This bonus is in addition to the 8 per cent bonus payable June 1 and January 1.

8,000-Ton Steamship Is Launched at Seattle Yard

Seattle, Wash., June 7.—On the waters of Elliott Bay, the 8,800 ton steamship West Cahoon was riding today with hundreds of skilled workmen aboard to put on finishing touches, following the launching late yesterday afternoon by the record breaking Skinner-Eddy Corporation, just 54 working days after the keel had been laid. This cuts down the world's launching record one day. The best previous record on an 8,800 ton standard steel United States shipping board freighter was made by the Skinner-Eddy workmen recently on the West Llanga.

First Coddling Moths Seen and Spraying Should Begin

The first coddling moth appeared yesterday, and C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector, advises the farmers and orchardists to at once spray their apple and pear trees. Mr. Stewart says that those who have sprayed in the immediate past for scab with lime and sulphur need not use this material this time, but those who did not spray should use lime and sulphur with the arsenate, 1 to 55. They should also use the arsenate, 1 to 50.

EMPEY entered the world at Ogden, Utah December 13, 1883, spent his childhood on a ranch near Cheyenne, Wyo., lived for a time in Richmond, Va., and Canada, and was educated in the public schools at Brooklyn, N. Y., where he won recognition as a football and baseball player. MADE his start as an adventurer and soldier of fortune at the age of seventeen when he joined a schoolmate in "a trip to South America" on a tramp steamer, which evolved into a "Shanghai" expedition that took them around Cape Horn and into many perilous experiences. UP in three years in the U. S. Navy, six years in the regular U. S. Cavalry, saw active service on the Mexican border in 1911, quit with the rank of Sergeant-Major and returned to civil pursuits in the east, later serving for seven years as a National Guardsman in New York and New Jersey. ENLISTED in the Royal Fusiliers of London in December, 1915, to avenge the sinking of the Lusitania, went to France and served eighteen months in the front line trenches, became a Bomber and Machine gunner, was promoted to a Sergeant for bravery and was wounded seven times going "over the top." EARNED for America to enter the war on the side of civilization and when she did, came back with his wounds, wrote "Over the Top" an epic of the trenches, recruited thousands of men, sold \$10,000 in Liberty Bonds, raised over \$50,000 for "smoke" funds and went in motion pictures to show through the Vitaphone production of "Over the Top," just "what we are up against over there."
