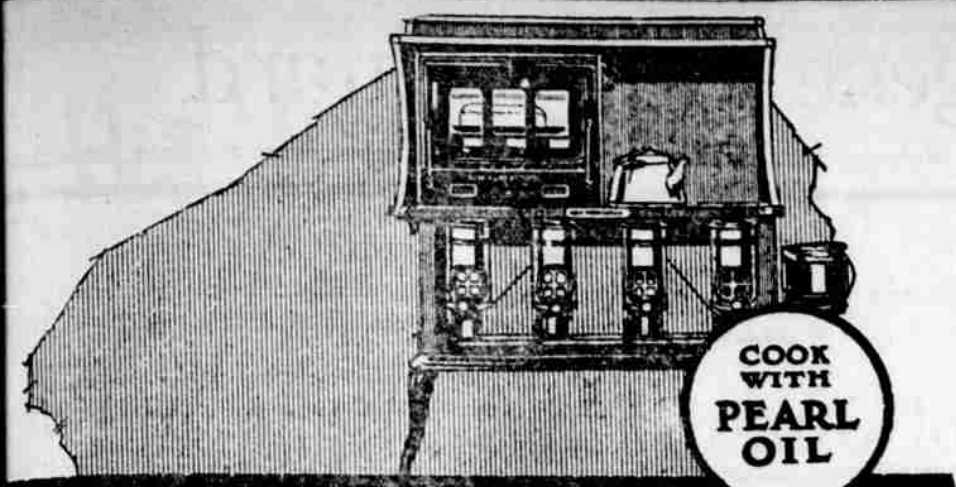

RAILROAD ENGINEERS TO BE SENT FRANCE

Five New Regiments and Nine
Battalions to Augment Those
Now in Service.

Washington, June 6.—Five new regi-
ments and nine battalions of railroad
engineers to augment those already in
France, are to be completed under
Director of Military Railways S. M. Fel-
ton. When organized, 50,000 American
railway men will be on construction and
operation work in France.

One hundred and sixty millions have
been spent for supplies and equipment,
including 1727 engines, 22,639 freight
cars, 359,000 tons of steel rails, con-
struction of docks and terminal facilities.

The nine original regiments selected
from chief railway cities have been in
France since August last. The Chicago
regiment, originally listed as the third,
has been dubbed the lucky thirteenth,
having been changed to the thirteenth
on Friday, July 13, landing in England
on August 13, and getting as its first
engine No. 13.

School Teacher Murderess
Under Care of Physicians

Waukesha, Wis., June 6.—Grace Lusk,
school teacher murderess, remained in
her cell today unattended. Until June
18 she will be under constant surveil-
lance by three physicians, charged with
determining the condition of her mind.
According to nurses, Miss Lusk has
shown improvement in the past two
days, but was unable to appear in court
yesterday at the hour originally set for
hearing what her punishment for shoot-
ing Mrs. Mary Roberts would be.

SUPPRESS NEGRO RIOT
HENRIETTA, Okla., June 6.—Neg-
roes in Salem, near here, were back at
work today, their incident riot broken
up by home guards from Henrietta.
Guardmen who rushed to Salem yes-
terday on reports of an Indian uprising
against the military draft, found only
negroes objecting to issuance of flour
cards. There has been no bloodshed.

MINING TOWN IN FLAMES
Jerome, Ariz., June 6.—A fire which
threatens to destroy the entire east side
of Jerome is raging. Fire fighters are
being rushed from all nearby mines and
smelters to aid the local firemen in
checking the blaze, which threatens to
wipe out a big section of the business
district. The buildings in the path of
the flames are mainly of frame con-
struction.

JOSLIN TO TRANSFER TO DALLAS OFFICE

Manager of Gas Company is
Given Promotion. Though He
is Sent to Smaller City.

H. A. Joslin, manager of the Oregon
Power company's interests in Eugene,
has been transferred to Dallas, where he
will be manager for the company in that
district, according to an announcement
made last night by Elmer Dover, of Ta-
coma, president of the Mountain States
Power company, which owns the Oregon
Power company.

