GOOD BUILDINGS FOR SCHOOLS VITAL TO EDUCATIONAL WORK

F. A. Naramore, City School Architect, of Portland, Delivers Address at the State Educational Conference.

More school building calamities are due to employment of incompetent or ill-qualified architects, or else politics, or something else besides good business, than to any other cause, according to F. A. Naramore, city school architect, of Portland, who delivered an address on the architectural features of school buildings before the Thursday evening session of the state education conference in Guild hall.

Mr. Naramore, describing the physical needs of the educational system, said, in part:

Careful Study Required.

"The time is past when school buildings may consist only of bare rooms punctuated with windows, fitted with small blackboards and uncomfortable desks, lacking almost every convenience, and in which only a few subjects were taught. Now the school ground, building and maintenance thereof require the most careful study.

"The ground or site should be large enough to provide sufficient area for the various games which may be played thereon by the school students or the people of the community, and the grounds might profitably be provided with goals, backstops and other apparatus for various outdoor sports. It is unfortunate that of late parents of children injured on play apparatus have brought suit against school districts and won, thereby resulting in the removal by the school authorities of much of the valuable play apparatus from the grounds.

"The school building should be situated on grounds as free as possible from noise, smoke or other things affecting the purity of the air, and away from buildings or woods that might reduce the light. If the building is too near street car lines or streets where there is heavy traffic, there is danger to children coming to and from school or playing near it. The building should be located on the grounds in such a manner as to form the greatest unbroken area for play, yet leave sufficient room on the front and sides for the beautifying of the grounds, while the architecture of the building should be half civic and half domestic, pleasing and inviting both to the children and parents.

Schools of Eugene compare favorably with those of other parts of the country, as indicated by standard tests given the students, declared Miss Ida May Smith, supervisor of the Eugene schools, in a paper read before the evening session. Eugene scored above the standard for the whole country in addition, subtraction, oral and silent reading, falling below the standard only in spelling in the second grade. Miss Smith spoke hopefully of the results of the tests, saying the attitude of the students toward them is most enthusiastic.

At the afternoon session, speaking on "Possibilities for Effective Educational Guidance in the High School," C. A. Howard, principal of the Eugene high school, urged an advisor system, under which the high school students could have the same class adviser throughout his whole course. This, he said, had not yet been worked out. Mr. Howard said:

"There are certain subjects that all should take. They are the social sciences, English and science. These should form a considerable core throughout the high school career. The social sciences should prepare the student to understand the society in which he is to live and the political institutions which he is to assist in maintaining or improving.
