

GIVES PARENTS DUE CREDIT FOR WORK OF HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS

Former City Superintendent L. R. Alderman Declares They Should be Specially Honored on Commencement Days.

It was an interesting feature of the commencement exercises of the Eugene high school held last night at the First Methodist church that L. R. Alderman, city superintendent of schools of Portland, who was the speaker of the occasion, was superintendent of the Eugene schools when many of the class entered school, and as he said, "saw their real commencement."

Mr. Alderman, in his address, paid tribute to the parents of the pupils declaring that they deserved respect, and other honors fully as much as the pupils themselves, because of the sacrifices they had made to permit them to finish the course, as well as the task it had been in some instances to hold the youngsters in school. Mr. Alderman called the attention of the class to the fact that the education they had received in the Eugene high schools is equal to that given by Yale and Harvard less than 100 years ago.

Preparation and service, were the key notes of the address to the class. He expressed the opinion that there should be a volunteer enlistment in the United States forces abroad, but that each young man should be kept and trained in school.

Mr. Alderman declared that nothing can be obtained without hard work. He urged the class not to make hasty judgments, but to learn all facts before doing so.

The class roll carries the names of 67 graduates. Of these five, Earl Baker, Clarence Franz, Willis Kays, Ardis McFarland and Robert Stewart are now in their country's service. The roll also includes over twenty who completed the course in January last, but who did not receive their diplomas at that time. Some of them were present to receive their diplomas, but others were scattered, working at different places. Several of the graduates of the commercial department have already secured positions.

The honor students are Clara Evans and Ray Butler. Honorable mention for exceptional scholarship was received by Vera Campbell, Paul Cook, Margaret Bell, Elizabeth Henderson, Aloysius Hoffman, Ruth Tuck and Glenn Walkley.

HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS EARN FOR RED CROSS

Marcola Young People Turn In \$65 as Result of Day Spent Working for Cause.

The vacation which the high school enjoyed on Friday, May 31, proved to be profitable for the Red Cross. As was announced, the school secured jobs for the day and turned over the proceeds for the Red Cross. Five boys and five girls hired out to plant potatoes for John Downing and earned \$15. Five boys borrowed Karl Volgamer's team and wagon and hauled away rubbish from several homes and mowed lawns making \$8. Girls did house work, washed windows, scrubbed floors and did numerous other jobs. Eva Titus set up a shoe shining stand in front of the ice-cream store and made the sum of \$4. It cost some of the men who had unusually large feet the enormous sum of fifty cents to get their shoes shined. The total amount earned was \$65. On Saturday evening the high school closed its Red Cross campaign by giving a dance at the M. W. A. hall. Ice-cream and punch were sold. The total receipts for the evening was \$70. The grand total for the work day and dance was \$135 and the amount which the school cleared to turn over to the Red Cross is \$94. The high school wishes to thank the community for their hearty cooperation.

Marines "Go Over Top" in Park at Oakland, Cal.

"OVER THE TOP" WILL BE SHOWN IN EUGENE

Sergeant Arthur Guy Empey Appears as Star in Photo Production of His Book.

"Over the Top," a Vitagraph super-feature founded on Sergeant Arthur Guy Empey's famous war book of the same title, will be shown at the Rex theatre Thursday, Friday and Saturday, June 13, 14 and 15.

Sergeant Empey, probably the best known soldier of all the millions who have fought in the trenches of France to stem the tide of German barbarism, appears as the star of "Over the Top," and he is said to enact vividly the stirring experiences met by the French and British who held the lines against the Boches in the first mad months of the war.

"Over the Top," the first authentic reproduction of the drama and tragedy that is the war, has been hailed as one of the greatest photoplays in the history of motion pictures, and is ranked as the foremost of all the super-productions of the screen because of the personality of the star and the importance of the play as a contribution to the historical phase of the war and its relation to the war work of the United States. Because, a regular army training camp was used in making the trench scenes and American regulars were employed in the mimic battles, the play has received semi-official recognition from the war department, and it thus takes a place in the great machinery of the government scheme of training the National Army and the people to a realization of the task that lies before the United States.

Albert E. Smith, president of the Vitagraph Company of America, is credited with having scored one of the greatest accomplishments in the history of motion pictures in bringing Sergeant Empey and "Over the Top" to the screen. The little American who is a native of Ogden, Utah, was one of the first Americans to risk his life in the defense of civilization when the Germans made their assault on the freedom of mankind. He joined the First Royal Fusiliers of London, one of the contingents that made up "Kitchener's Army," and served eighteen months in the front line trenches as infantryman, machine gunner and bomber, and was wounded seven times in battle.

