

TRIBUTE IS PAID TO OREGON SOLDIERS IN SPEECH BY GOVERNOR

Executive Delivers Brief Address in Connection With Lane County Fourth of July Celebration.

James Withycombe, governor of Oregon, despite the fact that he was not feeling well and had not been scheduled to make an address, spoke at patriotic exercises held in connection with Eugene's Fourth of July celebration yesterday afternoon, paying tribute to 25,000 Oregonians who have answered their country's call and to the members of Oregon soldiers who have given their lives on the field of battle in the conflict with Germany.

"I say all honor, I say all hail to the young men of Oregon," said the governor. "I say all reverence, I say all

honor to the mothers of Oregon soldiers."

The Fourth of July is no longer a time for celebration by America alone, but for the democracy of all the world, he said.

Thomas is Orator of Day.

Hon. C. M. Thomas, of Medford, the orator of the day made a plea for the people at home to "guard the rear," while the boys are fighting in France, by stamping out propaganda. He referred to the pacifist as the "most damnable of all propagandists," and declared "Each man has a duty to perform and when he refuses to see it there is no other word which will apply except coward."

E. O. Immel, president of the Eugene chamber of commerce, was chairman of the day. Invocation was given by Rev. George H. Parkinson, pastor of the First Methodist church. Attorney John S. Medley read the Declaration of Independence, declaring that the principles enunciated in the document signed in 1776 should enlist every citizen of the United States in the war for "human rights, human liberty and human independence."

The musical program by the Liberty chorus, under the direction of Mrs. Daise Beckett Middleton, and the Eugene municipal and Salem Cherrian bands was an inspiring feature of the program. More than 100 voices took

part in the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner," "America," and "Keep the Home Fires Burning." Mrs. Middleton, who plans to study music in the east, delayed her departure from Eugene several days that she might be present to take part in the program.

Pays Tribute to Soldiers.

E. J. Adams paid a tribute to the Lane county boys in the service, in connection with which he read a poem as follows:

"Gleaming in the windows, all o'er our mighty land,
All kinds of flags are flying majestic, sweet and grand.
But the grandest of them all with a meaning deep and true
Is that little flag of crimson, with its heavenly stars of blue.

"Each star means a hero, a boy of yours or mine,
Fighting, suffering, dying somewhere along the line.
And by these flags we greet them, no matter where they are,
With these little flags of crimson, each with its one blue star.

"I saw a little farm house, out on a western plain,
Surrounded there on every side by fields of waving grain,
And there shining in the window, like a beacon light afar,
Hung that little flag of crimson with its one blue star.

"And then a filthy, dirty tenement, but high above the roar
Of the city's traffic a hundred feet or more,
Blazing in the window, like a flower in a jar,
I saw that flag of crimson with its one blue star.

"And then a city mansion, a home of wealth and ease,
Surrounded by green hedges, flower beds and trees,
And there beside the portal, hanging from a golden bar,
Hung a silken flag of crimson, with its one blue star.

"So when the bands are crashing and the flags are waving high,
And you're yelling, cheering, greeting as the boys go marching by,
Don't forget the dads and mothers and these homes where e'er they are,
Where these little flags are flying with the one blue star."

Brownell is Speaker at Elmira Patriotic Picnic

Between 600 and 700 people yesterday took part in a Fourth of July picnic in the grove at Elmira which C. K. Hale, who presided during the patriotic program, declares was the most enthusiastic demonstration of Americanism ever held in that section of Lane county.

Attorney Howard M. Brownell, of Eugene, delivered the Independence day address.

A program of songs and recitations was given. A baby contest with 12 entries was held. A baseball game and horse races were among other features of the celebration.

London Papers Endorse Wilson's July 4th Speech

London, July 5.—London morning papers today endorsed President Wilson's speech at Mount Vernon, pointing out its similarity to Winston Churchill's address before the Anglo-American Fellowship meeting here.

"President Wilson re-stated, with solemn authority the war aims of the allies," the Express said.

The Mail said that the president stated the allies' war aims with force and directness.

HUNS SEEK RAID TRUCE

Czerin was compelled to resign as Austro-Hungarian foreign minister following publication of the famous letter from the emperor to Prince Sixtus, of Bourbon, in which the Austrian ruler made several startling peace concessions.

He was succeeded by Baron Burián.

ALLIED FORCES CELEBRATE FOURTH WITH VICTORIES

ber of trench mortars were captured. "A hostile attack on Hamel last night was repulsed."

"A successful raid was carried out by us in the Beaumont-Hamel sector (five miles north of Albert)."

"An attempted raid in the neighborhood of Strazeele (Flanders front) was repulsed."

With the American Armies in France, July 4.—The Germans attempted a small raid against an American sector in the Vosges yesterday morning, following artillery preparation. The enemy was severely punished.

A captured officer reported that eight were killed.

Between the Toul front and the lower Alsatian sectors the American positions were quiet today. Poor visibility interfered with aerial and artillery activity.

ITALIANS PRESS ON

With the Italian Armies in the Field, July 5.—The Italian attack on the lower Piave today was preceded by one of the most formidable bombardments of the present campaign.

Some of the Austrian small bridges were set afire by floating burning petrol boats down the river. The larger bridges were destroyed by the artillery.

Italian troops surrounded and captured several groups of the enemy among the many canals in this region.

TEN AIRPLANES DOWNED.

London, July 5.—Ten German airplanes were accounted for by British airmen Wednesday, according to the official aviation communique. During the day and night 16 tons of bombs were dropped on enemy targets.

"The weather was cloudy and activity was slight," the statement said. "Our machines carried out a number of reconnaissances. Six hostile machines were destroyed and four were driven down out of control. During the day and the following night we dropped 16 tons of bombs on the railway junctions at Lille and Courtray. Our machines returned safely."

ARMENIANS OCCUPY ERIVAN

Amsterdam, July 5.—Twenty-five thousand Armenians have occupied Erivan, according to a Vienna dispatch received today.

Erivan, a city of about 35,000 population, is situated in Russian Armenia, about 100 miles south of Tiflis.

FRENCH CAPTURE PRISONERS

Paris, July 5.—Patrol activities which resulted in additional prisoners, were reported by the French war office today.

"Between Montdidier and the Oise, in the Champagne and along the right bank of the Meuse, French patrols brought in prisoners," the communique said.
