Over 250,000 Boys Are Listed in Working Reserve

Washington, June 18.—A quarter of a million American boys between the ages of 16 and 21 are going to help increase war food production this summer. Indications now are that enrollment in the Boys Working Reserve will exceed 250,000.

Thirty-seven of the 48 states report

an actual enrollment of 140,000 and an expected enrollment of 230,000. Several large states still are to report.

California leads with an enrollment of 22,000 and Illinois is second with an enrollment of 20,000.

**AUSTRIAN WARRIORS

everywhere. They left 100 prisoners. "Between Maserada and Cadenin (southeast of Maserada) attempts to cross the Piave were bloodily repulsed. On the lower Piave a counter-offensive action resulted advantageously to us."

AUSTRIANS SHIFT ATTACK

London, June 18.—Blocked in the northern mountain area, the Austrians have shifted their heaviest attacks to the Piave river line, on the eastern portion of the new 100-mile Italian offensive front.

The night official statements indicated that the enemy is trying to complete the occupation of Il Montello, the crest that protects the junction of the river and the mountain lines. A strong effort also is being made to debouch from the crossings already effected on the middle and lower Piave.

All these efforts are being effectively opposed, according to the Italian war office, just as the British, French and Italians are preventing the Austrians from descending the slopes of the Asiago plateau and Mount Grappa onto the Venetian plains.

The Italians claim 4,000 prisoners, while the Austrians claim 12,000.

In the mountain region the Italian and Anglo-French forces gained partial success at several points in a counter-offensive.

Along the Piave the Austrians continue to exert powerful pressure to complete their occupation of Montello and advance onto the plains, thus turning the northern wing of the river line.

The British war office announced there was little change on the British portion of the Italian front.

"The enemy is reorganizing after his severe defeat," the statement said.

Raiding and artillery activity was reported on the west front by the British and German war offices.

"Between the Moselle and the Meuse we inflicted losses on Americans by an advance on both sides of Elviray and destroyed portions of their positions," Berlin declared. "Reconnoitering detachments brought back prisoners from the French and American trenches in the Vosges."

BRITISH MAKE RAIDS

London, June 18.—British troops conducted successful raids southwest of Albert and in the neighborhood of Moyenneville. Field Marshal Haig reported today.

"Patrol encounters east of the Nieppe forest resulted in capture of prisoners and machine guns."

"Hostile artillery was active in the Ancre valley, south of Albert and west of Serre."

"Southwest of Villers-Bretonneux a hostile raiding party was repulsed last night. A few prisoners were taken."

GOMPERS CHOICE FOR HEAD OF FEDERATION

President of National Labor Body is Unopposed as Candidate for Re-Election.

St. Paul, Minn., June 18.—Samuel Gompers will be unopposed for re-election to the presidency of the American Federation of Labor, according to indications today. Several contests for minor offices are said to be brewing. Elections probably will be held Thursday, after which the annual convention of the federation will be adjourned.

The convention has refused to remove barriers against transfer of members from one union to another without loss of seniority rights. A resolution to permit such transfer was defeated by a vote of 17,735 to 7,676.

Resolutions were offered by printing trades delegates favoring federal curtailment of exportations of print paper. Shortage of paper at home, it was pointed out, might endanger the livelihood of union printers.

It was charged that paper is being exported to Mexico, where newspapers are engaged in German propaganda.

Three Cents per Mile is Asked for Steamship Fare

Washington, June 18.—The Pacific Coast Steamship company today asked the interstate commerce commission for increased fare of \$30 between San Francisco and Seattle; \$10 between San Francisco and Los Angeles and \$3.50 between Los Angeles and San Diego, and a combination of these fares between the respective points based on three cents per mile so they will equalize with carriers under federal control.

WAR BOARD VIEW IS RE- JECTED BY WESTERN UNION

to settle a controversy, the board shall then sit as a board of arbitration, decide the controversy and make an award if it can reach a unanimous conclusion. If it cannot do this, then it shall select an umpire, as provided, who shall sit with the board, review the issues and render his award.

"In view of this required procedure, I think we are entitled to state the facts, which are that the Taft-Walsh plan which has been referred to as the decision of the board, was retired by the board under the above procedure by five votes. Following this failure of unanimous action, there was no appointment of an umpire, and, therefore, under the prescribed procedure of the board itself, no decision."

"We desire to be perfectly fair with you, sir, as we have been with the board. We are not favorable to sharing the responsibility of conducting a great public service with the peculiar features of the telegraph, which the exigencies of the war have increased many fold, with members of an outside organization whose interests are personal, rather than public."

