baccalaureate Address to University Graduating Class.

Dr. Joshua Stanfield, D. D., of Portland, will give the baccalaureate sermon to the class of 1918 of the University of Oregon on Sunday, June 16, in Villard hall. Dr. Stanfield is the pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church, of Portland, where he has been for a year and a half. His former pastorate was in Indianapolis, Indiana, where he was for 16 years pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church.

This is the first time Rev. Dr. Stanfield has addressed an audience of University of Oregon students, but not the first time he has spoken in Eugene. The subject of the baccalaureate sermon has not been announced as yet, but no doubt will be made public soon.

Dr. Stanfield has two daughters who are this year attending the University, Elizabeth Stanfield, of the freshmen class, and Mrs. Thomas Campbell Jr., a member of the junior class. It is probable that Dr. Stanfield will motor down from Portland, taking his daughters back with him at the end of the school year.

University Student to Train Hood River Home Guards

Bob McNary, a member of the junior class of the University, has accepted a position for the summer at Hood River. He will have charge of the Home Guards at that place. Colonel Leader, who is supervising the Home Guard work throughout the state, obtained the position for McNary to take effect upon the completion of the school year. No organization has been started as yet, so the entire task will be left to McNary.

Besides drilling the battalion, he will work during the day. He has been assured of a good job, so will leave as soon as the college term is over.

Crew of Schooner

marines were first sighted at a distance of about three hundred yards. They circled around the American vessel and hoisted the German naval ensign.

The schooner was making about three knots an hour in a light breeze and the submarines had no trouble in making her halt. One shot was fired across the vessel's bows from a gun mounted on the forward deck of one of the U-boats.

Just as the schooner halted, the smoke of a steamer was seen on the horizon. One submarine immediately sheered off and made away in pursuit.

The other U-boat came closer along, side and the commander shouted through a megaphone, giving the Americans ten minutes in which to leave their vessel.

The submarine launched a small boat, rowed alongside the schooner, planted bombs in the hold and blew up the ship.

A report that one steamer has been destroyed was received here today. The crew of the steamer Cole described how one of the submarines went in pursuit of a steamer, the smoke of which was seen.

Other Ships Reported Sunk.

A steamer and several other ships were said to have been sent to the bottom at various points along the coast as far north as Nantucket Shoals.

Captain H. G. Newcombe of the Edwin H. Cole, declared that two U-boats flying the German naval ensign, captured his ship after firing a shot across his bows; gave the men ten minutes to abandon ship, then blew up the vessel with bombs.

As the Americans were taking to the small boats, they saw one of the submarines turn aside and start off in pursuit of a steamer.

Officials of the port of New York ordered all ships to remain in the harbor. The submarine net was swung across the harbor entrance. This followed receipt of information that a number of ships, including three schooners, had been destroyed.

The Maritime Exchange is understood to have a list of fifteen vessels which have been sunk. It will be made public when permission from naval authorities is secured.

Sailors of the Cole had no opportunity to talk to the Germans, but they declared the U-boats were very bold; that they carried guns forward and remained on the surface of the water to get greater speed.

The Ward liner Esperanza arrived here today without having seen submarines. The captain said he was detained at Havana fifteen days on account of submarines being reported nearby.

At Boston, the collector of the port received information that one of the submarines had been caught and that it was being taken to New York by naval vessels.

TO SEE THE ECLIPSE

STEEL FREIGHTER LAUNCHED.

San Francisco, Cal., June 3.—The \$8,000 ton freighter Isanti was moored to the wharf at the Shaw-Batcher shipyards here today, having been launched successfully last yesterday. The vessel is the first of four steel vessels to be launched from the yards which were opened in December.

INSTALLATION JUNE 5

New Officers to Take Hold at Last Student Assembly of College Year.

The University of Oregon, at the last student body assembly of the year, which will be held in Villard next Wednesday morning, June 5, officers for the school year of 1918-19 will be installed by President Jimmy Sheehy. The girls' band will make its last appearance of the year at the assembly with a program of several numbers. Other business to be brought up at this meeting is a definite report by President Sheehy of the plans for a student-body memorial to the University of Oregon men who have enlisted in the service of their country. President Sheehy will not make this report public until the time of the student body meeting.

An amendment to the student body constitution concerning the present tennis regulations may be presented at this meeting, according to President Sheehy.

"I do not know just what the resolution or amendment may aim to change in the present tennis arrangements," said he, "but I have heard rumors from students on the campus that some change probably will be brought up at the next meeting."
