To Consider Franchise

The city council at its regularly monthly meeting to be held Monday night will consider the application of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company's franchise. The present franchise will expire on July 12 and the company is seeking a renewal for a period of 12 years. The payment of a franchise tax of \$250 a year, as compared with no payment to the city under the present franchise, is proposed by the company.

Lorane Pear Crop Large

The Lorane valley will take a position this year as a shipper of fruit, according to Claud Schrack, manager for the Lorane Orchard company. The crop will be largely of pears, of which there will be some 10 to 15 carloads. About one-third of these will be d'Anjou and the remainder Bartlett. This will be the first crop of fruit of any magnitude raised in the valley, but there are several thousand acres of trees coming into bearing.

Woman Is Fire Lookout

The United States forest service is putting a plan to employ women as fire patrols, announced several months ago, into effect. Miss Helen McCormick, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. McCormick, of Eugene, has been employed as a patrol in the upper McKenzie country, within the Cascade national forest. She will begin her duties within a few days. Miss McCormick will ride a horse and cover territory between the Blue River village and the Blue River mines. She will carry an emergency camping outfit and will be compelled to camp out in the forest at times.

Bakers Must File Statements

County Food Administrator F. M. Wilkins today received a notice to the effect that all bakers in Lane county must file their statements of sugar used with the county food administrator before July 15, or future sugar certificates will not be issued to them. Bakers will be permitted to use but 70 per cent of the amount of sugar used for the same months last year during July, August and September, it is announced. A letter from W. B. Ayer, state administrator, says dealers in sugar should limit their purchases during the next three months as two-thirds of the families in Oregon have purchased their supply for canning purposes.
