

Stansfield Will Preach Baccalaureate Sermon to University Class

"The Millennium."
(A Saturday Sermonette.)

What is the millennium? It is looked forward to by the world as a future state when the "kingdom of heaven" shall come down and rest upon earth. It is usually considered as the time foretold by John in the book of Revelations when Christ shall reign a thousand years on earth. Some look for it to come at a certain fixed time and by means of signs and mystic figuring have set the date; only to be disappointed, but to continue to figure.

Jesus said "The kingdom of heaven is within you." If the kingdom of heaven is within us, then Christ reigns in our hearts; and just in proportion that Christ reigns in human hearts just in that proportion does he reign on earth. Just as soon as Christ reigns in every heart on earth just so soon will the millennium come and no sooner. If we want to see the millennium each of us must do his part and do it in his life. He cannot do it in someone else's life.

TRAVELING MEN HAVE GOOD TIME AT PICNIC

Cottage Grove is Scene of Festivities of Commercial Salesmen of Valley.

Cottage Grove, Or., July 15.—About 50 traveling men were in Cottage Grove Friday to attend the picnic. They had a splendid dinner in the same grove where they met last year. They had some of the sports at the grove. About three o'clock they all went to the baseball grounds where they played a game between the traveling men and a team of the Cottage Grove merchants. It was a splendid game and resulted in 20 to 17 in favor of Cottage Grove.

Hendershot's orchestra from Eugene played in the Oregon hotel for some time. They had a court in the street with John Medley as judge after trying most of the leading citizens and fining them all the way from 15 cents to 50 cents. Among the citizens tried were Mayor Wheeler, J. H. Chambers and Reverend Knotts. Many of the leading traveling men were also arrested and fined. At last a dummy representing the Kaiser with a helmet on his head was brought into court and the judge said he did not feel capable of passing sentence on such a monster. Cries from the crowd of hang the wretch, burn him at the stake, and many other things. At last the police took the helmet from his head and the judge offered it for sale, it readily bringing \$5. They then hung the dummy and set fire to it and it soon went up in smoke. The fines and all together amounted to \$14 which was donated to the Red Cross. Frankie Snodgrass entertained the crowd at the hotel with some splendid songs, and the day ended with a big ball in Moose hall.

ELKS CELEBRATION IS VERY IMPRESSIVE

Charles V. Galloway, of Salem, Delivers Strong Address—Entire Program is Good.

The Elks celebration of Flag Day was one of the most impressive in the history of the order in Eugene. Beginning with a military parade in which several hundred deputy sheriffs under arms and militia men participated, led by the Eugene municipal band, the keynote of loyalty was superb to the singing of "America" the closing number on the program, by the lodge and audience led by the Gross orchestra.

The address of the evening by Hon. Chas. V. Galloway, of Salem, was excellently received and was thrilling with Americanism from the first word to the last. Mr. Galloway paid a high tribute to President Wilson and declared that there will be no peace till the power of Germany is finally and completely broken.

The delivery of the history of the flag by O. H. Foster and of the Elks Tribute to the flag by R. S. Bryson, were both unusually effective. The music of the occasion was fine, an especial feature being the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner" by Mrs. Daise Beckett Middleton. The municipal band furnished several fine selections and Gross' orchestra also assisted.

CHAMBERS IS CALLED FOR WAR SERVICE

Prominent Banker Drafted for Work on Committee by Leading Men of Nation.

F. L. Chambers, president of the Chambers Hardware company and vice-president of the First National Bank of Eugene has been drafted into the service of his country. He received a long telegram from George W. Perkins, the New York capitalist, stating that he, Perkins, had been drafted as chairman of a national committee to place the requirements of the American Expeditionary forces and of the allied armies before the American people. The men on the committee with Mr. Perkins include among others John R. Mott, Julius Rosenwald, W. H. Taft, Henry Ford, John Rockefeller, Cyrus H. McCormick and Rodman Wanamaker. The committee called upon Mr. Chambers to act as one of the committee from the Western Military District and to meet Mr. Perkins and other members of the National committee in San Francisco. Mr. Chambers' answer was laconic. "Yes, I will meet you in San Francisco ready for any service." He states that he has no knowledge as to the character of work wanted, but whatever it is he is ready to do it.

The telegram follows:

"At a meeting National War Council just held Bankers club, New York, I was drafted as chairman of following committee to bring requirements American expeditionary forces and allied armies before American people: F. Crockett, Rogers Kemp, William Cooper, Proctor Whitford Cole, S. S. Kresge, Julius Rosenwald, Charles E. Crane, James Logan, John D. Rockefeller, Jr., Cleveland H. Dodge, R. A. Long, Wm. Sloane, Robert Dollar, Wm. M. Ladd, John L. Severance, Coleman DuPont, Samuel Mather, Jacob Schiff, E. L. Doheny, Governor Middleton, E. L. Stotesbury, John J. Egan, A. W. Mellon, W. H. Taft, Henry Ford, Cyrus H. McCormick, Rodman Wanamaker. After consultation with the government regarding our plans we call upon you to serve as a member of committee for Western military department. Representatives of this committee, including Dr. John R. Mott and myself wish to meet you and other members of the committee in San Francisco at Fairmont hotel, on Wednesday forenoon, June 20, at 10 o'clock. The War Finance Corporation.

The Federal reserve banks will continue to finance business and industry; the function of the War Finance Corporation is to finance the investment banking of the country. The functions of the banks and the corporation are complementary and full co-operation may be expected.