While Dallas is a smaller city than
Eugene, the company's business there is
much larger than here, since the sale
of the company's electrical business in
Eugene to the city, and Mr. Joslin's
transfer is a promotion. Mr. Joslin was
taken from Eugene as a result of a num-
ber of changes in resident managers in
Willamette valley cities.

J. L. White, who has been manager at
Albany, has resigned and will engage in
business for himself at Seattle. He will
be succeeded by C. U. Steelquist, who
has been manager at Dallas. Mr. Joslin
will be transferred to Dallas. Fred
Brown, an employee from the company's
Tacoma office and an experienced gas
manager, will take over the supervision
of the Eugene business.

"The company's business in the Wil-
lamette valley shows a very satisfactory
improvement over last year," Mr. Dover
stated, last night. "It has been increas-
ing slowly, but steadily in every town
where we have interests."

Mr. Joslin will leave for Dallas next
week. Mr. Brown has arrived in Eugene,
but will return to Tacoma next week to
bring his family to this city.

German Hope Is That We
Are Bluffing, Siamse Asserts

San Francisco, Cal., June 6.—Ger-
many is pinning its hopes to the claims
of the militarist leaders that America
is bluffing instead of fighting, according
to Prince Traidos Prabandhi, cousin of
the king of Siam and, until Siam declared
war on Germany, Siamese ambassador
to Berlin. He was in San Francisco to-
day en route home, having left Berlin
a month after his country declared war.
The prince would not discuss food
conditions in Germany further than to
say the children are suffering from the
use of diluted milk.

PARK BOARD PLEADS FOR GREEN PARKINGS

At Meeting Held Thursday
Night Appeal to People is
Framed by Officials.

The Eugene Park board, at a meeting
held Wednesday evening, decided to ask
the people of the city to try and keep
their parking and lawns green through-
out the entire summer, instead of letting
them dry up as is too often done. They
also ask that all lawns be mown and
kept in presentable condition. The appeal
follows:

"Under a city ordinance passed some
time ago, supervision of trees and park-
ings in the city was turned over to the
park board, with power to have trees
taken out or pruned and cared for. The
park board was to act with the property
owners in every way possible to improve
the appearance of the city's streets,
parkings and homes.

"At a meeting of the park board held
last week, it was decided to ask and
urge property owners not to neglect this
work as many did last year. We should
begin at once. Trees should be pruned
now as in many places the branches are
already hanging low and interfering with
the carrying of umbrellas and parasols.

"Trees should be trimmed to a height
of eight or 10 feet, taking out all dead
branches, also branches that run ir-
regularly through the top of the tree.
Don't ruin trees by cutting the top off,
causing many new and small branches to
start just below, thereby spoiling what
would naturally be a uniform and well
balanced tree.

"Parkings should be kept mowed and
watered. Where the mowing has been
neglected use a scythe and then smooth
up with lawn mower.

"In watering a lawn don't run the
water through an ordinary nozzle but
attach a spray nozzle of some kind and
let the water run until the ground is
well soaked, and once a week is often
enough to keep the lawns and parkings
green."

"One hour each day devoted to this
work will not only give pleasure to family
and friends, but will add to health, sleep
and digestion. It will also prove a valu-
able object lesson to the children in the
home.

"We owe this much to any community
in which we might live, but let us do a
double duty by making our home city all
that is possible along civic lines. While
our boys are drilling and fighting for us
let's keep the home fires burning and
along with that keep our lawns and park-
ings green."

Seven Killed in Action, Is Report by Gen. Pershing

Washington, June 6.—The casualty
list issued by the war department today
contains 34 names, divided as follows:
Killed in action 7, dead from wounds
3, dead from disease 4, dead from acci-
dent 3, wounded severely 12, wounded,
degree undetermined, 1, wounded slightly
3, missing in action 1.

Lieutenant A. P. H. Sage, Memphis,
Tenn., died of wounds. Lieutenants
Willard D. Hill, Cleburne, Tex., and
Bernard C. Wolcott, Binghamton, N. Y.,
were injured severely.

No names of Oregon boys appear in
the list.
