

INDUCTION ORDERS FOR 145 LANE MEN ISSUED BY BOARD

Large Class Is Called for Examination in Reaching County's Quota in Next Increment of Draft.

The Lane county draft board last night issued induction orders to 145 registrants, practically exhausting class one in the county. The men will report July 24 at 8 a. m. for physical examination under the new army standards, and it is expected the entire number will be required to secure the county's quota of 218 men who will enter the service on that date and entrain July 25 for Camp Lewis. Some of the men will receive examinations and entrain in other cities.

FRENCH DRIVE

HUNS BACK ON

enveloped the city of Berat. Its surrender is expected momentarily.

Fierce fighting took place on the Austrian right wing, where strong resistance was offered to the incessant attacks of the Italians, dispatches said. In a three-day fight, the enemy's stubborn defense was smashed and Italian cavalry proceeded from the right wing and swept into Fieri.

The Italian cavalry advance was so rapid the Austrians were forced to flee precipitately from the town, abandoning an airfield and several airplanes, which fell undamaged into the hands of the attackers. British monitors and airplanes attacked them, throwing the enemy into confusion. Airmen demolished six bridges over the Semeni and Skumbi rivers, dropped with remarkable accuracy.

With the Americans on the Marne, July 11.—A large German patrol which attempted to raid the American lines near Chateau-Thierry, was repulsed yesterday afternoon. Presence of new enemy units in this sector was revealed through identification of the dead.

There was harassing artillery fire on various parts of the front, but aside from the raid no infantry action was reported. Heavy clouds, high winds and rain prevented aerial activity.

London, July 12.—Activity is developing along the whole Balkan front, and there are increasing indications that the Albanian fighting may spread to the entire 300-mile line from the Adriatic to the Gulf of Rendina.

The Italians have crossed the Semeni river at one or more points, according to the latest reports from the battlefront, and are nearing the new Austrian defense lines along the Skumbi river. Infantry has progressed at least 25 miles north of the original line on the Vojutza, while cavalry detachments are reported to have advanced even further. This would bring the Italians into the region of Lushnev, about midway between the Semeni and the Skumbi.
