Rose, July 13.—A military bulletin decrees the retirement with loss of rank and pay of Generals Cadorna, Parro and Capello.

General Diaz, commander-in-chief of the Italian army, has been decorated with the grand Cordel, of the military order of Savoy.

General Cadorna was commander-in-chief of the Italian armies last year when the Austro-German drive forced them back to the Piave river, following the Caporetto disaster.

"TWILL WORRY WILHELM!" Washington, July 13.—Five quarts of home canned fruits and vegetables per month for all winter for every American isn't a bad wartime prospect, is it?

That's the program the department of agriculture is fostering in its "can-the-food" propaganda. Three thousand demonstrators are in the field, all over the producing districts, showing men, women and children how to can and dry the surplus summer food, to the end that 1,500,000,000 quarts may be put up at home this summer.

RATS AND HUNS BOTH! Washington, July 13.—A nation-wide offensive against the American rat, house, barn, corn-bin, water-front and other varieties, is underway. It's not so much a personal matter; but that he is destroying some \$200,000,000 annually in foodstuffs and property, not to mention the labor lost in replacing the wastage.

Already, Mississippi, West Virginia, Georgia, Maryland, Minnesota and Alabama, backed by aid of United States government experts, are aligned in the fight; and pressure is under way to make the move national as a war measure. Anti-rat literature may be had free from the agriculture department.
