THREE SUSPECTS ARE QUIZZED BY OFFICERS

Austrian, German - American and Irishman Each Tell Tale of Perfect Innocence.

Three suspects were brought before the district attorney here today and are typical of cases which the laws of the state and country are inadequate to deal with under the present crisis.

John Dage, who claims to be an Austrian, and was arrested near Mabel, while begging, had over \$60 on his person. He claims to have taken out first papers at Newcastle, Ind., and to have lost them. Whether he was at Mabel at the time the mill there was burned a few days ago, is uncertain. He was also down Roseburg way, apparently about the time the railroad bridge there was damaged by fire recently.

He strenuously denied that he was pro-German, and also claimed that he was unable to work.

His stories were very conflicting, and he declared he was working at making hay at Prosser, Wash., four or five years ago. He will be held for the federal authorities.

Peter Scheuster, born in Mount Vernon, S. D., in 1884, of German parentage, believed that America was right in the war, but wanted to "let George do it" when urged to enlist. He had \$4 and some few cents on his person, and when asked if he was willing to donate \$2 to the Red Cross expressed willingness to do so. He confessed to having been a member of the I. W. W. at two separate times, but declared that he became disgusted with their methods. He declared that 20 days was the longest he had ever held a job.

Michael O'Brien was a gray-headed, fighting Irishman, who declared that he left a job on the wharfs of San Francisco because he was asked to buy War Savings Stamps. He bought two stamps, but when they wanted him to buy a third he quit his job.

He also declared that one reason he quit the job was because he had to divide up with the bosses. He had resisted arrest and also had taken to the brush when an attempt was made to arrest him. He claimed two enlistments in the United States regular army and that he was a naturalized citizen, but was plainly at outs with England and the war, and admitted wanting to see an American army landed in Ireland.

These are typical of cases brought up almost daily before the district attorney by Sheriff Elkins and his force of deputies which are scattered all over the county watching for just this class of men.

Will of Dr. John W. Harris is Filed and Probated

The will of the late Dr. John W. Harris was filed for probate and admitted as his last will and testament. It was signed December 30, 1914, and leaves the use of all his property to his widow and provides that at her death or remarriage the property shall be divided share and share alike among his children. The children named in the will are Madison C. Harris, Edna O. Gray, Edith Maude Martin and George Harris. Edna O. Gray and her husband, Claude Gray, are appointed executor and executrix, and are empowered to sell any real or personal property if needed to comfortably support his widow without any order of court. They are also given permission to serve without bond.

DEBATE LIMIT DEFEATED

Washington, June 13.—By a vote of 41 to 34 the senate today rejected the Underwood resolution, limiting senate debate during the war. Passage of the resolution was desired by administration forces to speed up the senate's business.
