

98 LANE COUNTY MEN TO BE INDUCTED INTO SERVICE ON MONDAY

Largest Class Yet Called Under Draft Will be Sent to Camp Lewis, Washington, for Training.

Ninety-eight Lane county men will be inducted into the United States army under the selective draft, Monday morning. Most of them will entrain in Eugene, for Camp Lewis, at 10:45 a. m. Others will entrain in other parts of the state and other states, where they have been making their residence since registration.

327 DRAFTED MEN TO BE TOTAL SENT FROM LANE COUNTY, JULY 5

Class of 63 to Train at Fort McDowell, California, Will be Inducted Into Service on That Date.

With the entrainment of 63 Lane county men July 5, the total number of men taken from Lane county through the selective draft will be 327, according to figures given out at the office of County Clerk Stacey M. Russell. The men who will be inducted into service July 5 will be sent to Fort McDowell, Cal., for training.

When the men who have been called respond, it is estimated that Lane county will have about 1300 men in the various branches of the service.

Lane county, in proportion to population, has furnished more volunteers than any other county in the state, while Oregon ranks at the head of the list among the states of the nation for volunteer enlistments.

The population of Lane county has shown by the recent War Savings census is a little more than 30,000.

The first call under the draft sent 15 men to Camp Lewis, and later 37 were sent to the same camp for training. After that 16 men were sent to Vancouver, Wash., 72 were sent to Fort McDowell, and 15, who volunteered for special training, were sent to Portland to receive mechanical training in the Benson Polytechnic school. Ten men will leave in a few days for San Francisco to receive similar training and 98 will leave Monday for Camp Lewis. One man, who registered in Lane county, was sent to camp from Colorado.

Y. M. C. A. NEEDS 3000 SECRETARIES AT ONCE

John R. Mott, General Secretary, Seeking Volunteers for Immediate Service Abroad.

Chicago, June 22.—"The Y. M. C. A. must have 3,000 secretaries this summer to send to Europe," General Secretary John R. Mott said today. Mott, pausing in a trip to the Pacific coast with George W. Perkins to confer with business men of various cities, asked Chicago to supply 500 men for foreign service. "It's not a bomb proof job," said Mott. "Eight of our men were killed in the last German offensive."

Mott also exhibited a letter from General Pershing saying: "Give me my choice between 900 men who have the 'Y' and 1,000 who haven't and I will take the 900. They will be more effective fighters."

George W. Perkins is head of the committee which is to raise more than \$100,000,000 for the Y. M. C. A. work this fall.

**Life Imprisonment for
Slacker Who Cursed Army**
Tacoma, Wash., June 22.—Because he said "to hell with this army business," refused to sign an enlistment and assignment card and showed by his actions and statements that he was disloyal, Guy C. Rheinhamer of Cummings, N. D., a private in the 39th company, 166th depot brigade, was sentenced to life imprisonment today by a court martial at Camp Lewis. He will be sent to Alcatraz to remain in prison for the rest of his life.

BATTLE ALONG ITALY'S FRONT FAVORS ALLIES

on the Piave, it was indicated in overnight official reports. Elsewhere on the front strong Austrian attacks were repulsed.

"In the Montello yesterday the pressure of the enemy continued, but everywhere he was held by our troops, who counter-attacked and gained ground," the Italian war office announced.

West of Candelo and west of San Dona di Piave, on the lower river, repeated attacks by the enemy failed to make any progress.

The Austrian war office said: "The struggle on the Carso plateau and on the Montello increased to especial violence."

Vienna claimed a total of nearly 15,000 prisoners in the drive.

The German war office reported the repulse of "violent reconnoitering thrusts along the whole front."

"Local French attacks southwest of Noyon and by Americans northwest of Chateau-Thierry broke down," Berlin declared. "The French and Americans suffered heavy losses and some prisoners remained in our hands."

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EXPECT BIG SUMMER SCHOOL ENROLLMENT

University Sessions Start Monday With Prospect of 400 Students in Attendance.

Oregon's war-time summer school, which opens on the campus Monday morning, is to be the most successful from the standpoint of enrollment of any ever conducted by the University. Present indications are that 400 students will be on the campus during the period of the course, which closes August 2. Nearly half of this number will be made up of men enrolled in the military department.

One of the features of the summer school will be the special course offered by Dean D. W. Morton, of the school of commerce, for training men and women for stenographic and other clerical positions in the government service. The course is being organized in response to a request from the government and of the 50 students necessary to fill the requirements, more than 40 have already enrolled.

Several conventions and conferences will be held in connection with the course, the first of which will be the gathering of state educators to consider means of making the Oregon schools most effective in war work. The conference will open on Wednesday of next week and continue through until Friday afternoon.

This year for the first time the school of music will offer summer courses, with Arthur Faguy-Cote and Mrs. Jane Scottford Thatcher as instructors of voice and piano, respectively.

STOCK OF UNIVERSITY CO-OP STORE IS SOLD

Need of Money for Other Purposes Causes Student Body to Sell Entire Stock.

After four years of operation by the Associated Students of the University, the Co-op store at 803 Thirteenth avenue, east, has been closed up and the stock was sold to Sidney R. Allen, proprietor of the University Pharmacy, at Eleventh avenue and Alder street, Friday. Mr. Allen will move the stock into his store.

"The Co-op was not closed because it was not a paying proposition," said Graduate Manager Dean Walker Friday evening, "but because the money represented in the capital investment is needed by the Associated Students for other purposes."

The Co-op was opened by the students four years ago and has been run under the management of Marion McClain since that time, during which time its scope has been greatly increased and this last year its stock included practically everything in the line of students' supplies.

No mention of the sale price was given in the announcement of the transaction.

Dynamite Blast Wrecks House—Two Arrested

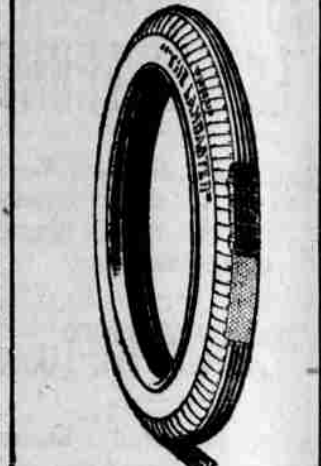
San Francisco, Cal., June 22.—A blast of dynamite at midnight last night wrecked the house in which Augustus Marengo, his wife and three children were sleeping. No sooner had the family fled to the street than a second blast wrecked part of Marengo's greenhouse adjoining.
