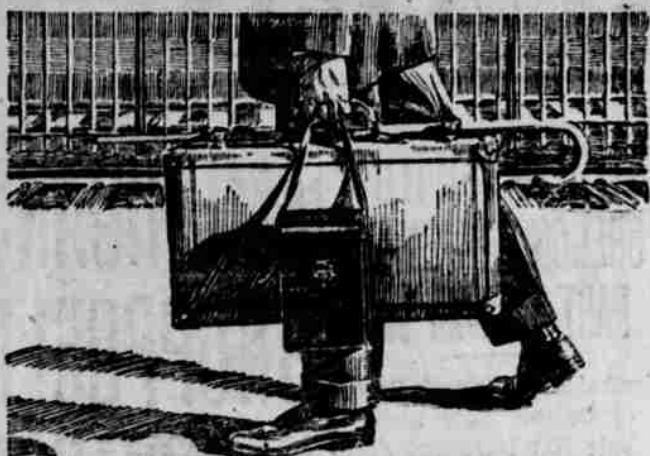




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RELIEF COMMITTEE TO MAINTAIN OFFICE

MAJ-GEN. GREENE RELIEVED OF CAMP LEWIS COMMAND

Removal of Officer in Charge at Cantonment Since its First Days Causes Speculation in Official Circles.

Tacoma, Wash., June 20.—With Major General H. A. Greene relieved of command of the 61st division, and on his way to Washington, D. C., to report to the war department, officers at Camp Lewis were dumfounded today at the sudden and unexpected change that deprived the cantonment of its commander.

It is stated that General Greene is returning to his file rank of brigadier general in the regular army, and that he will be given command of the department of the Philippines at Manila. Brigadier General Foltz is in temporary command of Camp Lewis.

No official statement has been given out at division headquarters, further than an admission that telegraphic orders returning General Greene to the rank of brigadier general were received. From one end of the camp to the other, officers did not even attempt to venture a suggestion of the possible cause of the new order which arrived at a time when, as the general himself not long ago expressed it, orders to move overseas might arrive at any moment.

Major General Greene came to Tacoma almost before Camp Lewis proper existed and, under his guiding hand, had seen it grow to the largest cantonment in the United States and, if the word of visiting military inspectors of all departments is to be accepted, among the most efficient.

General Greene spent several months last winter in France, in conformance with the policy of the war department, which was sending division commanders to the battlefield to obtain information first-hand before leading their divisions overseas. The general successfully passed the required physical examination following his return to Tacoma.

Who the new division commander will be no one at the camp would hazard a guess today. The matter rests with the war department.

AUSTRIAN OFFENSIVE IS REPULSED

bridges and cutting off Austrian forces on this side of the river from their source of supplies and reinforcements. British airmen report that twelve of the fourteen bridges flung across the Piave by the enemy have been carried away. Trapped on the west bank, Austrian detachments are subjected to almost constant mauling by the Italian artillery and bombs dropped by allied airmen, with no avenue of escape.

The Austrians thus hemmed in thus have an advantage in defensive positions and are yet too well supplied with ammunition to warrant frontal assault. There is every probability, however, that exhaustion of their ammunition and food supplies, together with the pounding they are undergoing, will eventually force them to lay down their arms, or sacrifice themselves in desperate assaults on the Italian lines.

Frantic efforts to restore the pontoon-ways so far have been frustrated by the swollen current and the accuracy of the Italian artillery.

The enemy's losses on all parts of the front in the first three days of the offensive are now estimated at 150,000.

The heaviest fighting is still around the bridgehead the Austrians have established in the lower Piave, from where they are trying to push westward towards Venice. The enemy now holds the west bank of the river from Macerata to Fossalta and San Dona Di Piave, a front of 18 kilometers (about 12 miles).

Austrian artillery is pouring thousands of poison, tear, emetic and mustard gas shells in the rear areas. Schio, Bassano, Asolo and Treviso have thus been rendered practically uninhabitable.

Schio is on the Logra river south-west of the Asiago Plateau and about eight miles behind the lines. Bassano is on the Brenta river, south of Mont Grappa and about the same distance behind the lines. Asolo is on the Muzzone river, eight miles east of Bassano. Treviso is on the Sile river, about nine miles west of the Piave.

On the lower Piave Austrian detachments wearing Italian uniforms sought to advance, but the subterfuge was discovered and they were dispersed.

Several spies, disguised as Italian peasants, have been shot.

Crops in Winnipeg Need Rain Badly, Says Canadian Expert

Winnipeg, Man., June 20.—Crops from Winnipeg west to the mountains are in critical need of rain, according to J. D. McGregor, director of agricultural labor of Canada's food board here today. The weather of the next two weeks will determine crop conditions, he said, but the uncertainty makes conservation through North America essential.

GRABBIT SHOP IN LONDON
London, June 20.—War economy at last has planted a grabberia lunch-room in England, the first American-type dyspepsia parlor the country has seen. It was opened here by the food ministry as a national restaurant, offering food at about one-third the average restaurant prices. The whole enterprise is a government affair, and business is booming.

BLACHLY

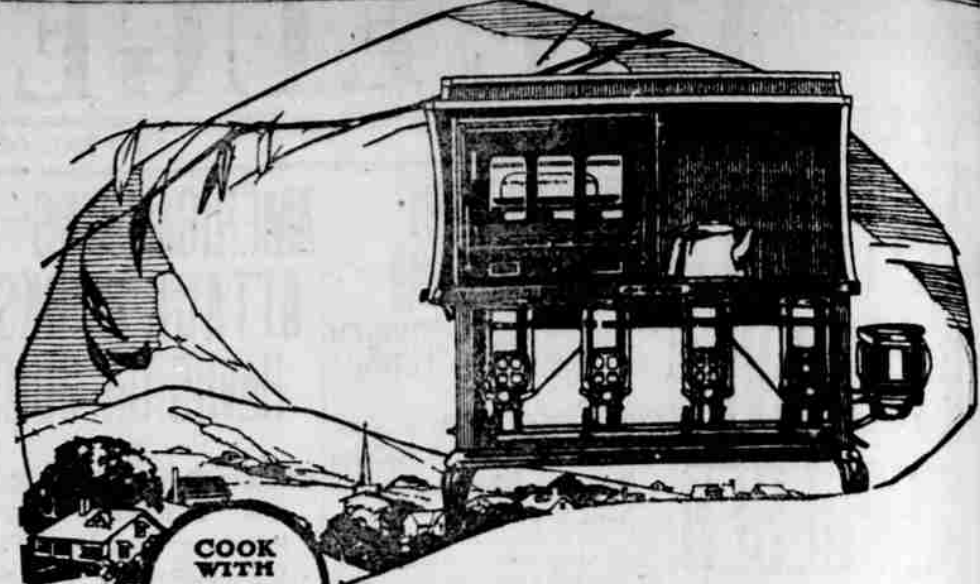
Blachly, Or., June 18.—There is to be a dance at Horton's hall the night of the fourth for the benefit of the Red Cross.