The War Finance Corporation will start business with a capital stock of \$500,000,000, all subscribed by the United States Government, and will have authority to issue bonds to the extent of \$2,000,000,000 with which to finance its operations.

The corporation will make loans to banks and trust companies making loans to finance "operations necessary or contributory to the prosecution of the war." These loans will be made for periods not exceeding five years and in sums not more than 75 per cent of the face value of the loans made by the borrowing banks to finance "operations necessary or contributory to the prosecution of the war."

The notes of the borrowing banks taken by the corporation for these loans will be secured by adequate collateral.

The corporations may also make loans to savings banks and building and loan associations under certain circumstances, and may in some cases make loans direct to industries essential to the war.

Just as a large amount of the man power of the Nation must be devoted to war purposes and a very great portion of the material and supplies of the Nation must be devoted to the same purpose, just so a great deal of the money and the credit of the country must be diverted from ordinary channels and devoted exclusively to purposes essential or contributory to winning the war.

Industries and business essential or contributory to war purposes must be afforded necessary financial assistance, even if other ordinarily valuable industries are curtailed in their credit thereby. The War Finance Corporation is the Government instrument for the conservation of the credit of the Nation, conserving it for the purpose of winning the war.

Some Liberty Loan Purchases.

It is estimated that the Americans of foreign birth or extraction purchased \$350,000,000 of the Third Liberty Loan; the number of such bond buyers is estimated at over 5,000,000.

A consular telegram from Shanghai, China, states that subscriptions to the Third Liberty Loan in Shanghai amounted to over \$600,000.

The American Embassy in Mexico City states that the subscriptions in that city are more than \$184,000, more than double the quota set for the Americans living there.

The Shah of Persia purchased a \$100,000 Liberty bond.

Liberty and Labor.
The hope of labor lies in the opportunities for freedom: military domination, supervision, checks, bondage, lie in Prussian rule.
It is not through a German regime but through democracy that labor is to receive adequate recognition and its realization of its rightful place in the world.

What Your Bond Purchase Will Accomplish

The following figures give one a definite idea of what his or her loan to the government by the purchase of Liberty Bonds will accomplish when used by the War Department:

One \$50 bond will buy trench knives for a rifle company, or 23 hand grenades, or 14 rifle grenades, or 37 cases of surgical instruments for enlisted men's belts, or 10 cases of surgical instruments for officers' belts.

A \$100 bond will clothe a soldier, or feed a soldier for eight months, or purchase 5 rifles or 30 rifle grenades, or 43 hand grenades, or 25 pounds of ether, or 145 hot-water bags, or 2,000 surgical needles.

A \$100 and a \$50 bond will clothe and equip an Infantry soldier for service overseas, or feed a soldier for a year.

Two \$100 bonds will purchase a horse or mule for Cavalry, Artillery, or other service.

Three \$100 bonds will clothe a soldier and feed him for one year in France or buy a motorcycle for a machine-gun company.

Four \$100 bonds will buy an X-ray outfit.

One \$500 bond will supply bicycles for the headquarters company of an infantry regiment.

superiority. This question, he suggested, involved a consideration of how many troops the Germans had at the outset and how many potential divisions might be stripped from the eastern front.

Reviewing the military situation from March 21 onward, March declared that "the activity now is toward Paris," but that the channel ports first and Paris second constitute the obvious objectives of the boche.

"The four drives, starting March 21, April 9, May 27 and June 9, are all parts of a common scheme of an offensive," he said.

"You see a succession of attacks, the first being 36 miles in Picardy, the next 13 miles in Flanders, the third 38 miles to the Marne, and the present 5 1/2 and 6 miles.

"One of the many striking features of this whole advance is the extent of the front which the allies have had to cover as a result of the German progress. The total stretching of the line from Rheims to the sea is 66 miles. In order to hold that extra line the allies had to have more troops than at the start.

German Objects Obvious.
"In these two drives there were two obvious objects. The first was to reach the channel ports, thus compelling the English, in shipping troops, to go further to sea, making the journey longer and more dangerous.

"The second was Paris, which, because of the sentimental attachment of the French for it, was of strategic importance.

"All these drives have been stopped. The last advance is more a straightening out of the German line than a military movement with a definite objective such as Paris. Along this line was a re-entrant angle from which could be made dangerous attacks on the Oise flanks. For this reason it was most advantageous for Germany to get the line straightened out.

"According to the last information we had the Germans were still attacking west of Soissons, endeavoring to straighten out along the general front.

Plans for Defense of Paris are Made by French Forces

Paris, June 15.—Although the situation is regarded as improved, plans for the defense of Paris continue today. The minister of public works made arrangements for the evacuation of the civilian population in case of necessity.

The Humanite called upon 10,000 workmen for defense work.

Pumice Stone Ships, Plan of New York Capitalists

San Francisco, June 15.—Why waste wood and steel to clean the Kaiser when pumice stone is cheap? That's the question a group of New York and San Francisco capitalists considered, it was declared here today, and then decided to mobilize the output of Mount Lassen and build pumice stone ships.

Two models already have been built and are claimed to surpass concrete in several ways. They now propose to build a fleet to scour the seas.

Total killed, 4463; wounded, 17,416; missing, 12,013. Total, 33,892.

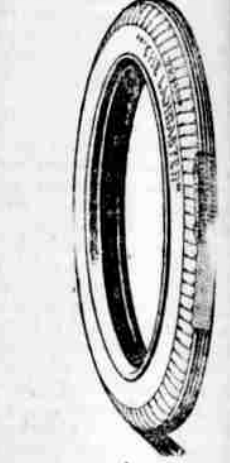
