Pact With Germany Is Not Considered By Japan

Tokio, June 6.—Japan has never dreamed of an after the war pact with Germany, declared resolutions passed by the Shunjuikai, an organization of representatives of newspapers and news agencies in Tokyo.

Japan will "adhere to the sensible Anglo-Japanese alliance," declare the resolutions and will co-operate with the allies in the prosecution of the war against a common enemy.

The resolution was brought about by rumors that Japan might be looking forward to a post-bellum pact with Germany.

88,000 Men Are Called For Service in Canada

Ottawa, Ont., June 7.—Eighty-eight thousand men have been called to call under the military service act, and 73,000 have complied, according to figures available today. There has been a great increase in the number of recruits in Quebec. It is now believed that the 100,000 to be raised under the act will be with the colors before parliament convenes.

GET SMOKED GLASS READY FOR ECLIPSE

Get your smoked glass ready for the eclipse tomorrow. It will be impossible to watch it without some such device, and it would be injurious to the eyes to try. It will be like gazing directly into the sun at any other time.

The eclipse will begin at 2:39, new time in Eugene, and the greatest obscuration will be at about 4 o'clock.

Professor H. E. McAllister advises the use of sun developed and fixed photographic films as the best thing through which to view the eclipse. Any uniformly colored, but partially transparent substance which will protect the eyes from glare will do.

The darkness will not be dense at any time and no scientific observations of any sort can be had at Eugene, but many will watch the phenomena out of curiosity.

A number of the University professors will visit the path of totality to observe the event.

A party of scientists from the University, consisting of Professors H. E. McAllister, O. F. Stafford, R. M. Winger and John F. Bovard, left Friday morning by automobile for the path of the total eclipse, to take observations. Their exact destination will depend upon their luck in traveling.

MARINES HIT HUNS' LINE HARD

wood, the boches then re-taking the wood beyond in fierce counter-attacks.

I was at brigade headquarters when the report came of the counter-attacks. "Hold on, hang on, Sisy! We're coming out to help you," was the cheery word a major phoned back, though he himself was near exhaustion from lack of sleep.

A few minutes later came reports from various companies that they were reaching their objectives and establishing communication with each other. In the meantime, trench mortars were ordered up and blew up boche positions that were still holding out.

The flash of artillery lighted the sky all night. The banging of guns was constant.

At dawn I went to an advanced position at the extreme right. The German artillery was becoming more active.

Practically all the fighting had been carried on through wheat fields and woods. The Americans would rush ahead a little way, pause to resist a counter-attack, and then rush on again.

The boches clung to the railway station at Bourches for several hours. Finally the American rush could not be denied and our boys swept into the village, fighting their way through the streets, storming the station and winning control of the railway.

Bourches, which has been fought over several times in the new Marne battle, is about four miles west of Chateau-Thierry. Belleau is about two miles north and slightly west of Bourches. Belleau wood lies between the two villages. Torcy is about half a mile northwest of Belleau. Bussieres is a mile west of Torcy. Neully-La-Poterie is two miles and a half west of Bussieres. Neully wood lies south of the village. The railway captured by the Americans runs northwesterward from Chateau-Thierry, through Bourches, Belleau, Torcy, Bussieres, Neully and Vaux, crossing the Ourcq and Neufchelles.

GERMANS PUSHED BACK
Paris, June 7.—"Fierce fighting is still going on northeast of Chateau-Thierry, where French and American troops have pushed the Germans back," the French war office announced today.

Allied gains in other parts of the front, including the re-capture of Bigny by the British, were reported.

"Between the Ourcq and the Marne local operations are going on in the region of Neully-La-Poterie and Bussieres," the communique said.

"The French progression continued. The French took Viny and the woods to the east, Neully-La-Poterie station and the northern border of that village.

"Further south the Americans took ground on the Torcy-Belleau-Bourches front.

"North of the Aisne, French night attacks took Le Pont, west of Fontenoy.

"South of the Aisne, French positions were re-taken east of Ambly.

"West of Chateau-Thierry a sharp

French attack gained hill 204.

"Between the Marne and Rheims, the British re-took the village of Bigny, inflicting heavy losses.

