

Children's Day, Theme of Interest in Many of City Churches Sunday

WORKING BY THE JOB.
(A Saturday Sermonette.)

It is related of President Lincoln, during the dark days of the Civil war that he whimsically declared that there had been Union generals enough trying to put down the rebellion working by the day; what he wanted was a man to do it by the job.

A great psychological truth underlies the statement. It seems to typify the difference in spirit between the Americans, including the Canadians and Australians, and that of the English during the present war.

J. W. Palmer, the Y. M. C. A. Secretary who was in Eugene this week fresh from France stated that the English were very brave and went to the continent with a firm determination to give their lives for their country and saying that if they did not finish the job someone else would. The Americans, he said were very optimistic; they fully expect to do the job and then come back and do a life work at home.

The effect of the difference in belief is manifest in the men; English troops go in with a grim determination; American troops go in as to a feast. Jesus said: "It is the spirit quickeneth, the flesh profiteth nothing." It has certainly been the spirit which has quickened the American boys. They have shown that the flesh profiteth nothing; that "man-power" so-called by the material philosophers of the day, does not count against the spirit which, with a firm trust in the supremacy of right, is determined to do a thing and do it now.

The allies have been taught the necessity of keeping up the morale of their army by every means possible. That need is the greater because the mass of their people have for centuries let the employer, the nobility and the educated class think for them. They have been a nation of men who worked by the day; doing the same thing all their lives and expecting their son to do the same thing all their lives. They can be welded into a machine, but it is a machine. With the American it is different. He is the descendant of the most venturesome of the Europeans; the child of the man or woman who wanted to "work by the job" and left Europe for that reason. The American army is a machine, but as General Grant said of the army of Sherman, "It is the greatest army the world ever saw; it is as perfect a war machine as any army in Europe, and every part of the machine thinks."

CANNING CHICKENS ADVISED BY AGENT

Surplus Cockerels Should Be Sold or Killed While Young Says Federal Authority.

Save feed and money, and produce infertile eggs by killing off the surplus cockerels. Young cockerels should be disposed of as soon as they reach marketable size, i. e., from 1½ to 2½ pounds.

Can any surplus meat according to the following methods.

Canning without the bones: Kill fowl and draw it once; wash carefully and cool; cut into convenient sections. Place in wire basket or cheese cloth and boil until the meat can be removed from the bones; remove from boiling liquid and remove meat from bones; pack closely into glass jars; fill jars with pot liquid, after it has been concentrated one half; add level teaspoonful of salt per quart of meat, for seasoning; put rubber and cap in position, not tight; sterilize the length of time given for the particular type of outfit you are using.

10 to 15 pounds steam pressure 1

Remove jars, tighten covers; invert to cool and test the joint; wrap jars with paper to prevent bleaching.

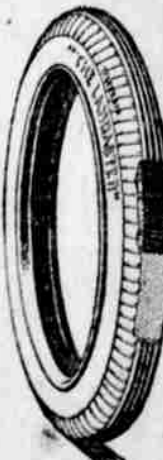
