FINLAND ASKS FOOD

Stockholm, July 10.—General Mannerheim, military commander in Finland, visited American Minister Morris here and asked that the allied countries send food into Finland.

Morris replied that the allies would gladly do this—but not until German influence and German troops had been removed.

103 CASUALTIES REPORTED

Washington, July 10.—General Pershing today reported 103 A. E. F. casualties, divided as follows:

Killed in action, 21; died of wounds, 15; died of disease, 4; died of accident and other causes, 3; wounded severely, 45; wounded slightly, 1; missing in action, 12; prisoners, 2.

Good Teeth Start With Infancy

GOOD teeth, well taken care of, add a charm to any face. A child with a deformed mouth enters the race of life with a big handicap. There is nothing that detracts more from a person's appearance than unsightly or irregular teeth.

Straight, even teeth—a perfectly shaped mouth—rest very largely with mother's care in infancy. Few realize the danger likely to result from allowing young children to form the habit of sucking their thumbs or fingers. This tends to force out the upper front teeth and jaw, and to push back the lower front teeth and jaw.

Face is the result. A deformed mouth causes the teeth to come in irregularly. Deformed jaws help to cause adenoids and mouth-breathing, and mental development is retarded by displacement of the bones of the jaws and face.

Do not neglect the temporary teeth. They represent the structure on which the permanent teeth are built. If lost by decay before their time, the jaws fail to expand properly, and the incoming permanent teeth will be crowded and irregular. A child's temporary molars are not fully replaced by the permanent teeth until the teeth or twelfth year after birth.

NEW ROUTE FOR ROAD TO LORANE REJECTED

Remonstrance Contains More Names than Petition Asking Change in Highway.

The proposed new route for the Lorane to Cottage Grove road has been rejected by the Lane county court, because the remonstrance against the change in the highway was greater in number of signatures than the petition asking for the adoption of the new route over the mountains. The principal objectors were residents of the Silk creek district. The state law provides that when a remonstrance is greater than a petition, the petition shall be denied. The present road has a steep grade and runs high on the mountains. County Surveyor Libby found a lower pass through which a road might be built on a five per cent grade. The object of the petition was to have this route located as a county road with a view to ultimately using it for the highway.

The Will Gimpl road in the Spencer creek district was denied because the petitioners were not willing to pay damages.

The petition for the C. W. Whitten road, which it is proposed to locate from Eugene over the ridge to the upper end of Spencer creek, as a part of the Eugene to Lorane highway, was continued. The object of this petition is to get a better grade on this side of the hill.

The survey on the road at Divide has been completed and the court is awaiting the report of the viewers. Work in connection with this project is uncertain, however, as it is a state highway project, and the state commission has announced that it proposes to limit its activities this year to work under way.

Hearings on road petitions were continued as follows: Schorensburg road, Roy Huchens road, John Beal road, Grant Hendricks road. The petition for a vacation of a road signed by John Beal and others was also continued.

SEEKS TO HAVE HIS RIVAL TAKEN IN DRAFT

Registrant Not Ready for Service in Army Until Love Affair Is Settled.

The appeal board for the second district of Oregon considered an appeal by a drafted man from Lane county at its meeting last night, setting aside temporarily its action in advancing the registrant to class one, because it was alleged that he had been spending his time joy riding after having been given a deferred classification as a farmer.

The registrant appeared before the board in answer to the charge. He came with witnesses and his employer, who brought a time book as evidence that he had been working faithfully on the farm.

The registrant stated that he was willing to go into the service, but not just now. He told the board that he had a rival for the hand of his best girl, and asserted that the man who had complained to the board wanted to have him drafted so that he himself might win the girl to whom both have been paying attention.

The appeal board decided to permit the registrant to remain at home on the farm until the crops have been harvested.

Ad Men Vote New Orleans as Place of 1919 Meeting

San Francisco, July 10.—New Orleans won the 1919 convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World, at a midnight meeting of presidents of ad clubs here.

The vote was 39 for New Orleans, 13 for St. Paul and 9 for New York. Four hours of arguing and speech-making preceded the balloting. Afterward, Mayor Behrman, of New Orleans, extended that city's official welcome to the ad clubs.

This morning's session of the ad clubs' convention, included an outline of the government's railroad policy by Gerrit Fort, of the railway administration; a talk on spruce production by Charles F. Berg, of the Portland Ad club, and an address by Merle Sidener, of Indianapolis.
