THREE CARS OF FLOUR ARE SAVED FOR ALLIES BY PEOPLE OF LANE

Second Shipment is Sent to Portland Today and Still More Will be Sent, According to Food Administrator.

In response to appeals from the United States food administration the people of Lane county have saved three carloads of wheat flour for our soldiers in France and the people of the allied nations. Two carloads of flour were shipped to Portland today. These, with other flour from the northwest, obtained in a similar manner, will be shipped at once to Europe. Lane county previously shipped one carload of flour to Portland. Much of the flour was turned back by the consumers to the dealers. Some flour has not yet been turned back, but preparation to receive and ship all wheat flour remaining in the country is being made.

The lack of wheat flour and the government's request that no wheat flour be used, is resulting in much complaint over the increased cost of substitutes. A meeting of food administration officials is being held in Portland today for the purpose of discussing the question of fixing prices on substitutes.

The new sugar regulation, fixing the maximum sales to families for canning purposes, announced by the food administration in Portland yesterday, is in part as follows:

"On account of shipping difficulties, the sugar situation is becoming more acute and we have been advised by the food administration at Washington that it is absolutely necessary to limit the amount of sugar used in domestic canning and preserving to 25 pounds. You will, therefore, immediately upon receipt of this notice, change the sugar certificate on the top line to read as follows:

"No family can purchase more than 25 pounds of sugar for canning and preserving without a special permit from the county food administrator."

"In case it is not absolutely essential to a family to have even this amount, you must reduce it to the amount that they absolutely require."

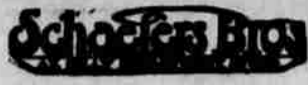
FIRE DAMAGES BRIDGE

AMERICAN AEROPLANES WILL SOON CROSS SEA

Head of British Aviation Service Says Trans-Atlantic Will Come in Three Months.

Washington, June 21.—American aeroplanes, equipped with Rolls-Royce engines and piloted by aviators of the allied nations, will cross the Atlantic within three months, Major-General W. Branker stated, probably would be made from Newfoundland to Portugal, via the Azores. Seven hundred and fifty horsepower aeroplanes carrying crews of three or four men will be used.

In discussing the proposed flights, General Branker declared that the matter had been brought to the attention of the war and navy departments and that this government was in favor of the venture.

"Once this enterprise has been established," General Branker said, "America's output of big bombing machines can proceed to Europe by air and so save shipping that is so invaluable for other purposes."

"This may seem a wild statement. But in 1914 the flight of the English channel was considered a wonderful and dangerous performance."
Cross in Few Hours.
 Flying at the rate of 85 miles an hour, a conservative speed, not taking into

consideration unfavorable winds, aeroplanes can reach the Azores in less than 40 hours, according to calculations of flying experts, General Branker stated. The trip from the Azores to Portugal—about 800 miles—would be comparatively simple matter after that.

From Portugal the planes can easily fly to Italy or any other part of the battle front.

The American Liberty motor has not been sufficiently tested to warrant its use in trans-Atlantic flights. Several Rolls-Royce engines will be imported for the initial flight, which, unless the unexpected happens, will probably be attempted in September or October.

So certain are the allies that the trans-Atlantic flights will be successful that they are planning their coming air programs on this method of transporting lanes to France.

Possibilities Unlimited.
 The possibilities before aircraft which can make non-stop flights from Newfoundland to the Azores, about 3,200 miles, are unlimited. Bombing raids over the interior cities of Germany will be the logical result.

Upon America more than any other nations rests the responsibility and opportunity of pushing the advantages of aerial supremacy to the utmost, General Branker stated.

"The air offensive against Germany has now definitely started and will grow steadily in volume and efficiency," he added.

"By degrees, all the vital points of Germany will come within our reach."
 The British are depending entirely on the Liberty motor for the carrying through of their air program for a year

to come, insofar as bombing, reconnaissance and photographing machines are concerned.

"We will want thousands and thousands of them," General Branker said.

Rev. A. L. Crim will officiate at the funeral service. Interment will be made in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.
