

LANE COUNTY BABIES TO BE MEASURED AT WAR WORK CLINIC

Mothers of Children Under Five Years of Age Are Asked to Bring Little Tots to Eugene.

The work of organizing Lane county for the weighing and measuring all children five years and under is well under way in Eugene.

The committee in charge of this work met Wednesday at the chamber of commerce rooms. The committee consists of Mrs. Herman Clark, chairman; Mrs. L. L. Ray, secretary; Mrs. John Baird, publicity; Mrs. Mary F. Faubian and Dr. B. W. DeBuck. Mrs. Albert In-

galls, as county chairman of the woman's committee of the council of national defense, will assist in selecting chairmen for the various districts throughout the county.

The work is well under way in Portland, and it is the earnest desire of Mrs. Fred Schille, of La Grand, the state leader in this work, that Oregon will measure up to her usual high standard in this, as in other patriotic movements.

The date of the first clinic, which will be held in the chamber of commerce, will be announced later.

Each mother in Lane county, who has a child or children under five years of age, should feel it to be her duty to her country, to see that her children are brought in at the time allotted to her.

This work is a part of the war program of our government and is being carried on all over the country by the council of national defense, through the child welfare committee. The importance of it cannot well be estimated. President Wilson heartily endorses it and has designated this as "Children's Year." In the first paragraph of his

letter endorsing "Children's Year," the president says, "Next to the duty of doing everything possible for the soldiers at the front, there could be, it seems to me, no more patriotic duty than that of protecting the children, who constitute one-third of our population."

Statistics show that 300,000 little ones under five years of age die in this country every year from preventable diseases, and it is the object of this year's campaign to save 100,000 of these children.

He referred to the news regarding his son, Lieutenant Quentin Roosevelt, reported dead in an aerial combat in France.

"I have had no conference with any living man on the subject of politics. I want none. I am not interested in politics at this time. It is farthest from my thoughts."

TUBER MOTH FOUND IN POTATOES SHIPPED HERE FROM PORTLAND

Horticultural Inspector Stewart States that Distribution Over State of Infected California Product Made.

California potatoes infected with tuber moth are being shipped from Portland over the state of Oregon, according to C. E. Stewart, horticultural inspector of Lane county, who last night confiscated a small consignment of these potatoes and had them destroyed by boiling. Mr. Stewart stated that there are but three points of entry for California potatoes in Oregon—Portland, Eugene and Salem. The potatoes received here yesterday were apparently from a car which had been received in Portland, from which distributions over the state are being made. Mr. Stewart took seven worms from one potato, in which he states there were many more.

"Oregon should go without potatoes rather than chance the danger from the tuber moth," he stated. "You can fight bugs, but you can't escape this pest. If we escape its introduction into the state this year and the destruction of crops that will follow in years to come, it will be little short of miraculous."

PROMOTION IS WON BY CAPT. COLLINS

Former Eugene Resident Now Lieutenant Colonel in Anti-Aircraft Battalion.

Captain R. W. Collins, four years regular army instructor with the Oregon coast artillery, has been promoted to the rank of lieutenant-colonel, according to word received by Mrs. Collins, who is making her home in Eugene, while her husband is in France.

Captain Collins is in command of the First Anti-Aircraft battalion, with General Pershing's army at the front. He started his military career during the Spanish-American war and saw service in both Cuba and the Philippines. He has been an officer in the regular army 16 years.

Mrs. Collins and her two children came to Eugene about one month ago and are moving into a home, at the corner of Fifth avenue and Lincoln street, purchased by Mr. Collins when he was stationed in this city. Captain Collins has been in France since Christmas and it is not improbable that he is playing a part in the present American offensive operations.

British Are Victors in Air Battle with Enemy

The Hague, July 19.—Two German airplanes fell into the North sea and three others were wrecked during a combat between nine Germans and four British planes, it was declared here today. Dispatches received from Lieburg, declare allied airplanes bombed and blew up a munition factory at Rheims. The allied air raid over Ludwigsdorp on July 11, killed 30 persons and wounded 60, advices here state.

Doubtful Whether Roosevelt Killed or Taken Prisoner

London, July 19.—Whether Lieutenant Quentin Roosevelt was killed in combat or whether he was shot down and taken prisoner is not yet known, dispatches received here from the French front state.

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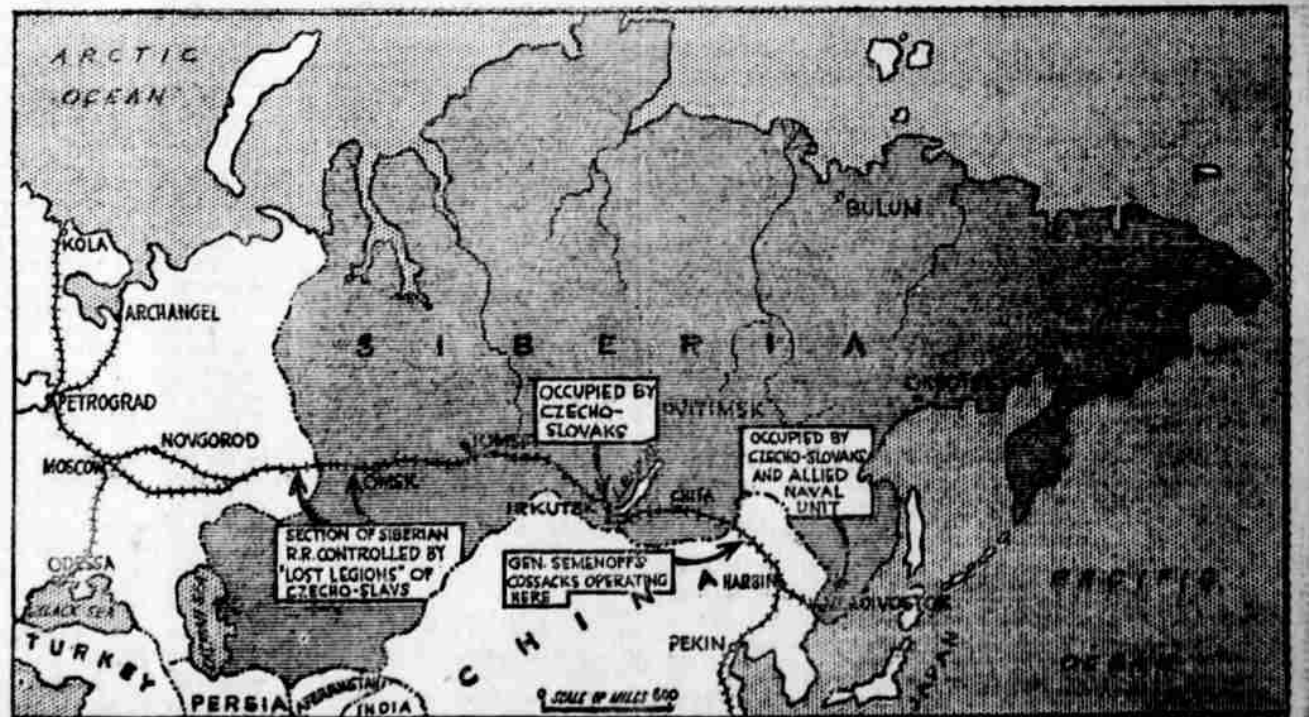

Siberia, the Great Territory Governed by No One.



The enormous territory of Siberia, with nearly 5,000,000 square miles, larger than all Europe, nominally controlled by Russia, but since the overthrow of the czar without any general form of government, is now over-run by brigands and robber bands and Czechoslovaks, who escaped from Russia.
