On carried the Germans forward to a maximum depth of about three miles in the center, while the wings, as in their previous drives, were held with unimportant gains, it was indicated by the night official reports.

The greatest penetration was made at Reims-sur-Matz and Mareuil-la-Motte, where the Germans obtained a foothold, the French war office said.

On the west the enemy reached Rubecourt, Le Fretay and Mortener. On the right they reached Belval, Canezacourt and Ville.

Referring to this attack, the German war office announced that "west of the Oise we have captured the height of Gury and adjoining enemy lines." Gury is two miles north of Mareuil-la-Motte and represents an advance of only a mile.

Regarding the American successes northwest of Chateau-Thierry, Berlin said:

"Americans who attempted again to attack northwest of Chateau-Thierry were driven back beyond their positions of departure with heavy losses and prisoners were taken."

GERMAN FORCES CHECKED.

Paris, June 10.—The new German drive between Montdidier and Noyon slowed down before the French resistance yesterday evening and last night.

President Campbell States That

Made as to Military Work.

President P. L. Campbell returned Sunday morning from Portland, where he went to address the graduating class of the University School of Medicine, Friday evening. He says that he was very favorably impressed with the class which the medical department turned out this year and very proud of the record for patriotic service they have made. With but one or two exceptions, all of the 18 members of the class are enlisted in the Naval Reserve forces.

Saturday afternoon President Campbell journeyed over into Washington where he could view the eclipse from the path of totality and said Sunday that the trip was well worth the while.

While in Portland President Campbell interviewed many of the Home Guard officers regarding the summer training camp which is to open on the campus June 24, and found them very enthusiastic. "Most of the officers," he said, "are urging all of their men who can possibly spare the time to take advantage of the training to be given under Colonel Leader's supervision. Nor are they the only ones showing an active interest. We are getting many requests for further information regarding the camp every day, a large part of them from prominent men throughout the state. Many of the applicants are men above draft age who can force the time when the age limits will have to be extended and wish to get this preliminary training while they can."

To interview the many Portlanders who have asked for detailed information about the encampment, Colonel Leader left for that city Sunday evening and will remain there throughout today.

concentration of troops opposite the Toul sector and farther east, opposite Nancy. Boche aviators and aircraft guns are increasingly active in attacking American observation balloons.

Military men still hold the opinion that the Germans are not contemplating an attack in these sectors, but more likely fear an American push.

The Journal De Geneve, in a recent issue, announced that the Americans are holding forty kilometers (about 25 miles) of front in Lorraine.

According to prisoners, it is now necessary to take two of the present German divisions to make one of complete strength. The enemy lines are still sparsely held. American patrols find no difficulty in over-running No Man's Land. The first two Hun trenches are almost deserted every night.

English Does Not Believe In Fourth of July Bouts

San Francisco, Cal., June 10.—Billy Miske, back from Los Angeles, after his fight with Willie Meachin, says he will not box on the Fourth of July because he doesn't believe it shows the proper patriotic spirit. After his bout next Friday night with K. O. Kravinsky Miske will go east.

GRAVE FAG-AN-BALLAGH FIGHTERS AND MANY OTHERS WHOSE IRISH VALOR IS CLEARING THE WAY IN FRANCE



There are no better fighting men in the British Army than the Irish troops. They have proved this in many a hard-fought battle. The Royal Irish Fusiliers are called Fag-an-Ballagh boys, a Gaelic phrase indicating that they "clear the way." There are so many famous Irish regiments that all of them cannot be named here. Among the best are the Munster Fusiliers, the Royal Irish Fusiliers, the Irish Guards, the Dublin Fusiliers, the Royal Irish Regiment, the Royal Irish Rifles and the Connaught Rangers, with whom Brigadier General W. A. White of the British and Canadian Recruiting Mission saw strenuous service in South Africa.

These splendid soldiers come from both the north and south of Ireland. One of the first heroes of the present

war was Private Michael O'Leary, who single-handedly attacked and killed an incredible number of the enemy and won the Victoria Cross. O'Leary started his war service as a private in the Connaught Rangers, and he is now a captain. His whole career indicates that he does not know what the word fear means.

Another splendid fighting man who hails from Tipperary arrived in New York the other day to join the recruiting forces of the British and Canadian Recruiting Mission. His name is Captain Thomas F. MacMahon, of the Irish Guards, and he won the Military Cross in the Battle of the Somme. In September 1917 the Irish Guards saw very strenuous fighting in the Battle of the Somme. They carried all their objectives in

their attack and then found themselves flanked by a host of machine guns known as The Quadrilateral, and were subjected to a heavy fire from the rear.

"Finally," said Captain MacMahon, "a blooming tank rode over the wire entanglements, and the position was soon taken by the Irish Guards and another regiment. I got hit on one of the tin hats, as we call the steel helmets, and it broke the top of the blow.
