Quayle in New Position—
George Quayle, formerly secretary and manager of all war activities for the Eugene chamber of commerce, has been installed in the office of the Portland chamber as secretary of the Oregon development bureau, a berth heretofore held by Secretary Crawford. Mr. Crawford has taken charge of the bureau of industries and manufactures. A revision of the plans of work of the Oregon development bureau is anticipated by chamber officials as a result of Mr. Quayle's advent on the staff. That much attention will be directed toward state development, rather than Portland alone, is intimated.—Portland Journal.

Children Show Patriotism—
The children in the neighborhood of South Alder street wound up their Fourth of July celebration with a patriotic parade indicating a degree of patriotism which was quite as inspiring to those who witnessed it as any of the larger events of the day. Soldiers and sailors, Red Cross nurses and ambulance drivers, patriotic floats carrying the goddesses and four of the children carrying their flag were features of the procession which marched to martial music. The parade occurred about 9 o'clock and was planned by the same group of children who held a flag raising with an appropriate program about two weeks ago.

Governor Leaves for Salem—
Governor James Withycombe who reviewed the Lane County Home Guard in connection with the Fourth of July celebration yesterday did not remain in the city for the ball at which he was to have led the grand march last night, owing to the fact that he was not feeling well. He left Eugene immediately following the patriotic exercises on the court house square for his home, accompanied by Warden Murphy of the state penitentiary, who brought him to Eugene in his car, earlier in the day. The governor was accompanied to Santa Clara by a deputation from the Eugene military company of deputy sheriffs, headed by Major John B. Bell, as a guard of honor.

Spruce Men Wanted—
Eligible and qualified men for the spruce division of the air service of the national army are wanted, according to a statement of the officer in charge of the Eugene recruiting station of the army, yesterday. Men will be accepted for this service who present a letter from an officer of that service. Applicants must not be registered in the draft and must be between 18 years of age and not over 40. The following branches of service in the army are open to enlistment: Cavalry, infantry, coast artillery, field artillery, hospital corps and most any engineering corps that an applicant may desire. The local station has been asked to enlist 15 men for the month of July.

Baseball Playing Declared Non-Essential Occupation

Dallas, Texas, July 5.—The first indication of the status baseball players may have under the "work or fight" ruling of the war department was reported here today when Sam Lewis, pitcher for the Dallas "Texas league" club, was summoned by his local board and ordered to engage in an essential occupation or be placed in class one. Lewis, who is married and has one child, had previously been in class four. He will appeal.

Irwin Comptore, another Dallas pitcher, who supports his mother, and had been classified in class four on a dependency claim was ordered to do likewise.
