UNION OF CHURCHES SUGGESTED AS WAR MEASURE BY SYNOD

Co-operation of Various Denominations in State With Simple Faith in Jesus Christ as Only Test Proposed.

The war is taking the ministers from the churches in Oregon at such a rapid rate that co-operation of various denominations is essential to the maintenance of the strength of the church, in the opinion of the synod of Oregon, which Wednesday issued a challenge for a union of forces upon the ground of simple faith in Jesus Christ.

This action was taken at a session marked by patriotic enthusiasm at which the ministers sang the "Star Spangled Banner" and "The Son of God Goes Forth to War."

A report of Dr. Andrew J. Montgomery, of Portland, for the home missions committee, disclosed that 25 per cent of the members of the synod are now actually engaged in war work and that nine of them are in France.

Presbyterians invite co-operation. Dr. John H. Boyd, of Portland, was authorized by the synod to draw up the declaration of principles upon which the Presbyterian church will meet and co-operate with other churches of the state. These he set forth in an address in the synod, in brief, as follows:

"That the need of the world is for an inclusive Christianity conserving the large and essential in religion, and that we believe the Presbyterian church is in a position to challenge and that we do challenge other churches to meet us on this ground, and that we therefore agree to enter into negotiations leading to any and all forms of co-operation; county, union or federation.

"That the Presbyterian church has no creed and that we invite fellowship on the ground of simple faith in Jesus Christ.

"That we recognize the ministry, order and sacraments of other churches and invite them to fellowship, and that we are ready to dismiss our members to their fellowship if acceptable to them."

Pay of Ministers inadequate. The report by the synod committee on home missions declares: "The synod is greatly disturbed over the inadequacy of the average salary paid to the faithful ministers. Since the cost of living has increased our ministers cannot live on pre-war salaries. It is wicked for congregations to ask this. Many ministers are being driven to other secular employments because they must secure funds to live on."

President Warren H. Landon, of the San Francisco Theological Seminary, addressed the synod. Elder James F. Ewing and Dr. John H. Boyd, both of Portland, were nominated as trustees of the seminary to serve for a period of five years. One-third of the trustees of this institution are representatives of the Presbyterian church in Oregon.

The synod adopted the every-member plan, which provides that every member shall contribute every week in some amount to the church and its benevolences. Provision was made to inaugurate a membership campaign in all the churches in the state at Easter time. Higher salaries for ministers to enable them to meet the cost of living and an increase of 100 per cent in gifts to home missions during the coming year, are favored in resolutions adopted.

FREE NEWSPAPERS ARE TABOO UNDER NEW FEDERAL RULE

Government Announces Regulations for Publishers Designed to Eliminate Waste of Paper Stock.

Washington, July 25.—Because of confusion growing out of its order of July 5, bearing on paper conservation, the war industries board today issued the following order for newspaper publishers:

"1. Discontinue the acceptance of the return of unsold copies.
(a) Exceptions: Agents of publishers or dealers acting as agents (selling newspapers wholesale to retail dealers, newstands and newsboys) may return unsold copies, provided such unsold copies have not been in the possession of retail dealers, newstands or newsboys.

(b) Retail dealers, newstands or newsboys receiving papers too late for sale on account of delay in transportation, may refund copies to the publisher.

"2. Discontinue giving copies to anybody except for office working copies or where required by statute law in the case of official advertising.

(a) Exceptions: Copies may be given free to employees of newspapers if such is the present practice of the office. No free copies shall be given relatives, stockholders or others not actually engaged in the publication of the paper.

(b) Copies may be sent free to former employees who are in the war service, and copies may be sent free to camp libraries of institutions recognized by the government, such as the Y. M. C. A., Knights of Columbus, etc. Copies should not be sent free to individuals unless formerly employed by the newspapers.

(c) Copies may be sent free to the library of congress and to state and other public libraries who will agree to bind or otherwise permanently preserve the file of the paper.

(d) Copies may be sent free to clipping bureaus which render an equivalent service to the newspapers.

(e) Copies may be sent free to the newspaper's correspondents and the press bureaus.

"3. Discontinue giving free copies to advertisers, except not more than one copy for checking purposes.

(a) Exceptions: Any advertiser who customarily places advertisements with the newspapers in at least four issues each week and agency from whom the publishers receive advertising regularly may be put on the regular mailing list to facilitate handling in the mailing room.

(b) Copies must not be sent as a means of advertising the newspaper itself to agencies not handling such paper."

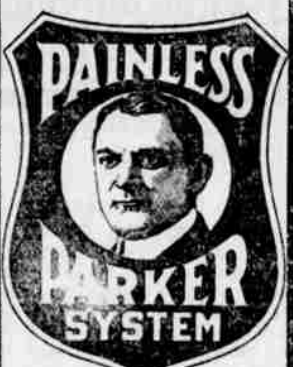