"North of Montdidier (on the Picardy front, where Americans are engaged) and west of Noyon, French troops took prisoners in raids.

"There was intermittent cannonading on the rest of the front."

With the French Armies on the Marne, June 6.—Both yesterday's and today's fighting confirms that the Germans are checked everywhere.

Their present attacks, which are purely local, are attaining no results, while French counter-attacks invariably result in both prisoners and advantageous rectification of local positions.

The first and second divisions of the Prussian guard, after trying four days to advance along both sides of the Ourcq to turn the forest of Villers-Cotterets, from the south, were completely thrown back by French counter-attacks, with heavy losses.

German night bombing squadrons are now using illuminating bombs attached to parachutes.

ALLIES ADVANCE LINES

London, June 7.—Allied forces advanced their lines at two points on the western portion of the Marne battle-front yesterday and re-captured positions which the Germans had temporarily occupied on the eastern part of the front, night official statements reported.

"Between the Ourcq and the Marne an attack carried out by French and American troops enabled us to advance our lines about one kilometer in the region of Neully-La-Poterie and Bussieres," the French communique said.

"We took 270 prisoners, including 10 officers." (This refers to the advance made by American marines northwest of Chateau-Thierry. Staff dispatches report an advance of two to four kilometers, on an eight-kilometer front.)

French troops, aided by tanks, advanced their lines west of Longpont (nine miles southwest of Soissons).

The Germans delivered a series of local attacks between Rheims and the Marne. They were completely checked at Champlat (five miles north of the river), but occupied Bigny (three miles north of Champlat). A British counter-attack regained Bigny.

Southwest of St. Euphrase (two miles northeast of Bigny), the French re-captured ground which the Germans had gained during the morning.

The German war office continues to ignore the presence of Americans on the Marne front. Referring to the French and American gains, Berlin said:

"On the battlefield there were local engagements northwest of Chateau-Thierry and on the Aisne river."

The Germans claimed that since May 27 they have taken more than 55,000 prisoners, 636 cannon and more than 2000 machine guns.

Field Marshal Haig reported the repulse of enemy attacks in the neighborhood of Loere, on the northern edge of the Flanders front, by French troops.

Lively artillery fighting was reported on the Italian front.

In the Balkans there was mutual cannonading between Lake Doiran and the Cerna.

AMERICANS ARE HONORED
With the American Army in Lorraine, June 7.—The following Americans have been awarded the distinguished service cross for "conspicuous heroism":

Lieutenant G. B. Redwood, Corporal H. J. Mongey, Privates E. V. Armstrong, B. H. Bolt and C. L. Shumait.

While on patrol duty they invaded the enemy trenches, captured twice their number of Germans, drove off a rescue party and brought the prisoners back to the American lines. Valuable information was obtained from the prisoners.

Lieutenant C. B. Holmes and Sergeant J. A. Murphy, who crawled through 20 strands of enemy wire, leaped upon a German sentry and brought him back across No Man's Land.

Corporal E. T. Burch, who rescued a wounded comrade under a heavy barrage, Captain G. R. Hulst and Lieutenants D. Macassar and P. M. Cloudy, engineer officers, who coolly continued their work under shell fire when they could have retired.

ARTILLERY IS ACTIVE
With the American Army in Lorraine, June 6.—There were lively artillery duels in this region last night, American batteries effectively neutralizing the German bombardment.

SHIP PRODUCTION GAINS
Washington, June 7.—Exceeding the ship production of April by 122,000 tons, the Emergency Fleet corporation turned out 343,450 deadweight tons in May, the United States shipping board announced today. There were launched during the month 39 steel ships of a deadweight tonnage of 228,750, and 32 wooden ships totalling 115,700 tons.

HUNS TO TRY FOR PEACE
Paris, June 7.—"It is reported that most of the German political parties have agreed upon the desirability of offering peace to the allies," the Echo de Paris declared today.

"Chancellor Hertling will make a very sensational speech in the reichstag room."

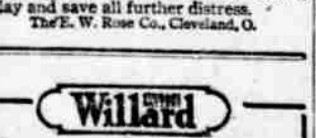
