EGRO SOLDIERS MAKE BRILLIANT SCRAP RECORD

isted in the capture of large amounts of booty, including machine guns, trench mortars and light and heavy guns. "Along the entire line the irresistible rushes of the Italians and French found the Austrians completely surprised. Though unprepared, they fought desperately. Actions along the left bank of the Piave and the Montello salient were especially successful. On the Giudicarie important gains were made and additional prisoners were taken. "Heavy artillery firing from Italian batteries broke down determined enemy counter attacks on the Sengna and Betta, while attack against Cuccidarie resulted in heavy losses to the enemy. "Heavy cannonading is in progress along both sides of the Brenta today. "Aerial activities by enemy machines over the Italian lines are increasing. Aside upon Venetian cities during the night were unsuccessful and no loss of

life and very little damage to property resulted."

Reports received here today of intense activity back of the Austrian lines along the Piave are taken to indicate Austria is preparing for another offensive.

Rome war reports declare that General Diaz is tenaciously maintaining the initiative along the entire line, thereby preventing successful re-organization of the shattered Austrian divisions.

ITALIANS PRESS ON.

London, July 1.—The London Press was enthusiastic today over the new Italian successes Saturday, which resulted in the storming in Monte di Valbella on the Asiago plateau, with the capture of more than 800 Austrians.

A dispatch from the Italian front said the Austrians, following the Italian victory, issued proclamations forbidding the people in the occupied districts from speaking in public or spreading the news. Military police seized flowers displayed in windows, claiming such acts were seditious.

Austrian police in the occupied districts repressed the people's jubilation by beating and arresting citizens who attempted a demonstration.

The Italians, aided by British and French troops, attacked Monte di Valbella at dawn Saturday, after an intense artillery preparation. They carried the mountain and later held it against repeated counter-attacks.

To the eastward, the Italians also captured an observation post on the southern slopes of Sasso Rosso, taking 33 prisoners.

RAIDS ON PARIS CONTINUE.

Paris, July 1.—German airmen made their fourth and fifth raids on Paris within five days last night and early today.

The first alarm was sounded at 11:58 p. m. A few bombs were dropped in the suburbs. At 12:20 "all clear" was given at 12:20 a. m.

At 12:48 another alarm was sounded. Aerial defenses went into action. A few bombs were dropped in the suburbs. At 2:20 "all clear" was sounded again.

BRITISH TAKE PRISONERS.

London, July 1.—Successful raids on various sectors of the Picardy front were reported by Field Marshal Haig today. "A hostile post in Aveluy Wood was rushed yesterday afternoon," the statement said.

"West of Dernancourt we raided the enemy's trenches and took a few prisoners."

"A successful minor operation north-west of Albert early last night resulted in the improvement of our positions and the capture of 34 prisoners and some machine guns."

"A hostile counter attack northwest of Albert later in the night, was beaten off."

"North of Albert, southeast of Arras, east of Hobeon, and in the neighborhood of Meris, and the Ypres-Co-

mines canal there was hostile artillery firing."

FRENCH ADVANCE LINES.

Paris, July 1.—French troops advanced their lines slightly on a five-mile front northwest of Chateau-Thierry and in an operation southeast of Osoy took 200 prisoners, the French war office reported.

Minor operations on other portions of the Marne and Oise fronts resulted in 40 prisoners.

"Between Montdidier and Noyon, French raids resulted in 20 prisoners," the communique said.

"South of the Aisne, the French captured a resistance center north of Cutry and took 26 prisoners."

"The French improved their positions south of the Aisne, between Passy-En-Valois and Vinly (a front of five miles, bordering the American sector on the north) and advanced their line to eastward of the railway between Chezy-En-Cureq and Vinly."

"Southeast of Osoy (correct) west of Soissons, sharp fighting following a German counter-attack, enabled the French to maintain their new positions and take 200 prisoners."

AMERICAN FRONT QUIET.

Washington, July 1.—"Except for the increase of artillery activity on both sides in the Chateau-Thierry region (Sunday) there is nothing to report," said the American communique today.

Attempts of the enemy to make friends with American troops were reported in section B, of the communique.

"On the morning of June 25," Pershing reported, "they made signs signifying 'good morning.' They had deposited some kittens on the parapets of the small post and threw a package of cigarettes into our barbed wire entanglements. Our soldiers do not reciprocate these attentions."

U. S. AIRMEN IN ITALY.

Rome, July 1.—An escadrille of American airmen, piloting Caproni planes, flew from Milan to Rome, a distance of 650 kilometers (403.65 miles). They were under command of Captain La Guardia, former New York commission man.

SOVIETS WOULD FROWN ON ALLIED INTERVENTION

While not according official political recognition to the Lenin-Trotsky government, this nation is forced to extend its forthcoming aid to Russia through the best available channels.

In the present decentralized government of that country the soviets are the only channels sufficiently organized to deal with.

Utterly opposed to the principles of the Lenin-Trotsky organization and hoping that the time may not be far distant when a democratic government may be set up in Russia that will observe the rules of well established regimes, the president is restricting America's aid to such economic and moral help as American business can send informally through the medium of the soviets.

This aid, however, it is confidently hoped, will develop the foundation work of government for Russia, and the means for later far-reaching policies of assistance which may serve to re-establish an eastern front.

Germans Occupy Tiflis.

London, July 1.—The Germans have occupied Tiflis, according to an undated despatch from Moscow, received today, and are organizing Austro-German war prisoners.

Tiflis is the capital of the government of Caucasus and is a city of about 200,000 population.

GRAIN UP AND DOWN ON CHICAGO MARKET

Few Deliveries and Favorable Weather Reports Cause Rapid Fluctuations.

Chicago, July 1.—Few deliveries on July contracts tended to encourage buying on the Chicago board of trade at the opening today. There were consequent advances in grain futures. The familiar favorable crop and weather reports then drove prices down. Provisions, almost neglected in the trading, followed the course of grains.

July corn opened at 1.48, up 1-8c, advanced slightly and sank 1-4 cents. August corn, opening at 1.50-1-4, was unchanged. It dropped 1-4 cents thereafter. September corn was initiated at a price of 1.52-1-2 and later sold down 1-7-8.

July oats, opening at 72-7-8 was down 1-8 and later dropped to 72. August oats opened at 68-5-8, unchanged, subsequently losing 3-4 cent. September corn began at 67-3-8 and later lost 5-8.
