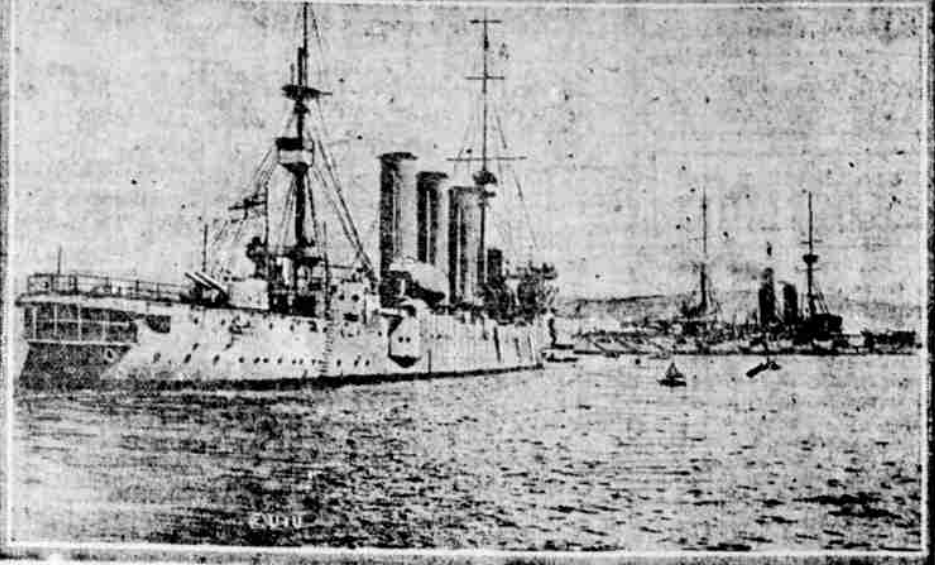
Great Publisher Dead

Death of Ex-Czar Nichols Is Unofficially Confirmed

London, June 28.—The first announcement approaching official confirmation of the death of Nicholas Romanoff, the former czar, was received here today.

The Frankfurter Zeitung, according to the Exchange Telegraph Copenhagen correspondent, declares that Foreign Minister Tschirch wired from Moscow to the Russian minister at Darmstadt, Germany, that Nicholas had been killed.

Amsterdam, June 28.—The Wolff agency announced today that it learned from Russia that the former czar was murdered in a train in which he was leaving Ekaterinburg, immediately after Czechoslovak forces captured that town.

From the same source it is reported that Grand Duke Alexis, the former czar's son, died a fortnight ago, following a long illness.

Spokane, Wash., June 28.—"I have talked to many men who have driven the new Liberty motor—both foreigners and Americans—and every one declared the Liberty motor the greatest he had ever driven."

Colonel Bruce P. Disque, commanding the spruce division of the signal corps, United States army, made that statement here at a luncheon.

Washington, June 28.—General Pershing today reported 561 casualties in the American Expeditionary forces in France, divided as follows:

Killed in action, 24; died of wounds, 4; died of disease, 3; wounded severely, 22; wounded, degree undetermined, 2; prisoner, 1.

Washington, June 28.—Marine casualties reported today numbered 50, divided as follows:

Killed in action, 17; died of wounds, 7; wounded severely, 26.
