15,000 POUNDS MEAT A MINUTE GOING TO ALLIES

One Hog Out of Every Four Being Sent Abroad.

Shipments of meat have been going to the allies for some time at the rate of 15,000 pounds a minute. As the 1917 shipments are kept up during a ten hour day they amount to 9,000,000 pounds daily. The meat goes to soldiers of the United States and the allies as well as to the civilian population of all the countries at war with Germany.

PREPARATION MADE TO CARE FOR LARGE CROWD ON THURSDAY

Fourth of July Celebration is Expected to Bring Many Thousands of Visitors to City This Week.

Eugene is making preparations to entertain the largest crowd that ever assembled in this city for an Independence Day celebration. The review of the Lane county Home Guard by Governor James Withycombe, a patriotic address by C. M. Thomas of Medford, competitive drills between Home Guard companies, concerts by a Liberty chorus of 150 voices and the Eugene Municipal and Salem Cherrian bands, baseball game between teams from the University of Oregon summer camp and from Mabel, track meet on Kincaid field, horse racing at the fair grounds and ball at the armory in which the governor will lead the grand march are some of the principal features of the program for the day.

The celebration is to be held under the auspices of the Lane county Home Guard of which there are 2700 members, a larger number enrolled in the Home Guard of any other county in the state. The committee in charge of arrangements estimates that more than 2000 Home Guards will participate.

The four companies of men from the University of Oregon summer camp, veterans of the Civil and Spanish-American wars, drafted men who will leave their homes in Lane county on July 5 to take part in the war against Germany, and patriotic organizations will also take part in the parade.

Special floats are being constructed for the pageant. These will include "Goddess of Justice," Goddess of Liberty, "Columbia," and "Joan of Arc."
