maximum penetration of about a mile and a half, making their total maximum advance approximately five miles, it was indicated in overnight official statements.

The German gains were again confined mostly to the center of the new front, while the wings held. The French war office admitted the loss of Metz,



Bellay and St. Maur, and said the enemy had gained a footing in Marquellise and Ellencourt.

Berlin claimed the capture of 8000 prisoners and "some guns" on the new front. The taking of prisoners north-west of Chateau-Thierry, where American forces are engaged, also was claimed.

almost daily. Sergeant Burni, of the signal corps, went on a "personally conducted tour" of the Boches front trenches. He shot every German he ran across and returned safely to his own lines.

The rain sweeping this section has rendered the front positions cold and wet, in contrast to the heat of the past few weeks.

In the meantime, the greatest air activity continues along the lines despite unfavorable weather. Fighting and bombing planes headed for Boche territory look like huge flocks of crows. The Germans are bombing allied back areas, with the allies heavily retaliating.

One American field hospital was so endangered by enemy bombs that preparations have been made to evacuate it but the nurses and doctors are still on the job.

With the American Armies in Lorraine, June 11.—Both armies were increasingly active on the Toul front yesterday evening and last night. German guns attempted to seek out a number of American positions but were unsuccessful.

A heavy rain has caused cessation of aerial operations.

The Americans here are eager to participate in the big fighting and feel qualified to duplicate their comrades' feats in the Marne district.

Intimidation Is Used By Western Union, is Charge

Portland, Or., June 11.—Officials of the Commercial Telegraphers Union charged today that the Western Union is using intimidation methods not only in an attempt to defeat the Union, but also to prove to President Wilson that

employees of the company are loyal to it.

Two girl employees were discharged. It was said the dismissals came shortly after each had refused to sign a "loyalty" testimonial addressed to the president, which declared that the signers "would stand by the Western Union from 'patriotic' motives during the war."

26 Killed in Action Is Report by General Pershing

Washington, June 11.—One hundred and thirty casualties were reported to the war department today, divided as follows:

Killed in action, 26; dead from wounds, 3; dead from disease, 7; dead from accident and other causes, 3; wounded severely, 48.

Forty-three wounded, degree undetermined.

Lieutenant Edward Hines Jr., Chicago, died of disease, and Lieutenant Edmund Cordy, New York, and James J. Lawrence, Atlanta, were wounded severely.

Captain John T. Costello, Binghamton, N. Y., previously reported severely wounded, is now reported slightly wounded.

No names of Oregon boys appear in the list.