Says Service Endangered.

"Under the plan of Mr. Walsh, concurred in by Mr. Taft, an outside union which has for many years been frankly hostile to the company would, under the pretext of a war emergency, waive its rights to strike during the war, but carry on a propaganda for the purpose of employees for no possible result that it could attain during the war, but only that it might furnish the nucleus for the disorganization of our service through demoralized discipline and the use of the strike immediately after the exigencies of the war had ceased and released it from its promises. As indicative of the character and temper of this union, permit me to quote the following words from an official circular issued by it calling a meeting in Chicago for June 9: "'Come armed if you deem it necessary.'"

"I need not remind you, sir, that the primary obligations of a telegraph service are to provide continuity and competence and that we desire to protect these essentials not only during this emergency, but at all times. To this end there are, it seems to us, two plans of procedure. One, compulsory arbitration, which, as we recall, you urged on congress at the time the great railway strike was imminent. The other is found in the suggestion of our employees that they form their own union or organization on the theory that the normal relationship between employer and employee is that of peace and mutual co-operation in the adjustment of their relations and not that of strife and that a spirit of hostility and efforts of warfare are not necessary for industrial progress or the adjustment of mutual relations."

"Now that our employees have determined upon their own association, I am sure they would be glad to have the advice and counsel of the national war board, in the formation of their organization to the end that it may be representative of the employees' interests as well as free from any influences that might limit its effectiveness in dealing with the rights and privileges of the employees. Nothing that can be accomplished by the employees' association, but there is this important distinction—that unionism established under conditions of coercion and hostility is not the same thing as the right to bargain collectively, a right which is given the employees by their association."

"We ask you to believe that our view is based upon a most careful re-examination of our experience in the operation of telegraph service. There is no dispute between the company and its employees over pay or hours of labor. There is no likelihood of a strike of our employees, a body of men and women of high patriotism, who have borne great burdens unconspicuously as a part of their contribution to the nation's cause."

GAMMA PHI BETAS TO TAKE LONG HIKE

Emma Wootton Hall to Chaperone Nine Sorority Girls on Trip to Portland Afoot.

Dressed in khaki hiking suits and wearing big tan walking boots, nine members of the Gamma Phi Beta sorority of the University, will leave tomorrow morning to hike the 125 miles to Portland. The girls plan to do 20 miles a day, stopping at hotels each night on the way and cooking most of their own meals.

Those making the walk are Mrs. Emma Wootton Hall, of Astoria, graduate, who will be chaperone; Dorothy Dunbar, also a graduate; Dorothy Wootton, Frances Dunbar, of Astoria; Allen Tompkins, of Cascade Locks; Myrtle Jane Albright, of Salem; Vernice Robbins, of Hood River; Helen Woodcock and Buena Margason, both of Portland.

Mrs. Hall, prominent in class and student activities, and secretary of the associated students during the past year, and Miss Dorothy Dunbar received their bachelor of arts degrees this morning at the commencement exercises. The nine girls who will make the trip spent the afternoon making final preparations for the hike, which they have been planning for three weeks.

"Every mile of the way on foot," is their slogan. Nearly all of the girls are experienced hikers and are looking forward to their long tramp with pleasure. "The weather seems ideal for our trip," said Mrs. Hall yesterday. "The parents, and especially the brothers, of some of the girls, have said to us, 'We are going to show them just what we can do.'"

The girls will start at 6 o'clock tomorrow morning and follow the road on the west side of the Willamette river. They plan to reach Harrisburg the first night and then go through Monroe, Corvallis and Salem, where they will leave Miss Albright at her home. They expect to do most of their hiking from 4 in the morning until about noon, and again in the latter part of the evening until dark.

They are taking with them two frying pans, a coffee pot and cups, and expect to get supplied from farm houses and cook at least two meals a day themselves.

**Three Factories Burned;
Incendiarism is Suspected**

East St. Louis, Ill., June 18.—The Illinois Wool company's plant here is in ashes and two other factories working on government orders are badly damaged, as a result of a fire early this morning, believed of incendiary origin.

The walnut company was making gun stocks. Four carloads of stocks and quantities of walnut lumber were consumed, and the 10-acre plant was razed.

Fire broke out simultaneously in eight places at 3:30 o'clock, witnesses said. Numerous explosions accompanied the burning of the Pure Carbonic company, an adjoining plant. The Sternkopf Plating mill, nearby, caused the third alarm.

Property loss had not been estimated early today.
