U-BOATS NO LONGER THREATEN SUPPLY OF FOOD, ASSERTION

Hoover Tells Allied Dictators that Situation of Production and Distribution Has Now Turned.

London, July 23.—Herbert Hoover, United States food administrator, told the allied food controllers that the situation in the food production and supply has been turned. There is no longer anything to fear from the German U-boats, he declared. In his address, delivered at a luncheon at the Mansion House, he said:

"The submarine menace no longer threatens the food supply. We have turned the corner at last.

"During the last 12 months, the United States has exported ten million tons of foodstuffs to the allies. During the next 12 months with less pressure, we can export 21,000,000 tons, including 3,000,000 tons from Canada.

"We have built enough ships to handle food for the soldiers.

"The United States' pork output alone will supply meat for the allies.

"In contrast to this, hunger is the dominating fact with the enemy. They have been unable to produce the food they need. Starvation rings in the words of the so-called 'German victory'.

"These conquered people are being slowly, but surely starved. Their loss of lives through starvation during the next harvest, probably will be larger than all the casualties of the west front."

Hoover read the following message from President Wilson:

"The American people will gladly and willingly make any sacrifice in their production of foodstuffs to make comfort for the allied people. We are, in fact, eating a common table with them."

Present at the luncheon were food controllers of England, France, Italy, Belgium and other countries.

Fritz Withdrawing Guns

London, July 23.—(1:50 p. m.)—The German artillery in the Rheims and Soissons regions is comparatively inactive, indicating a withdrawal of the guns, according to authoritative information received here today.

With the American Armies in the Field, July 23.—The German retreat northward from the Marne is being carried out tonight by the light of burning villages—the torches of Prussian militarism.

The sky is illuminated from horizon to horizon by blazing towns and ammunition dumps, as the enemy continues his retreat toward the Vesle river. Allied aviators report great congestion on the roads below Bazoches (on the Vesle, two and a half miles west of Fismes and 16 miles north of the Marne).

The Germans are fighting a heavy rear guard action and are holding desperately on the flanks to prevent being squeezed in the great pocket by the French and Americans advancing north of Chateau-Thierry and the French, Italians and British advancing north of the Marne and between the river and Rheims.

720,000 Huns Engaged.—Communications below Bazoches are difficult, even under normal conditions, as they consist mostly of winding by-roads. Their traveling is difficult through having been fought over. Bombing planes and long range cannon are adding to the troubles there. It is established that the Germans already have used 70 divisions (720,000 men). The number of prisoners is steadily increasing. When they are all counted it probably will be found that one army alone has captured nearly as many as the total of the present official estimates.

(The latest official statement regarding prisoners was made in Sunday's Paris communique, when it was announced that more than 20,000 had been taken, and more than 400 guns captured.)

Bazoches is one of the most important railway and highway centers in this region. It is the junction of the railways running from Soissons and Chateau-Thierry to Fismes.

Path of Escape Narrow

Paris, July 23.—(10:30 a. m.)—As a result of the allies' bombardment from both sides of the Rheims-Soissons pocket, the German crown prince has only a seven-mile passage for withdrawal of his troops, it was reported from the front today.

The width of the salient on the Fere-Tardenois line is about 25 miles.

Infantry Rests Through Night

Paris, July 23.—(Noon.)—Only artillery fighting was reported on the whole offensive front last night, the war office announced today.

French troops advanced on a three-mile front north of Montdidier (Pecardy front), capturing 3 villages and 300 prisoners.

BRITISH AND BOCHE BREAK 50-50 IN AIR

Reporting Five Hun Planes Destroyed, London Announces Loss of Equal Number.

London, July 23.—Destruction of 50 enemy airplanes and the loss of as many British machines was reported today in the communique issued by the British air ministry, which follows:

"On the 21st instant the very strong west wind and low clouds almost entirely prevented flying on a small part of the front. Machines in this sector dropped bombs on various targets, including a railway station, where a direct hit was obtained on an ammunition train.

"In combat: five hostile machines were brought down. Four of our machines are missing.

"After dark the sky cleared and the wind dropped considerably, enabling our night bombing machines to carry out raids on the greater part of the front. Thirteen tons of bombs were dropped on the railways at Sedlin, Meunin, Lille and Cambrai. One machine has not returned.

"On the night of July 21 and 22, many successful bomb attacks were carried out by our squadrons. Over a ton of bombs was dropped in the extensive railway sidings at Lucas, southeast of Mezieres.

"The aniline and soda factory was again subjected to attack and many good bursts were observed in the factory.

"At a factory southeast of Zweibrücken, a large explosion was caused. Bombs were dropped on three hostile aerodromes and hangars were seen to be hit.

"Low-flying airplanes attacked and hit five trains, bringing them to a standstill. Searchlights and anti-aircraft guns were attacked with bombs and machine gun fire. All of our machines returned.

"On the 22nd the important powder factory at Rottweil was attacked. A direct hit was observed on one of the big sheds and as a result several other sheds in the vicinity blew up. A fire broke out which could be seen for 60 miles.

"All of our machines returned safely."

British Improve Positions in Flanders and Picardy

London, July 23.—British troops made slight advances in various sectors of the Picardy and Flanders fronts yesterday and last night, Field Marshal Haig reported today.

The advances improved British positions south of Hebuterne and near Hamel, both of which are north of Albert and between Meris and Meteren, on the west portion of the Flanders salient.

105 ON CASUALTY LIST

Washington, July 23.—General Pershing's casualty list, totalling 105, today showed:

Killed in action 24, dead of wounds 3, dead of disease 5, dead from accident and other causes 5, wounded severely 67, missing in action 1.

Rev. R. Wellwood, an American missionary, who went to France as a Y. M. C. A. worker was killed by shell fire on the western front.

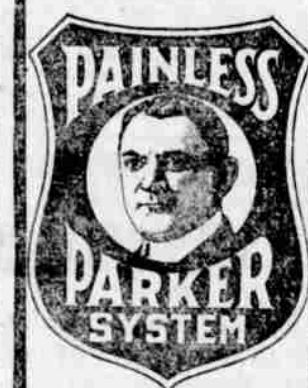
The children were formed in line when the alarm was sounded, but became frightened at the approach of the flames, broke away in a panic and were soon lost in the institution.