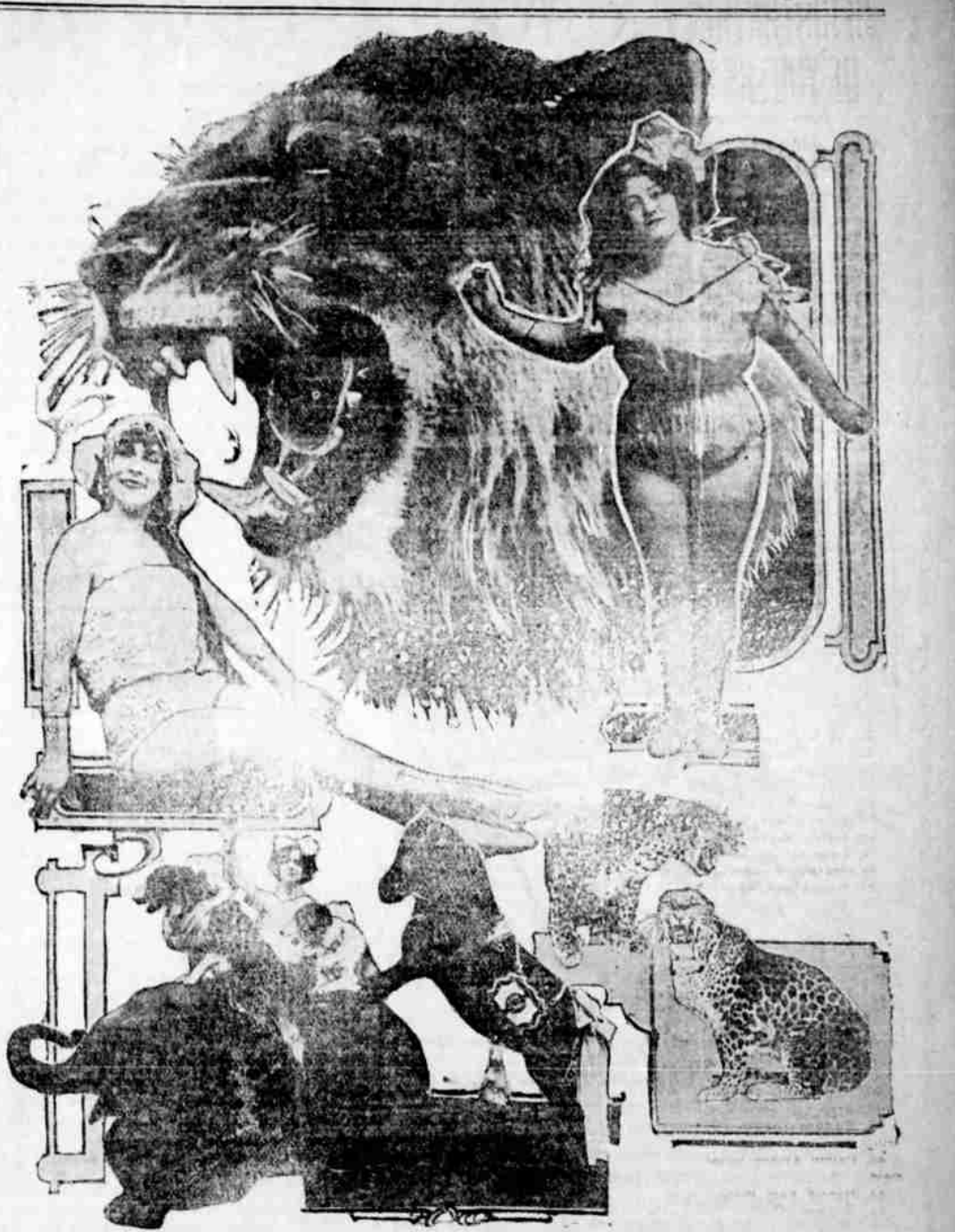
He was invalidated to America and just as soon as his physical condition permitted, he launched into patriotic work over here. He sold more than a million dollars of Liberty Bonds, aided the Red Cross and soldiers' smoke funds, and was a potent factor in recruiting the Regular U. S. army to war strength after we had entered the conflict. He wrote "Over the Top" at the behest of friends who were convinced his story had value as a patriotic document, and he took the lecture platform on the same basis. Overnight almost, this plain soldier with a plain story of the war became an international figure. He was in demand all over the country and he spoke to hundreds of thousands of people.

Manager McDonald of the Rex theatre, considers "Over the Top" the most important motion picture that he has ever shown to his patrons. That while there is a strong patriotic appeal in it, there is also a most thrilling drama in which the romance and humorous side-lights of the great struggle are brought into strong relief. He says the picture was more than three months in the making and that more than 7,500 U. S. regulars were used in the battle scenes. These scenes, made under the personal direction of Sergeant Empey, are said to show with great sharpness conditions as they actually exist in France and as they are being met today by the American legions.
